### **Nonfiction Book Group - August 10**

The Nonfiction Book group is back! Join us on Zoom on Monday August 10 at 6:30 to discuss Michelle Obama's *Becoming.* 

"The former first lady looks back on an unlikely rise to the top while navigating issues of race and gender in this warmhearted memoir. Obama's narrative is the story of an African-American striver, born to a working-class family in a Chicago ghetto, who got Princeton and Harvard degrees and prominent jobs in law and public relations, attended at every step by the nagging question, 'Am I good enough?' ('Yes I am,' she answers). It's also



about her struggle to keep husband Barack's high-powered political career from subsuming her identity and the placid family life she preferred to the electoral frenzy-she disavows any desire for public office herself-while she weathered misgivings over work-life balance and marital strains that required couples' counseling. Becoming the first lady ratchets up the pressure as Obama endures the Secret Service security bubble, has every public utterance and outfit attacked by opponents, gets pilloried as a closet radical, and soldiers on with healthy-food initiatives. ... There are no dramatic revelations and not much overt politics here, but fans of the Obamas will find an interesting, inspiring saga of quiet social revolutions." 

### **Adult Book Discussion - August 25**

On Tuesday, August 25 at 1:00 p.m., the Adult Book Discussion will be discussing *Homegoing* by Yaa Gyasi via Zoom. A link to the Zoom meeting can be found on our website or our events calendar. Hope to see you there!

"Gyasi's amazing debut offers an unforgettable, page-turning look at the histories of Ghana and America, as the author traces a single bloodline across seven generations, beginning with Ghanaian halfsisters Effia, who is married off to a British colonizer in the 1760s, and Esi, who is captured into the British slave-trading system around the same time. These women never meet, never know of each other's existence, yet in alternating narratives we see their respective



families swell through the eyes of slaves, wanderers, union leaders, teachers, heroin addicts, and more-these often feel like linked short stories, with each descendent receiving his or her own chapter. Esi's descendants find themselves on the other side of the Atlantic, toiling on plantations in the American South before escaping to the North for freedom, while Effia's offspring become intertwined in the Gold Coast slave trade, until her grandson breaks away and disappears to live a simple existence with his true love. In both America and Ghana, prosperity rises and falls from parent to child, love comes and goes, and the characters' trust of white men wavers. These story elements purposely echo like ghosts-as history often repeats itself-yet Gyasi writes each narrative with remarkable freshness and subtlety. A marvelous novel." ### **Recommendations and Messages From Your Librarians**

#### Binti by Nnedi Okorafor

Over the past year I have come to really appreciate novellas, of taking only as much time as you need to tell a story rather than bloating it out to fill the size of a book. *Binti* is not a long read - I read it in a day - but there is a distilled power in those few pages.

*Binti* tells the story of a young woman, the first to leave her remote homeland to attend an offplanet university. It chronicles her trip to the university, which does not go as expected, but the plot was secondary to the vivid, complex character that leaps off the page. Things Happen in the plot, but I care about them *as they happen to Binti*. This is a beautiful book about heritage and history, otherness and similarity, and the power and consequences of communication or lack thereof.

#### Lifting as We Climb by Evette Dionne

August 18, 2020 marks the 100th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th Amendment, which granted women the right to vote. It is surely an event to be celebrated! One way to mark the occasion is to learn about the road to suffrage, a history that goes far beyond Seneca Falls and Susan B. Anthony. Evette Dionne's new book Lifting as We Climb: Black Women's Battle for the Ballot Box provides several of those "I didn't learn that in school!" moments illustrating the work and struggle of numerous Black women toward the fight for voting rights. Dionne shines light on the early merging of the abolitionist and women's suffrage movements, their later divergence and the subsequent exclusion of Black women from bills that would allow only white women to vote, and the work to break the Jim Crow laws designed to keep Black people from the polls. Lifting as We Climb is an eye opening read that helps build context and broader historical accuracy around the story of the 19th Amendment and voting rights. It is geared toward upper middle school and high school readers, but is engaging and informative for adult audiences as well. Written with a lively narrative and dotted with biographical sketches and photographs of the women who helped pave the way to August 1920 and those that continue the work to decrease barriers to the polls today, Dionne's work is timely and needed. And what better time to learn about these often overlooked suffragists than the amendment's centennial this summer?
