Harvest Fest Book Sale

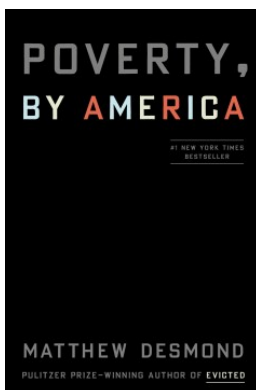


Monthly Phone Wallpaper

Drop-In Block Printing - October 8

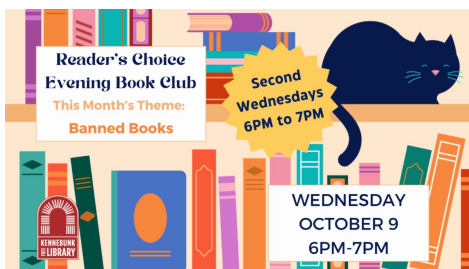

Ukulele Group - October 9

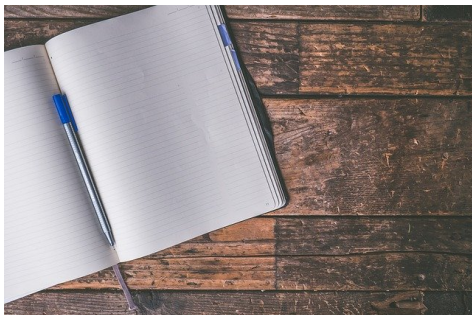

The Maine 6: How Six Pet Dogs Were Trained to Hunt Invasive Species - October 15

On Tuesday, October 15 at 6:00 p.m., dog trainer Melissa McCue-McGrath will be at the Kennebunk Free Library to share the story of how six local pets were trained to hunt an invasive species.



In April of 2023, researchers at Texas Tech and Virginia Tech teamed up to run a proof-of-concept study - could pet dogs around the U.S. be trained to find one of the most environmentally damaging invasive species, the spotted lantern fly (SLF)? SLF is presently in 17 states, including New York and Massachusetts, and leaves the environment looking like "scorched earth without the fire." It's predicted to be in Maine by 2026. When the study started in May, Maine was absent from the roster.

Local dog trainer, Melissa McCue-McGrath, received an email in November. The researchers were looking for a second cohort of dogs and trainers to complete the study that winter. Six dogs enrolled in McCue-McGrath's scent work classes at the Animal Welfare Society in Kennebunk were tapped to represent Vacationland in the study. These pet dogs, already trained to find a variety of oils on a q-tip

for fun, pivoted their focus to save the environment.

They were shipped dead SLF eggs, packed them in a Pokemon lunchbox, and got to work. This presentation describes the six teams' journey helping researchers across the country, how they trained their dogs to find SLF, and the challenges they overcame training in a brutal Maine winter as another environmental threat - climate change - threatened their plans.

Melissa McCue-McGrath grew up in an accidental sled dog family in Midcoast Maine. She spent most of her 20 years training dogs and working challenging behavior cases in Boston, Massachusetts. In 2015 she wrote *Considerations for the City Dog*, a book targeting the urban dogs and families who are left out of conventional training books, and has spoken internationally on the subject. She's given up the conveniences of ride shares to come back home to Maine. Melissa's family resides with two ancient cats, fourteen bougie chickens, and Captain Love, one of the dogs involved in a nationwide study on training pet dogs to detect invasive species.

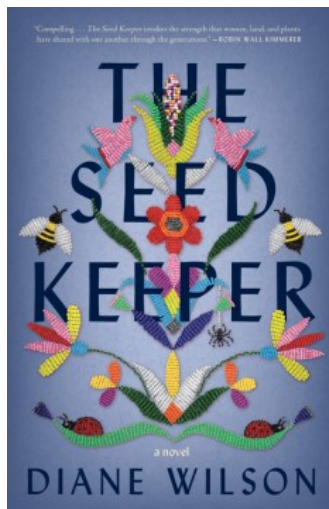
Voting and Other Acts of Civil Engagement in Maine's Immigrant Community - October 21

The Camden Conference and KFL present Georges Budagu Makoko at the Kennebunk Free Library on Monday, October 21 at 6:30 p.m.

