
Reader's Choice Book Club - January 10

Nonfiction Book Group - January 10



Join us on Monday, January 10 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *The Library Book* by Susan Orlean. The discussion will be held in person at the library. Masks are required inside the building.

"New Yorker staff writer Orlean (Rin Tin Tin) doubles as an investigative reporter and an institutional historian in this sprawling account of the 1986 fire at the Los Angeles Central Public Library . On April 29, 1986, just before 11 a.m., a fire broke out in the stacks of the main branch and burned for seven hours, destroying 400,000 books and damaging hundreds of thousands more. Harry Peak, the man police believed started the fire, was arrested but never charged. Orlean's investigation into the fire—

Was it arson? Why would Peak, a struggling actor and frequent patron of the library , want to burn it down?—leads her down the library 's aisles of history, as she seeks out books on the flawed science of arson forensics along with titles from California serial killer Richard Ramirez's reading list to better understand the minds of psychopaths. Along the way, she introduces readers to California Public Library system staffers, among them Arin Kasparian, on the circulation desk; Kren Malone, director of the main branch; and Glen Creason, a senior librarian whose tenure spans 'the fire the AIDS crisis, which killed 11 librarians.' Midway through, Orlean reveals her own motivation for her return to long-form journalism: her mother's dementia has made her acutely aware of how memories are doomed to be forgotten unless they're recorded. This is a persuasive reminder of the importance of libraries, whose shared spaces house historical treasures built with the common good in mind." (Publishers Weekly, vol 265, issue 28)

Author Steve Hrehovcik - January 12



With persistence, patience and pluck, Kennebunk writer/artist Steve Hrehovcik reveals how he became an expert on survival in his book *Rebel Without A Clue – A Way-Off Broadway Memoir*. Blending a candid confessional with a sense of humor, Hrehovcik describes his turbulent, often farcical, journey in a desperate search for a career in the theater. Hrehovcik makes a presentation about his book at the Kennebunk Free Library on Wednesday, January 12 at 6:00 p.m.

Never giving up, his story also reveals how he managed to carry on with some semblance of dignity and achieve a few surprising triumphs along the way – most important, a marriage of 55 years, three remarkable children and a wonderful grandson. At the end of each chapter Hrehovcik includes a cartoon drawing,

adding fun to the theme of his story.

In addition to reading from his book and showing the cartoons, Hrehovcik discusses some of the advantages of self-publishing as part of his presentation.

A note from the presenter:

After a lifetime of east coast living, from Washington DC to Maine, I spent the last seven years living in Southern California. It was there that I joined Ojai Valley Improv. We performed occasionally at the local arts center, but more often we would get together for a couple of hours every Saturday morning to learn new games and practice our craft, such as it was. We were a group of people who enjoyed laughing together and supporting each other as our improv skills grew.

Improv is based on listening and responding to your partner ("Yes and...") and creating a story together from scratch. It is usually funny, but can also be serious. As long as it is unscripted, it's improv. This class will start by using simple games that build the skills needed to create a short scene or story.

I saw the error of my ways and returned to Maine this fall. When I'm not doing improv, I am a pediatric occupational therapist working with preschoolers. Let me tell you, improv is the name of the game when encouraging hesitant children to engage in adult directed activities...so I guess you could say that I am almost always doing improv!

I am looking for a group of people here in the Kennebunk area who would like to learn and/or expand their improv skills in an accepting and supportive environment. You don't have to be funny to do improv, but you do need to like having fun! Beginners and experienced improvisers are welcome and encouraged. Take Note - January 24




Take Note will meet on Monday, January 24 at 2:00 p.m. in the Walker Room at the library.

Speers Gallery

The Kennebunk Free Library announces its January 2022 Speers Gallery exhibit "Through the Mind's Eye" by John Forssen. The exhibit features oil paintings of land and seascapes, many featuring a variety of birds.

John is a Kennebunk artist and frame-maker who has been engaged in some form of art for over 70 years. Following his retirement from teaching in 2008, he began drawing seriously and eventually painting with oils.

His work is inspired by what he sees in the natural



world around him —but only after it has rolled around in his imagination for a while. While he admires "plein air" painting, he begins in his studio, rummaging through his memory for possibilities and then bringing them to life on canvas, layer by layer. He likes to begin his work days at 4:30 am because, as he says, "that's when the muse is waiting for me."

John's drawings have brought several best-in-category awards in Art Guild-of-the-Kennebunk shows, and he has exhibited at the Kennebunk Free Library, the former Whitney Gallery, River Tree arts, The Brick Store Museum, Artists-by-the-Sea in Biddeford Pool and the Gallery at York Hospital. He prices his paintings, along with his custom frames, to remain accessible to a wide audience.


<u>Block printing kits;</u> <u>Block Print Magic</u> by Emily L Howard and <u>Block Print</u> by Andrea Lauren
