Library Tidbits: The Book Drop

Have you ever pulled up to our book drop and noticed a closed sign? Have you wondered why? The book drop is made of two parts - the outer shell has a wheeled cart inside. When you drop your materials into the metal slots, they fall down into the appropriate side of the cart. Three times each day, staff brings the cart inside the library to unload. Luckily, we have a second option. On the left side of the main entrance door, there's a small door that leads to an indoor book drop (pictured below). If the drive-through book drop is closed when you arrive, you can use the back-up drop.

There are a few things we would like you to know about the book drop...

It fills up fast! On holiday weekends, we assign a staff member to come in to empty the drop on Sunday or Monday. Even with that precaution, it can sometimes be

too full. If you are having trouble getting an item in the door, please do not force it. When there are too many books, they act as a lock for the cart, making it impossible to remove it. When that happens, it takes multiple staff members and a lot of time to try to wiggle books out from the top in an effort to free it. It can cause items to fall behind the cart and get damaged and frequently causes injuries to staff.

Media, like DVDs and audiobooks, and books go into the two different slots for a reason. The bottom of the cart has springs so it sinks as more books are added, minimizing the distance each item has to fall. Still they all land in one big pile. If light things and heavy things went into the same compartment, the light things would inevitably get squished. That's why we ask that some delicate items not be put in the book drop at all.

We have one other favor to ask. If you are pulling into the book drop lane and a staff member is emptying the book drop, please don't pull around us. It's a safety hazard and makes us nervous. It only takes us a minute to get the cart in and out. Please wait until we clear the road before pulling through.

We appreciate your help in making the book drop as safe and convenient as it can be for patrons, staff, and the books!




Monthly Phone Wallpaper

Kennebunk Free Library and the Camden Conference present Bill Hall at KFL on Monday, December 2 at 6:00 p.m. to discuss Ukraine and the Survival of Democracy in Europe.

The outcome of Russia's invasion of Ukraine seems a bellwether for the survival of democracy in Europe. This talk will examine democracy's status and prospects in eastern/central Europe as it relates to Ukraine's future as an independent nation. A solidly democratic neighborhood for Ukraine would strengthen Ukraine's position in the fight and in the eventual peace talks – and perhaps restrain Moscow from further attempts to rebuild the Russian empire.

Bill was an intelligence officer for the US Air Force, serving on active duty from 1969 until 1999, much of that time overseas - in Asia, Europe, and

the Middle East. He grew up in Virginia and received a bachelor's degree in politics from Princeton University and a master's degree in foreign affairs from the University of Virginia. Bill is on the board of the Camden Conference and a past president of the World Affairs Council of Main. He and his wife, Nancy, live on Peaks Island.





Fiction Book Discussion - December 10

Join us on **Tuesday, December 10** at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *A Piece of the World* by Christina Baker Cline. The Fiction Book Discussion does not meet in November, and meets on the 2nd Tuesday of December instead.

"The world of the woman immortalized in Andrew Wyeth's haunting painting Christina's World is imagined in Kline's (Orphan Train) intriguing novel. The artist meets Christina Olson in 1939 when he summers near her home in Cushing, Maine, introduced by Betsy James, the young woman who knew the Olsons and would become Wyeth's wife. The story is told from Christina's point of view, from the moment she reflects on the painting; it then goes back and forth through her history, from her childhood through the time that Wyeth

painted at her family farm, using its environs and Christina and her brother as subjects. First encountering Christina as a middle-aged woman, Wyeth saw something in her that others did not. Their shared bond of physical infirmity (she had undiagnosed polio; he had a damaged right foot and bad hip) enables her to open up about her family and her difficult life, primarily as a shut-in, caring for her family, cooking, cleaning, sewing, and doing laundry—all without electricity and despite her debilitating disease. Hope of escape, when her teacher offers her the chance to take her place, was summarily quashed by her father. Her first and only romance with a summer visitor from Boston has an ignoble end when he marries someone in his social class. Through it all, the author's insightful, evocative prose brings Christina's singular perspective and indomitable spirit to life." – Publishers Weekly



Drop-In Block Printing - December 10



Author Talk: Holly Margeson Gamache and Steve Hrehovcik - December 17

Author, Holly Margeson Gamache, M.Ed. and illustrator, Steve Hrehovcik will be at Kennebunk Free Library on Tuesday, December 17, 2024 at 6:00 p.m. to discuss their book *Mr. Grievely: A Story of Grief and Love.*

The author and illustrator will pair in discussing their collaboration and creation of the work. Gamache will read this unique and hopeful story of grief personified, while Hrehovcik displays his beautiful and emotive original enlarged digital images which bring the character and descriptions of one person's journey with grief to life.

Holly Margeson Gamache holds a BA in Creative Arts from Bradford College and an M.Ed in Curriculum Design and Instruction from Northeastern University. Gamache published a short epic poem in 2023 titled, *Mr. Grievely: A Story of Grief and Love*, born from personal grief in the wake of the passing of both of her parents within three months of one another in 2019.

Since "retiring" in 2018 with a career of 35 plus years as a middle school performing arts teacher and children's choral director, she continues her love for instruction in higher education, designing and instructing curriculum for workshops and courses in creativity and communication. Music, theater, writing and photography are some of her favorite interests. Holly is also privileged to participate as a member of the *Center for Grieving Children* since 2023 and proud to have served as a Commissioner of the Advisory Board of Wells Parks and Recreation for 15 years.

Her greatest blessings are her loving husband, Ralph, their family and friends and beloved Beagle, Bailey and Siamese Cat, Willie. She is grateful to live in the incredibly resilient and beautiful state of Maine.


Steve Hrehovcik is an award-winning artist and designer, with illustrations and graphic art appearing in numerous books, magazines, newspapers and business publications. His


Beadcraft - December 4

RecipeTin eats dinner: 150 recipes for fast everyday meals by Nagi Maehashi.

When I saw this book returned in the book drop, I knew I had to order it. Great pictures, easy to follow directions and usually using ingredients already on hand. This was perfect to get me out of a dry spell of not knowing what to cook.
