# A New Look for the JBPL

In Phase 1 of a Library renovation project, new book shelves, computer stations and a check out desk were put in place earlier this summer. The book shelves are on casters and can be moved to allow rearrangement of the main floor area into a larger open space. With this, the main floor will now accommodate a larger audience for some of our very popular author talks in the future. Phase 2 of the renovation includes replacement of the carpet on the main floor later this year.



## **Museum Passes**

As you may know, the Friends of the Library purchase and make available, to all patrons, passes to many museums on and around the Cape and New England area. The complete list of available passes is listed on the library website. Reservations for those museum passes can be made on-line at the library website, in person at the library or by calling the library. The passes are available all year long. Some of the passes give a discounted price of admission and some give a free entrance to the museum.



**Buttonwood Park Zoo** in New Bedford is one of the many choices you have. The pass offers free admission for up to 4 people. There are a few restrictions to the pass. It is valid every day except Mondays and Saturdays. The passes are not eligible to be used during February or April school vacation weeks, or on major holidays, so you would need to plan accordingly. The Sandwich Glass Museum is a local treasure. It's a great place to spend a few hours learning about the glass making industry on the Cape and to see a large display of Sandwich glass. There is also a glass blower on site so you can watch a demonstration of glass being blown. The pass allows two free admissions to the museum. # New Tools for Uncovering the Past

Interested in learning about your ancestors but don't know where to start? Begin your research with two new genealogical resources from the Jonathan Bourne Library. You can access them online at the library or at home. The resources are free, but you will need to have your library card handy.

## Heritage Quest Online

Heritage Quest Online offers a comprehensive treasury of American genealogical sources rich in unique primary sources, local and fami-



ly histories, and finding aids. It provides genealogical and historical sources for more than 60 countries, with coverage dating back as early as the 1700s. You can find printed census records, city directories, and more. To use this resource, go to <u>www.bournelibrary.org</u> and click on the Reference Tab. Then scan down until you see the Heritage Quest icon and click on it. When prompted, type in your library card number. Then the search is on!

#### Fold 3: Library Edition and Heritage Quest Online

If you have an ancestor who served in the military, you can find information about him or her at Fold 3: Library Edition

Online. This searchable database provides convenient access to US military records, including the stories, photos, and documents of the men and women who served. It contains millions of records from world-class archives, many of which are exclusively available on Fold3.
