Bulb Sale Fundraiser

Just when the town needed cheering up last spring, daffodils bloomed on Summer Street's Land Trust strip and beyond. The glowing daffodils were the result of a community planting of over 3,000 bulbs by the Friends of the Landing last fall, the gloomy fall of 2020. This year Kennebunk Free Library will follow the initiative of the Friends of the Landing by both planting daffodils around the library and encouraging others to both support KFL and purchase daffodils to cheer up their yards and streets. As a new fundraising event for the library, you will be able to order bulbs through KFL's Square store.

There will be a cheerful mix of yellow daffodils and white narcissus that are tall enough (12" – 18") to be seen from a distance. The library will also be offering separate bags of yellow daffodils and white narcissus. The price for all varieties will be five bulbs for \$5.00. All the bulbs will be purchased from Fedco, a Maine based company.

Please place your order before August 4. Pick up will be at the library on Wednesday, October 20. The Kennebunk Free Library hopes the planting of daffodils town wide will "take root" and that Kennebunk will become a "Daffodil Destination" for our visitors and cheer its residents.


book club", and everyone is welcome! Upcoming Meetings:

Nonfiction Book Group - August 9



Join us on Monday, August 9 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Hood Feminism* by Mikki Kendall, the nonfiction Read ME pick for 2021. Check our website calendar or rotating display for the Zoom link. Weather permitting, the discussion may be held outside and in-person. Check the website on the day of the program for details.

"In this collection of essays, Kendall (coeditor, Hidden Youth) explores how feminism has not acknowledged the many ways in which race, class, and sexual orientation intersect with gender. Through a biographical lens, Kendall examines how issues like food security, access to education, safe housing, and health care connect to feminist concerns, and ponders why they

continue to be ignored by mainstream feminists. Reflecting on her experiences being raised by her grandmother, a woman described as a feminist who would never have called herself one, Kendall draws parallels between the unwritten rules she learned growing up and the disconnect many women of color still feel from white feminists. Whether she's discussing pop music, her patriarchal grandfather, or the number of women of color who go missing, Kendall combines her personal experiences with data and statistics to create a compelling narrative and call to action and change. VERDICT A frank account of who and what is still missing from mainstream feminism that will appeal to readers of women's and African American studies, and readers seeking a better grasp on history." Adult Book Discussion - August 24

"Kingsolver's ambitious new novel, her first in nine years (after the The Poisonwood Bible), focuses on Harrison William Shepherd, the product of a divorced American father and a Mexican mother. After getting kicked out of his American military academy, Harrison spends his formative years in Mexico in the 1930s in the household of Diego Rivera; his wife, Frida Kahlo; and their houseguest, Leon Trotsky, who is hiding from Soviet assassins. After Trotsky is assassinated, Harrison returns

to the U.S., settling down in Asheville, N.C., where he becomes an author of historical potboilers (e.g., Vassals of Majesty) and is later investigated as a possible subversive. Narrated in the form of letters, diary entries and newspaper clippings, the novel takes a while to get going, but once it does, it achieves a rare dramatic power that reaches its emotional peak when Harrison wittily and eloquently defends himself before the House Un-American Activities Committee (on the panel is a young Dick Nixon). "Employed by the American imagination," is how one character describes Harrison, a term that could apply equally to Kingsolver as she masterfully resurrects a dark period in American history with the assured hand of a true literary artist." (Publishers Weekly, vol 256, issue 33, p1)




Teen Gaming - August 6, 13, 20, 27


Teen Take-Home Kits - August 2, 9, 16, 23, 30

Exploding Watermelon and S'mores - August 4




Storytime in the Sun - Mondays

Blueberry Love by Cynthia Graubart

August is blueberry season and this book shows 46 ways to enjoy them: breakfast, lunch and dinner with entrees, salad dressing, jam, cocktails and old-fashioned scrub. My list of must-try recipes includes "Make-Ahead Blueberry-Pecan French Toast Casserole, Blueberry and Onion Jam Glaze and Sautéed Pork Tenderloin with Blueberry Balsamic Mustard Glaze". Something for everyone, blueberries for all!

Sigh, Gone: A Misfit's Memoir of Great Books, Punk Rock, and the Fight to Fit In by Phuc Tran

This coming of age memoir begins as Phuc's family leaves war-torn Vietnam in 1975 after the fall of Saigon and starts a new life in Pennsylvania. Phuc's irreverent humor and experiences lets the reader in on just what it was like for he and his family to adapt.

This quote is a good example: "My father loved the library because it was a safe haven for him - no missed cultural cues, no bigoted insults from his coworkers, no glaring reminders of what was lost. All patrons of the library were pilgrims to the oracle all seeking the same thing: knowledge. And in their pursuits of the same thing, they were all equals." During his freshman year of High School, a friend recommends a title by Albert Camus and his appetite for reading is born. Phuc shares what he learned from: The Picture of Dorian Gray -- The Plague -- Crime and Punishment -- The Scarlet Letter -- A Christmas Carol -- Man and His Symbols -- Madame Bovary -- Pygmalion -- The Metamorphosis -- The Importance of Being Earnest -- The Autobiography of Malcolm X -- The Iliad. This book was recommended by my co-worker, Kate and she was right.

The Importance of Being Earnest by Oscar Wilde

KFL has an audio version of this work. It only takes two hours to read/listen to. I had enjoyed listening to this amusing play earlier this spring and was delighted to hear Phuc Tran's thoughts on it in Sigh, Gone. Algernon pretends to be his friend's troublesome younger brother, Earnest, in Wilde's satire of nineteenth-century fashions, manners, and morality. Perfect for a day trip!
