Nonfiction Book Group - April 10

Join us on Monday, April 10 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Ducks: Two Years in the Oil Sands* by Kate Beaton.

"Beaton (Hark! A Vagrant) delivers a masterpiece graphic memoir: an immersive, devastating portrait of the two years she



worked at Fort McMurray and nearby oil sands in northern Canada. In 2005, Beaton, 21 and desperate to pay off her student loans, left her small Nova Scotia town for the booming wilds of an oil operation in Alberta. The human and environmental toll of energy dependence are painstakingly recorded on her Heart of Darkness–like journey: facing relentless sexism and misogyny (she estimates that men outnumber women 50 to 1 at the camps), Beaton moves through a series of gigs—doling out wrenches at 'tool cribs,' desk work in the supply office—and acutely feels the object of intense scrutiny; the crass remarks are endless, and at one point men line up around the building to get a look at the new

girl. When hundreds of ducks become caught in a hazardous waste 'tailings pond' around the time a coworker dies on site, Beaton begins to connect individual and global consequences. While she documents her own traumas, Beaton also steps back to observe how the isolation can transform ordinary people, remarking, for instance, that hearing catcalls delivered in the familiar accent of her Cape Breton home region is especially cutting. The homespun drawings and intuitive pacing capture both the dreariness and occasional splendor of this frozen world, with flashes of the author's trademark humor in the banter between her crusty coworkers. Beaton makes a shattering statement on the costs of ignorance and neglect endemic in the fuel industry, in both powerful discussions of its sociopolitical ramifications and her own keenly observed personal story." (Publishers Weekly, vol 269, issue 15)

Birding with Avian Field Researcher Debbie Lyons - April 24



Join us at the Kennebunk Free Library on Monday, April 24 at 6:00 for an evening full of enlightening data and compelling photographs from birding excursions with Debbie Lyons. Lyons, a Lead Mentor for White Pine Programs, is a Level 2 Tracker and multi-year avian field researcher for the Maine Bird Atlas project. Debbie will share some of the ways she has learned to read the story of the birds' sounds and signs. Get to know our feathered friends and fellow birders a bit more at the library during this informative event. This

program is sponsored by White Pine Programs, the Arundel Conservation Trust, and Kennebunk Free Library.

A seasoned nature-connection mentor, wildlife tracker and kid-loving spirit, Debbie Lyons has a B.S. in Environmental Science from NEC and an M.A. in Environmental Education from UNH. Debbie has been bringing her passion for birds and wildlife tracking to adult and children's programs at White Pine. She gained her naturalist knowledge as a student at White Pine. The last three summers she joined the Maine Bird Atlas team helping to complete the state's 5-year study on all bird populations in the state of Maine. This study included point counts, marsh bird surveys, nightjar surveys, and bird audio analysis.

Haven by Emma Donoghue

Two monks follow a mysterious third monk in the hopes of creating a new religious community and end up on one of the Skellig Islands off the coast of Ireland. Reviews I've read about Haven mention that it can be a tough read but I found that I couldn't put it down. There's a sense of dread and foreboding that never lets up until the very end of the novel, and not necessarily for the reasons you might expect.

Riverman by Ben McGrath

Maybe the closest comparison to this book would be Into the Wild, but McGrath's book about a man traveling the country in a plastic canoe, is as much about the river towns that his subject visits and the loneliness of living a life outside of the mainstream.

Poopsie Gets Lost by Hannah E. Harrison

Sometimes, children's picture books don't need to impart a lesson. They're allowed to just be fun. Poopsie's adventures had my daughter laughing harder than she's laughed in a long time and it has reignited her love of reading books. Poopsie even had the power to make my daughter decline an opportunity to watch tv and read instead.

The Golden Glow by Benjamin Flouw

Maria always picks out great books for our family, and The Golden Glow is no exception. Fox finds that there is no description of the "Golden Glow" plant and sets out to find one for himself. I loved Flouw's illustrations of nature, and the characters were all endearing.

Edward Hopper A National Gallery of Art Presentation

My daughter and I saw the *Sunday Morning* segment on the Hooper exhibit at the Whitney Museum and were so excited we planned a trip to NY City. In preparation for our visit, I borrowed this DVD and we both watched it. We became even more excited. Though the museum itself was wonderful, we met some great people and the overall trip was fantastic, the exhibit was anticlimactic. My advice to you: view this 30 minute DVD and learn the best of this American artist.

Nothing to See Here by Kevin Wilson

Rarely do I reread a book. This is the exception: I am listening to it for the 4^{h} time. It is not literary genius, it is a story of adults that haven't healed from their own childhoods placed in a position of taking care of 10 year old twins with a tragic past and an incredible response to stress. From the crazy cover art to the "unlikely but I want to believe in them characters", I totally enjoy this book. It is a humorous exploration of relationships, from odd-couple friendships to what makes a parent and what definitely does not.
