The Bourne Centennial Quilt

For many, the large quilt which takes up an entire wall in the program room of the Jonathan Bourne Public Library is as familiar as the town itself. The thirty squares, as varied as the quiltmakers who stitched it, still have a special place in the hearts of some library staff who were around to see it take shape.

In 1983, the Bourne Centennial Quilt Committee was formed to look into making a quilt which would memorialize sites in the Town of Bourne and be hung in a prominent place where visitors and residents alike could see it. Then Homebound Librarian Leslie Morrissey had been appointed the overall Centennial Celebration Committee Chairperson. She gathered five people to help her with the idea of the Centennial Quilt. I was the cataloger at the time and volunteered to head up the sub-committee. Thank goodness, Elizabeth Henry and Shirley Ladetto took the actual seams of the quilt project and pieced together a group of 40 quilters who wished to be part of this immortalization of the split from Sandwich and the birth of Bourne in 1884.



After countless months pouring over archived pictures, reading postcards, and looking in old books to see what might be the most important events and places in the history of the town, thirty items were

chosen from an original list of 50+. It was a difficult decision, but we think we managed finally to use pictures of events and items which represented all the interesting (and sometimes forgotten) aspects of Bourne, from the cranberry harvest to The Flying Dutchman; from Pocasset to the Town Seal. Once we had finished arguing (no, discussing!) what we would use, the art teachers at the high school were asked to create their idea of the scenes we mentioned-some of which had very few pictures to go by. Kenneth Carson and Charles Billard, Jr. spent many a night trying to get it "just right" so that not only were the depictions accurate, but they would also be fairly easy to quilt, as some of our volunteers, despite their enthusiasm for the project, had only a rudimentary idea of how to do pictorial applique.




Thank goodness, Liz and Shirley were on hand for many coaching sessions. We met for the initial distribution of the pictures (which were later gathered into a printed "coloring book" which was sold to help with fund-raising for the Centennial Celebration); we met when folks needed some help with placement of colors; we met to construct the entire quilt after we had met to decide on the border and the actual quilting. Through it all, Liz and Shirley kept their sanity and ours! They were responsible for the beautiful quilting and piecing the cranberry border which runs around the entire quilt. Finally, it was finished and given to the town as a birthday present.

The only problem was that it was too large to hang anywhere in the town offices. The other problem was how to keep it from fading and becoming threads of its former self in all the years we hoped it would remain a symbol of community involvement Again, library personnel (or their and pride. husbands!) to the rescue. After several years of the quilt being kept carefully in a box for want of a good home, a solution appeared. To the rescue--then-Chairwoman of the Library Trustees, Penny Cartier, whose husband Ray was a carpenter. He spent a goodly amount of time looking at frames, imagining frames, and pardon my saying so, cussing frames until he finally figured out how to encase the quilt so that it could hang, be seen, and be preserved for the next 100 years as well. Having built the case, there still remained the issue of where to hang Someone finally said—why not the "new" library? We had just moved into our new home on Sandwich Road in April 1987 and the program room walls were blank. It was the perfect spot for the town's community quilt and so it remains today—a symbol of spirited women and men who wanted to make sure Bourne would always be seen as the varied and beautiful place that it is.