Makoko will discuss recommendations on how we all can support the immigrant community to become more civically engaged citizens and will highlight the benefits that come from this process. He will share his experiences of growing up in the Great Lakes region of Central Africa, which includes the Democratic Republic of Congo, Burundi, and Rwanda; and will compare the forms

of governance in this region of Africa to our democratic processes in the United States.

Makoko is the founder of Ladder to the Moon Network and co-founder of Amjambo Africa. He was born in the Democratic Republic of Congo and moved to Rwanda in 1994 due to political unrest. He is the author of *Ladder to the Moon: Journey from the Congo to America*, a book about his life. He is currently the Director of Residential Services at Serenity Residential Care. He serves as a motivational speaker and professional interpreter, and speaks more than six languages, including English, French, Swahili, Kinyarwanda, Kirundi, Lingala and Kinyamulenge.



Fiction Book Discussion - October 22

Join us on Tuesday, October 22 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Seed Keeper* by Diane Wilson

"Wilson's deeply moving debut novel (after the nonfiction narrative *Beloved Child: A Dakota Way of Life*) unfurls the complex story of Rosalie Iron Wing and her search for connection to her family, her people, and the land. The novel opens with the voice of the Dakota people's seeds, passed down through generations ("We hold time in this space, we hold a thread to infinity that reaches all the way to the stars"). Rosalie's sole friend as a teen, Gaby Makepeace, is a strong young woman whose auntie teaches Rosalie about the bonds shared by Dakota women. At 18, pregnant and married to John, a white man, Rosalie tries to make a life for herself on John's farm, whose family founded it on land stolen from her ancestors, and whose inorganic

farming practices alienate Rosalie from anti-GMO activist Gaby. Decades later, after John dies from cancer, Rosalie returns to her father's cabin where she grew up. While struggling to survive through a brutal winter, Rosalie delves into stories of her family's painful past, often shaped by dehumanizing interventions from the U.S. government. Wilson offers finely wrought descriptions of the natural world, as the voice of the seeds provides connective threads to the stories of her people. This powerful work achieves a deep resonance often lacking from activist novels, and makes a powerful statement along the way." -- Publishers Weekly



Join us at Kennebunk Free Library on Monday, October 28 from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. for the sixth session in the Die Well Death Education Series with host Leona Oceania. You are welcome to attend one or all of the sessions - no registration is required.

In Session Six, we will discuss MAID: Medical Aid in Dying; focusing primarily on Maine's Death with Dignity Act. This is the process by which competent and terminally ill state residents who are within 6 (six) months of death may legally obtain oral prescription medication for which they may voluntarily take without assistance to peacefully end their life.

Obstacles to Democracy in Central Africa - October 30

The Camden Conference and KFL present Luc Kuanzambi at the Kennebunk Free Library on Wednesday, October 30 at 6:00 p.m.

Luc immigrated from the Democratic Republic of the Congo and has lived in the United States since 2017. He is the founder and Managing Director of Xenos Communications Consulting, LLC, a Strategic Communications Company based in Portland, Maine that caters to the needs for Immigrant-related Public Affairs and Culture Brokering.

Luc is the Producer and Host of *Luc's 2 Cents Podcast* – a thought-provoking intellectual platform that amplifies immigrants' intellectual opinions on sociopolitical issues and specializes in immigrant narratives in America's media landscape. He is also a sought-after public speaker with riveting views on immigrant communities, historical underpinnings of the influx of immigrants in Maine, DEI, and cross-cultural exchanges.

Luc has under his belt a decade in international diplomacy as a former senior foreign staffer of the South African Department of International Relations and Cooperation. As a member of the political office of the South African Embassy in the Congo, Luc has had inextricable exposure to African Heads-of-State, senior diplomats, defense attachés, captains of industries, and faith leaders.

