Introducing Librarian Sara Rose: "Hometown Girl" Comes Home



Meet Sara Rose, the new librarian in charge of technology at the Jonathan Bourne Public Library. Sara was born and raised in Monument Beach; as a child, she went to the Jonathan Bourne Public Library often with her mother. In fact, it was there as a girl that she first met Diane Ranney. She attended Bourne High School as a teenager and then majored in history at Bridgewater State University.

After graduation, she considered going to law school, but a temporary stint in a law firm convinced her that being a lawyer was not a career she could wholeheartedly love. Instead, on the advice of a friend, she decided to study library science, and completed her Master's degree in Library and Information Science (MLIS) at Simmons University in Boston with a concentration in Archives Management

After graduation, Sara first worked at the New Bedford Whaling Museum, preserving historical documents in the museum archives. However, she found that she missed the face-to-face contact with library patrons, so she moved to work as a reference librarian in Hanover. Acquiring additional technical knowledge and skills, she was well-prepared for her new position at JBPL as our chief technology expert. In this position, she sees the library as the "living room of the community," and is eager to help library patrons, whether they are searching for information or learning how to use new technology. So if you received a new Kindle or iPad over the holidays and don't know how to use them, make an appointment to meet Sara and get expert help with your new technology. As one of Sara's favorite quotes, from the novelist Neil Gaiman, says: "Google can bring you back 100,000 answers. A librarian can bring you back the right one."

Pajamas, Pajamas, Pajamas!

What does February mean to you? One month closer to Spring? Valentine's Day? To the staff at the Bourne Library, February means PAJAMAS! The Boston Bruins/Cradles to Crayons Annual Pajama Drive begins February 1 and runs through March 15. The Drive, which is sponsored with the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners, is THE biggest children's program of the winter in Bourne.

Children's Librarian Terry Johnson and Children's Assistant Loretta Brochu, know that, once February rolls around, they will spend countless hours packaging and tallying the PJs so that not only will Bourne



claim the Title of "Best in Show" for collecting the most PJs, but also children of all ages across Massachusetts will have new pajamas to wear. The PJ Drive has been one of the most successful ways to clothe children who sometimes are taken out of their homes in only what they are wearing.

For the past 5 years, Bourne has been FIRST in the collection drive, which benefits local children who need pajamas. Anything from "onesies" to pajama pants for teens is accepted. We collect them, Cradles to Crayons of the Department of Children and Families distribute them. In past years, the Library has been challenged but always comes out on top. Last year, Bourne beat the challenger by 500+ pairs, donating a total of more than 3,000 pairs. This year's goal is 3,500!

The Library has a lot of fun ways to donate, including PJs for Fines, a PJ Dance Party and raffle tickets for some super prizes. Check the website (www.bournelibrary.org) for weekly events and get those PJs to Miss Terry as soon as you can! As Library Director Patrick Marshall said at a recent Friends meeting, "We are going for our sixth win, just like the Patriots last year." Any donation is welcome, but please make sure they are NEW PJs. (See our flyer on page 8 for more details.)
