Kicking off 2023!

2023 is off to a great start! The Friends have funded five adult programs, and six children's programs. Five of our thirteen Museum passes have been renewed. In addition, we have provided craft supplies and food treats for a number of events.

March is the month to pay Annual Membership dues. To date over two-thirds of the members have paid. <u>If you have not sent</u> <u>in your dues yet, please do so.</u> We depend on you to help support our library.

We have also received donations to date of \$365. Many thanks!

Here is a recap of the 2023 Budget, as of March 21.

Due to the decline in the stock market, the Board elected to not withdrawn funds from the market last year. Instead, we used cash reserves to cover expenses. At the end of the first quarter of this year, our cash reserves are at \$9,100.

Finally, I am happy to report that we have filed our 2022 Tax Reports.



Book Review: The Women of the Copper Country



I was born after the great union fights of the early 1900's. I didn't live during the great depression. I didn't grow up without enough food to eat. I was blessed.

But today there remain stark inequalities in our land. And looking back to times of great hardship, can help us forge a more decent world. So, settle in and read about a two-year fight between a fledgling union and one of the country's greatest copper mining companies. Many died in pursuit of better working conditions.

The Women of the Copper Country by Mary Doria Russell will take you to the brutish conditions that existed in the mining town of Calumet, Michigan. Here you will meet Annie Clemenc. She was an unusually tall girl who was viewed as homely by many. She married a miner, who was a heavy drinker and would occasionally beat her. Her brother was one of the miners who tried to start a union. But the story really begins when he dies in a mining accident and Annie decides to take on the fight.

Here we see men risking their lives to work underground for meager pay that barely allows them to feed their families. Children go down into the mines to dig in the smallest tunnels. Women supplement incomes by doing laundry, working as maids, and growing vegetables. But all life is lived in fear of the bells that announce a collapse in the mines.

As with all historical fiction, we read a story that is part fact and part imagination. Annie is a galvanizing leader. She is fearless. As the story unfolds, she pulls the community of miners together. But the fight will drag on, and along with other leaders she will suffer being jailed and beaten.

The fight will become news outside of the confines of the Calumet. Unions in New York and Boston will send funds and aid to help. In the end, this Joan of Arc will succeed, but at a terrible cost. To know the story of the lives lost, the greed and heartlessness, and the final outcome, read this book.

This book is available at the Library. I give it 5 stars.


Our New Library Catalog

On February 27th, the CLAMS Libraries launched a new catalog (Aspen) and integrated library system (Koha). When they log on to Bourne Public Library, library patrons will view a new user-friendly catalog! This new interface will make searching and borrowing material easier for library members.

Aspen catalog has some new features like purchase suggestions, customized recommendations, and tracking what you have read. Some of Aspen's other features:

- Members can update contact information in their account.
- Members have the ability to select notification preferences such as text, email, or phone calls for holds.
- Search results are grouped by format print books, audiobooks, DVD's, and eBooks/eAudiobooks
- Members can send purchase suggestions to library staff directly through the member account.
- The catalog allows member to create reading lists.