Luc also worked in the private sector. He held the junior executive portfolio for Stakeholder Relations and Reputation Management at Vodacom Congo, a TelCo company subsidiary of the British multinational TelCo giant Vodafone. In Maine, Luc has successively been Lead Navigator for the Congolese Community Association of Maine; Community and Cultural Ambassador for Hannaford Supermarket; Emergency Rental Assistance Certifier for ProsperityME; Children Behavioral Health Care Coordinator/Cultural Broker for Spurwink.

Luc and his wife, Paulette, pastor a Sunday school church program in Westbrook Maine, including their two sons and one daughter. A dropout from Northeastern University where he was studying Data Analytics, Luc has a BA in Divinity from the Centre Universitaire de Missiologie in the Congo.

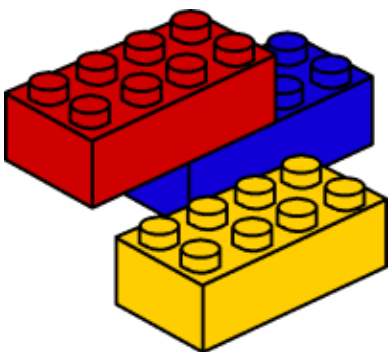
Meet and Greet with Pete the Cat - October 17

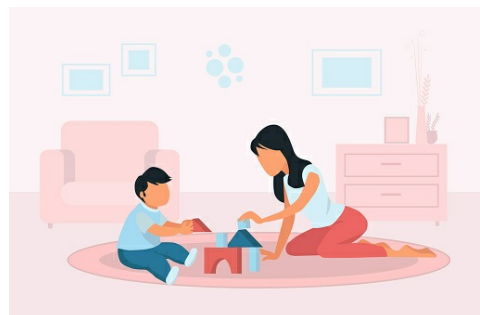

How to Read a Book: A Novel by Monica Wood

Another finely crafted story by this Maine author brings unlikely people together in a tale of forgiveness. A young woman from rural Maine who is recently released from prison is dropped off at a furnished apartment in Portland. The rent is paid for one year and she is told the family wants nothing more to do with her. While in prison, she met a retired English teacher that volunteered to lead an inmate book group, and they run into each other at a bookstore. To complete the "it's a small world" series of events, the bookstore handyman recognizes the ex-inmate from the trial for the killer of his wife. I loved these three characters and the sweet story of redemption for each of them. (Available from KFL as a book, from Libby as an eBook and audio, Minerva as a book, audio cd and mp3.)

Mills on the Mousam: a history of the Mousam River in Alfred, Sanford, Shapleigh, Springvale and Wells/Kennebunk by Joseph W. Hardy

I guess I always took the Mousam River for granted. My cousins and I would walk to the river behind my grandmother's house in West Kennebunk and have adventures. As an adult, I have enjoyed canoeing and kayaking on the river. Roger's Pond is a local treasure, and I am often drawn to visit the river year-round. I can't cross over the Main St. bridge or climb the stairs at Lafayette Center without gazing out on this beautiful river. It wasn't until I wanted to look up whether Bunganut Pond really means "place of many rocks" and it does, that I learned of the history of this river. The author takes us from what the river provided Native Americans through the Colonial Period, from 1600 to 1770; the time of the Small Mill, from 1750 to 1850; and the Manufacturing Era, from 1850 to 1930. The author did meticulous research and provided plenty of photos and maps. This is a wonderful book to learn about our town's history. (Available as a book from KFL and Minerva.)

National Geographic Kids, Joan of Arc, The Teenager Who Saved Her Nation by Philip Wilkinson

This is another title from KFL's Children's Department. Though I have read several biographies about St. Joan, including my favorite by Mark Twain, I can appreciate the brevity, illustrations, timeline and factual presentation of her story. This is one in a series and KFL has issues about rocks, myths, space travel, bugs, robotics, road trip atlas, sharks, etc. Just a reminder that if you want to learn about something fast with lots of pictures...think juvenile. (Available as a book from KFL and Minerva has more titles.)

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
