Library Tidbits

Going forward, we're going to be giving you a little insight each month into the inner workings of the library. For April, we wanted to tell you a little bit about how our digital book/audiobook collections work from our perspective.

As you may know, we offer two e-book platforms: CloudLibrary and Libby. Most libraries in the state participate in CloudLibrary. We all


chip in some money to participate and the State Library does the e-book purchasing. Because there are so many communities contributing income, there are many more titles in the system than any one community could purchase on its own. There is also more competition for the titles in the system. CloudLibrary does not support Kindle Paperwhite use.

Libby is a platform that is exclusively for KFL cardholders. We do all of the purchasing (and paying for purchases) in house. Publishers don't love the idea of libraries sharing e-books so they price them high enough to make it difficult to build a large collection. They may also limit the amount of time that we can keep a book that we purchase to one or two years or to a certain number of checkouts. As an example, lets look at *You Like It Darker*, the new Stephen King book coming out in May. The e-book version costs \$59.99 and we can keep it in our collection for 2 years. The audio book is sold as "one copy/one user," which means that it stays in our collection indefinitely.

But, the cost for that is \$129.99. These are fairly typical costs (e-books range from \$55 - \$75; e-audios from \$80 to \$130) though sometimes we can purchase things on sale and some publishers will allow us to purchase one year of use for half the price.

Our audio book budget is \$3,500. This means that we have to be very selective about what we purchase. If the print version of an item is in high demand, we are more likely to purchase a digital copy. We try to purchase multiple copies of a digital item when there are a lot of holds but sometimes it's cost prohibitive. The good news is that Libby works with Kindle and, because it's only for our cardholders, the wait times are typically shorter than for CloudLibrary items.

We are always happy to chat about our work and are available to answer any questions you might have.



Any supplies not taken will be used by the library for programs, donated to local nonprofits, or recycled.




Die Well Death Education - April 22

Join us on Monday, April 22 from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. for the first session in the Die Well Death Education Series with host Leona Oceania. (This session was postponed from last month due to presenter illness.) You are welcome to attend one or all of the sessions - no registration is required.

Session one is: Why Talk About Death? In this session we will discuss why talking about death is important, and the benefits it can and does provide. We will also review creating an End-of-Life Plan, the importance of legacy work,

hospice & palliative care, as well as funeral and body disposition options. (There are more than you think!)

Die Well Death Education is the passion project of Leona Oceania. Always fascinated with death and baffled by the fact that we don't talk about the one thing that is going to happen to all of us, she decided to do what she could to encourage that conversation. She has trained to become an End-of-Life Doula, a Home Funeral Guide, a Life Legacy Facilitator, and a Death Educator. She also serves on the board of the Funeral Consumers Alliance of Maine, is the facilitator of a number of Death Cafés in Southern Maine, and is a volunteer with a local hospice organization. She has built a bookcase coffin with the prodigious Chuck Lakin, which is currently in use as a bookcase in her living room until it is needed as a coffin.



Fiction Book Discussion - April 23

Join us on Tuesday, April 23 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *Klara and the Sun* by Kazuo Ishiguro.

"Nobel laureate Ishiguro takes readers to a vaguely futuristic, technologically advanced setting reminiscent of his Never Let Me Go for a surprising parable about love, humanity, and science. Klara is an Artificial Friend (AF), a humanlike robot designed to be a child's companion. She spends her days watching humans from her perch in the AF store, fascinated by their emotions and hungry to learn enough to help her future owner. Klara, who is solar-powered, reveres the sun for the 'nourishment' and upholds 'him' as a godlike figure. Klara is eventually bought by teenager Josie and continues to learn about

humans through her interactions with Josie's family and childhood friend. When Josie becomes seriously ill, Klara pleads with the sun to make her well again and confronts the boundary between service and sacrifice. While the climax lends a touch of fantasy, Klara's relationship with the sun, which is hidden at times by smog, touches on the consequences of environmental destruction. As with Ishiguro's other works, the rich inner reflections of his protagonists offer big takeaways, and Klara's quiet but astute observations of human nature land with profound gravity ('There was something very special, but it wasn't inside Josie. It was inside those who loved her,' Klara says). This dazzling genre-bending work is a delight' -Publisher's Weekly

Poet Deidre Braley - April 23

Join Deidre Braley for an evening of poetry on Tuesday, April 23 at 6:00 p.m. at the Kennebunk Free Library as she shares readings and stories from her debut poetry collection, *The Shape I Take*, along with a selection of her other favorite original poems that take an unflinching look at life, love, and learning to make peace with being human.

There are few moments in a person's life that are more emotionally dynamic, physically dramatic, or spiritually charged than those days surrounding the birth of a baby. In *The Shape I Take*, Braley documents those moments in real-time. This collection begins in the dwindling days before the birth of her



child, is swept up into the height of labor and delivery, and finishes with the acute poignancy that is unique to those first postpartum weeks. From predictions for ominous weather and late-night loving to the tension between new life and certain death, the poems in *The Shape I Take* are not your typical reflections on motherhood. Rather, they seek to capture the realities of the anticipation, desperation, and trepidation that come along with bringing a baby into the world: milk-drenched sheets and all.

Questions and conversation will be welcomed, and books will be available for signing and purchase at the event.

