In Stitches - September 5, 12, 19, 26



Understanding Gender and Sexuality - September 11 and 25



In September, the Kennebunk Free Library will host the final two sessions of "Understanding Gender and Sexuality," a workshop series with Christine Caulfield of Mainetransnet.

In a time of rapid change and controversy concerning gender and sexuality, this workshop's aims are to present basic terminology that will help clarify participants' understanding of gender and sexual identities, the different perceptions and origins of these identities, to explore and discuss sources and impacts of discrimination against gender non-conforming people, especially within the younger population, and lastly, how to understand and improve one's role as an ally/supporter of those within the

LGBTQ community. It will include presentations and discussion of the content, some exercises, and no quizzes or homework. It will also provide some print, online, and other sources for those who wish to develop a broader understanding of what is covered.

Session 2 on Monday, September 11 at 6:00 will cover: An Inquiry into the LGBTQ+ Community/Experience within US society, foundational terms and definitions/descriptions, identities, impacts of discrimination, current issues

Session 3 on Monday, September 25 at 6:00 will cover: How to Be an Effective Ally, allyship approaches, interactions, and awareness, issues facing allies today, closing questions/discussion

Christine Caulfield is currently a volunteer at Mainetransnet, a statewide non-profit supporting transgender people in many capacities, as well as its Co-Chair of the 35+/Elder Caucus, facilitating programming, support, and events for transgender people over the age of 35. She is a former public high school teacher of twenty-two years, teaching history, civics and government, several electives, AP courses and a teamtaught course that explored the origins of power and privilege in US history. She is a parent of two adult daughters, and a very proud grandparent of three. She has a great deal of experience teaching workshops on various topics, as well as participating in discussion and training panels as a representative of the transgender community. In the summer of 2022, her testimony was key in the passing of the name change bill by the Maine State Legislature, which ended the requirement for the public notice of name changes in whatever contexts, protecting people who change their names from harassment, discrimination, and violence. Just recently, she joined the Greater Portland Health's Board of Directors, which serves over 50,000 patients in the Portland area, almost all within the homeless, immigrant and BIPOC, and LGBTQ+ populations.

KFL Writers' Group - September 19





Adult Book Discussion - September 26



Join us on Tuesday, September 26 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Orchardist* by Amanda Coplin.

"Coplin's mesmerizing debut stands out with its depictions of uniquely Western personalities and a stark, gorgeously realized landscape that will settle deeply into readers' bones. In the early twentieth century, Talmadge lives alone amid his huge spread of fruit trees in Washington's Wenatchee Valley. He remains haunted by his teenage sister's disappearance some 50 years earlier, so when two 'raggedy, smudge-faced' girls appear on his land, untrusting, hungry, and pregnant, he feels immediately protective of their safety. Jane and Della have just escaped a terrible

situation, and Talmadge aims to do right by them, but tragedy results when their former captor and his thugs come calling. He and a kindly neighbor guide Jane's daughter, Angelene, into young adulthood, and the tender affection this improvised family shares isn't diminished by their reluctance to speak their minds. The prose abounds with poetic imagery, and the quotation-mark-free dialogue, which could seem like an affectation in a different type of story, emphasizes the melding of these solitary characters with the vast, wild place they choose to call home." -- Johnson, Sarah (Booklist, vol 108, number 21,


Thursday Family Fun Play

Speers Gallery

September Artist: Nora Ordway

The Speers Gallery at the Kennebunk Free Library presents "Hands That Fashion Our World", a photography exhibit by Kennebunk resident Nora Ordway that runs September 1-30.

Nora's exhibit features 20 photographs of hands of people who work in Maine and "represent the work of hands, all sorts of hands, each pair captured in the hard labor of

living, providing life and support for others." They are, as a result, expressive, as memorable as the work to which they were applied.

In this particular exhibition, she wanted to catch hands at work, hands engaged in activities that would have been part of her grandmother's life and experience. It is, therefore, as recorded in the photographs, a testament to the love between that woman and granddaughter with a camera...a marker of two lives well spent. The range of activity in the exhibit is broad: biscuit-maker, black smith, nurse, broom-maker, a couple of musicians (organ and banjo) among them. Ms. Ordway describes them as salt-of-the-earth professions by salt-of-the-earth individuals.



The broom-maker, in particular, she recalls as a young man from New Jersey who somehow found his way to Wiscasset, Maine, and began quite inexplicably turning straw into a common household tool: *good, solid industry,* her grandmother might have said. Remarkable, though, the slender hands, the long fingers...they're captured in this photo as if poised for the next note on a cello. You can almost hear the song playing in his heart. It is that moment when the broom-making stops, and the imagination begins to hear the music...magnificent!

Such is the work of Nora Ordway whose photos in the broadest sense might be described as a history of moments.

Kennebunk Free Library is happy to display this unique exhibit.

September is <u>Library Card Sign-Up Month</u>. This is a great reminder that your library card provides you with so much more than books. With your library card you can access multiple online platforms: <u>Cloud Library</u> (e-books and e-audiobooks), <u>Comic Plus</u> (digital comics), <u>Kanopy</u> (video streaming), <u>OverDrive</u> (e-books and e-audiobooks), and <u>Digital Maine Library</u> (databases). You can also use your library at another library through the <u>Maine Reciprocal Borrowing Program</u>.

You can also check out an item from our Library of Things. Our collection currently includes a telescope, ukuleles, craft kits, sewing machine, birding backpacks, and sewing needles, or reserve a <u>museum pass</u>. We also have a selection of boards games, video games, and puzzles.

Writers and Lovers - Lily King

This book was read and discussed by the KFL Adult Book Discussion group and was liked by all. We wanted a sequel to continue our relationship with the characters. Casey, as she ages out of her twenties struggles between creativity and the need to earn a living as a waitress. She is dealing with the sudden loss of her mother who died on an adventure in Chile. Her romantic life is a mess as is her housing situation. The author does a great job of taking us through the beautiful and heart wrenching choices and situations that bring Casey into adulthood. Despite difficult topics, I found the book uplifting. (Available from KFL as a book, large print and audiobook.)

Mad Honey by Jennifer Finney Boylan and Jodie Picoult So many patrons told me this is a must read and I completely agree with them. Once again Jodie Picoult explores difficult social issues counterbalancing this by taking us deeply into the life of a beekeeper. The authors came together after Boylan posted her desire to cowrite with Picoult. Together they researched and gave both of their voices to this great novel. Highly recommend. (Available from KFL as a book, audio and on Libby.)

The Fabelmans directed by Steven Spielberg

A fictionalized movie memoir of Spielberg's unique growing up as the only son of a musical and creative mother and a dorky scientist father. As the only Jewish family in the various moves between states to follow his father's work, the boy becomes obsessed with film making which delights his mother and survives his dad's attempts to redirect his interest. A great family story of change, survival, failure and success. (Available from KFL.)

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
