Window Restoration

Keeping an old building in good shape can be an adventure! On September 3, restoration work will begin on the windows in the 1907 portion of the building. We are very excited to be moving ahead with this project, which was scheduled two years ago. Vendors who work on restoring historical details are in high demand so we are lucky to have a highly qualified company able to make time for us this year.

Nothing is changing - they're going to be replacing rotten and damaged pieces of the woodwork and fixing the mechanisms that allow the windows to open. The result will be better looking, more energy efficient windows that we can actually use! However, there will be some short-term interruptions. The restoration company will need to do some offsite work, so the windows will be boarded up for approximately 6-8 weeks. The Walker and Reading Rooms, along with some staff offices, will be unusable for at least the first week or so of the work, possibly longer. We will keep you up do date on what spaces are available as we know more.


Monthly Phone Wallpaper

How does this book club work? You choose your own book to read, based on the monthly theme, and then join us for a casual and fun conversation. Everyone is welcome!




In Stitches - August 6, 13, 20, 27

Early Families of Kennebunkport - August 7

Author Fred Boyle, 94, will be at KFL on Wednesday, August 7



at 6:00 p.m. to discuss his latest book *Early Families of Kennebunkport, Maine*.

This new book shows the prominent families in the period of Kennebunkport's growth as a fishing and shipbuilding community, Unlike previous books in the Early Families series it will follow families up to 1850. Among the prominent families are those of Downing, Durrell, Fairfield, Goodwin, Huff, Hutchins, Lord, Merrill, Miller, Perkins, Walker and many others.

Fred Boyle, a native of Boston, MA grew up in nearby Medford. He graduated from Medford H.S. 1947, Colby College (A. B.), 1951, Boston U. School of Education (M. in Ed.) 1952 and Harvard School of Education (C.A.G.S.), 1969. After a threeyear enlistment in the U.S. Army he taught high school 1955-1985., his last twenty years at Lexington (MA) High School where he was a master teacher. His first book of genealogy was *Early Families of Sanford-Springvale, Maine*. Besides writing *Folsom Genealogy, Vol. IV* and *Hatevil Nutter of Dover*,

NH he has written a number of York Co. town genealogies, the last, his 8 th in the series, *Early Families of Kennebunkport, Maine.*



Camp KFL! - August 13



New England Natives with the Center for Wildlife (Adults Only) - August 21

On Wednesday, August 21 at 6:00 p.m., the Center for Wildlife will be at the Kennebunk Free Library with some of their non-releasable animal ambassadors for an adults-only educational program. Get to know these beautiful animals and the amazing work that the Center for Wildlife does every day, while sipping beer in our cozy Parsons Reading Room. This program is restricted to adults ages 21 and up.

Focusing on animals that live in New England, we will provide an in-depth introduction to the unique differences between raptors, reptiles, and mammals. Do snakes have fur? Do rabbits have scales? Are birds "cold-blooded"? Why do opossums have pouches? How do each of these animal groups adapt to our changing seasons? Using our amazing

non-releasable animal ambassadors and interactive displays, the answers to these and other questions will be revealed. This hour long program will connect the audience with these beautiful ambassadors of their species as well as provide their natural and personal histories and empower audience members to help to steward the environment that we all share.

The Center for Wildlife is a nonprofit wildlife rehabilitation organization in Cape Neddick, ME that cares for over 2,400 injured and orphaned wildlife every year. Thirty years since its inception, the Center for Wildlife is the largest wildlife medical facility in northern New England, serving a 100-mile radius in southern Maine and New Hampshire. "The Center for Wildlife's Vision is to instill a sense of understanding, responsibility, and compassion for our natural world leading to a society connected to nature and empowered to take action, and we do this through conservation medicine, environmental education, community empowerment, and advocacy."

Session Four is: The Importance of Legacy Work: What to Do, and Where to Start - Writing Your Own (or Someone Else's) Obituary.



Relying heavily on James R. Hagerty's book, Yours Truly: An Obituary Writer's Guide to Telling Your Story, we will discuss tips for telling your own story and preserving your personal history in a meaningful and engaging way in your obituary.

Fiction Book Discussion - August 27

Join us on Tuesday, August 27 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *Hello Beautiful* by Ann Napolitano. Because of the current interruption in interlibrary loan services, KFL will have limited copies to borrow.

"Napolitano (Dear Edward) explores the meaning of love and family with this striking story of four Chicago sisters and the young man who enters their lives. William Waters, a basketball player from outside Boston, enrolls at Northwestern in 1978 on an athletic scholarship. After he starts dating fellow student Julia Padavano, he's embraced by Julia's three younger sisters—Sylvie, a romantic searching for a great love affair; Cecelia, an aspiring artist; and Cecelia's earnest and quiet twin, Emeline—and is delighted to find a loving and loud family so different from his own, his parents having grown taciturn after his older sister's death years before. William and Julia marry, while the

unmarried Cecelia gets pregnant at 17, Sylvie presses on with a job at a library, and Emeline works at a daycare where she fosters a crush on a coworker. After one character attempts suicide, the bonds of the expanding family are tested, and the Padavano women reexamine the limits of how much they're willing to sacrifice. The author breathes great life into her characters, and brings insight into their quiet moments as they gradually come into their own. This will move readers. "-Publishers Weekly






Chill Gaming: Super Smash Bros - August 8






and build new and imaginative creations or ask the librarian for a challenge to complete. All Lego blocks will be supplied; please leave yours at home. Registration is appreciated.

Her exhibit in Kennebunk features big, colorful paintings done in oil and in gouache.

Tomorrow, and Tomorrow, and Tomorrow by Gabrielle Zevin

This July selection for the KFL Adult Book Discussion did not disappoint. When this book came out with little fanfare in 2022, it took word of mouth to be noticed. The author, in her own modern literary style takes the reader into a world that in my case, I had never been, gaming and game creation. Complex, interweaving, traumatic and poetic at times, I enjoyed every chapter. I loved the character development, even the bit players. I wanted to shake the protagonists Sadie and Sam as they let miscommunication and assumptions hurt and divide them. My favorite read this year so far. (Available as a book from KFL, audio through Libby.)

Frozen River by Ariel Lawhon

Based on the diary entries of Martha Ballard, a midwife in the 18th century in Maine, the author tells a good story. A murder and a rape reveal the ugly underside of a Puritan community in what was then part of Massachusetts. Don't look for literary writing but I did enjoy the view into life at that time in our history. (Available book from KFL, audio and book through Libby.)

The Women by Kristin Hannah

Fans of Kristin Hannah will love it and haters will hate it. People like me that appreciate her ability to tell a story will like it. As a child during the Vietnam War, I was very interested to hear about what was happening "in country" while we heard the news that we were winning and nightly body counts. What the government wanted us to hear. The reality that the combat nurses and doctors faced is tragically explained as well as the trauma of coming home and being shamed and disrespected. (Available as a book and audio cds from KFL, audio and book through Libby.)

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