Deidre Braley is a freelance writer and editor. A graduate of Presque Isle High School, she now lives in southern Maine with her husband and three children. Her

debut poetry collection, *The Shape I Take*, was released in December 2023 by Bottlecap Press. She is the author and host

behind The Second Cup, a weekly column and podcast that focuses on making peace with being human. Her award-winning poetry has been featured in The Way Back To Ourselves literary journal and Maine Women Magazine, and her essays have appeared in *The Village Magazine*, Aletheia Today, The Joyful Life, and The Truly Co., where she serves as the Editorial Content Director. Author Roy Smoot - April 29

On Monday, April 29 at 6:00 p.m., the Kennebunk Free Library will host author Roy Smoot as he discusses his book *It All Belongs*, written with his late wife Judy Smoot.

In this exquisite dual narrative laced with expressive art, poetry, journaling, and hands-on help, *It All Belongs* offers a unique pairing of perspectives to actively model spiritual tools and

practices helpful for navigating life's inevitable realities and unwanted journeys — while embracing the love, beauty, light, and joy in all our life's moments.

For Judy Smoot, a devastating terminal Glioblastoma Multiforme diagnosis means putting the spiritual practices she has taught so many others to the ultimate, personal test. As an artist, spiritual director, expressive arts teacher, retreat facilitator, and innovator of a non-profit organization supporting people with chronic disease, Judy shows us what it looks like to live fully into our own mortality by living fully into hers. Actively modeling spiritual and expressive arts practices she taught to so many others, Judy lives into her own mortal battle in a way that prompts a friend's observation, "Judy taught us how to live . . . and how to die."

But that's only half the story.

Following Judy's death, *It All Belongs* then invites its readers to journey with Roy, Judy's husband of nearly 40 years, as he struggles to embrace the twin realities of love and grief. With extraordinary vulnerability, Roy offers a rare window into his struggle to learn the rhythms of this bittersweet dance. From the raw angst of navigating immediate day-to-day realities, to deep introspection during a long road trip out west, to culminating awareness on a spiritual quest in lona, Scotland, Roy models the journey through unthinkable darkness to emerging triumphant into a full and abundant life.

Woven into both sides of this honest, beautiful, heartbreaking, and awe-inspiring narrative, readers will discover spiritual tools and practices to equip them and their loved ones for their own inevitable end-of-life realities. In this unique pairing of perspectives laced with exquisite art, poetry, and journaling, *It All Belongs* brings hands-on help for navigating any unwanted life journey to embrace the amazing love, beauty, light, and joy tucked within even our most tragic experiences.

Judy and Roy Smoot met in college at Ohio State University, and were married following graduation. Then they lived and loved for the next four decades in Georgia, Ohio, Florida and Maine. Roy enjoyed a successful banking career. Judy served as a hospice volunteer for 15 years, as a Welstreams spiritual director, as an Expressive Arts Florida Institute certified expressive arts retreat leader. She created a nonprofit to support people living with chronic diagnoses. Later in life, they made their home at "Sunrise Ridge", their cottage and retreat center in the beautiful hills of southeast Ohio.


Furry Tales - April 5



The Speers Gallery at the Kennebunk Free Library presents the exhibit "What Friendship Looks Like in Fabric" by the Creative Eight Quilters. The exhibit runs April 1-30, and the public is invited to a reception on Tuesday, April 9 from 6-7:30 pm.

The Creative Eight Quilters started out as a small group of friends sewing together and learning from each other while sharing laughter, sadnesses, and the occasional trip to the fabric shop (okay, maybe frequent trips to the fabric shop!). The group grew from four original members to eight current members: Eleanor Dickens, Joan Emerson, Jean Irvine, Jane Lovejoy, Judy Morrison, Iola Santerre, Stella Santerre, and Pat Towne. Members live in Kennebunk, Kennebunkport and Biddeford.

Wednesday is their favorite day of the week because they know they will be sewing together. Although the group has changed membership over the years, the group values the friendship and camaraderie that comes with sharing works in progress and sharing their lives with each other. Each quilter brings their own specialty to the group which includes machine long arm quilting, hand quilting, applique, machine piecing and embroidery to their works of art. The Philosophy of Modern Song by Bob Dylan

This is another gem I stumbled across when I needed an audio book. It was available on Libby. Wow, what a treasure trove. Bob Dylan. The poet of a generation points out 66 of the songs he deems important in the last century. Bob Dylan and other entertainers offer commentary of songs I know, others I did not recognize by name and others new to me. Bob Dylan shares his stream of consciousness poetry causing me to look up the song on YouTube. Once I finished the audio version, I ordered the book because I wanted more. (Available from KFL on Libby as audio; from Minerva as a book, audio cd and in Spanish.)

The Comfort of Crows by Margaret Renkl

A lovely, personal diary of life lived with a keen awareness of the natural world that surrounds home. Starting in January, this book strolls through the seasons of nature and reflects on the author's life in her mid-60s. I thoroughly enjoyed the serene tone of the author's voice, her observances, and funny foibles of life. Most chapters include a poem that sets the tone. This is an easy, relaxing and joyful display of the grace and beauty of everyday life. I just learned that in the book there are 52 original color artworks by the author's brother, Billy Renkl. I have ordered a copy. (Available from KFL as a book, Libby as audio,)

Poetry Unbound Pádraig Ó Tuama's podcast: onbeing.org

This isn't the first recommendation I have given about Pádraig's poetry essays. His book *Poetry Unbound 50 Poems to Open Your World* introduced me to his unique method of presenting poetry in a way that, well, opens my world. I am recommending his podcast now. In each episode, he introduces the poet, reads the poem, explores the poem, reads the poem again and then ends with a bit more commentary. Somehow, Pádraig's clarity, relationship and empathy toward the poet's experiences that lead to its creation become real to me. If I am unable to sleep at night, I get up, listen to an episode which includes original music performed by Gautam Srikishan and with my mind refreshed, relaxed, and full I go back to bed and sleep.

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
