the meeting. The rest of the month, the group will meet in-person inside the library. See our events calendar for more information.


#### Fix-A-Bike - August 2

Carey will take us on a journey far and wide across the beautiful New England landscape on easy pondside

strolls, moderate hill walks and forest forays, and strenuous mountain climbs. Happy and thirsty, our knowledgeable trail guide will also lead us to some of the many outstanding breweries for a pint of really good craft brew. *Beer Hiking New England* will be available for sale and signing.

Carey Kish is a seasoned hiker, outdoors and travel writer, and dedicated beer enthusiast. He has some 20,000 miles of long-distance hiking under his belt, in the U.S., Canada and Europe, including the 2,189-mile Appalachian Trail from Georgia to Maine (twice) and the 2,654-mile Pacific Crest Trail from Mexico to Canada, and perhaps a few beers along the way, to boot. Carey is also the author of *AMC's Best Day Hikes Along the Maine Coast* and the AMC *Maine Mountain Guide*. His hiking and camping column has been a regular in the *Portland Press Herald/Maine Sunday Telegram* Outdoors section for more than two decades.

# **Understanding Gender and Sexuality - August 21**



In August and September, the Kennebunk Free Library will host "Understanding Gender and Sexuality," a workshop series with Christine Caulfield of Mainetransnet.

In a time of rapid change and controversy concerning gender and sexuality, this workshop's aims are to present basic terminology that will help clarify participants' understanding of gender and sexual identities, the different perceptions and origins of these identities, to explore and discuss sources and impacts of discrimination against gender non-conforming people, especially within the younger population, and lastly, how to understand and improve one's role as an ally/supporter of those within the LGBTQ community. It will include presentations and

discussion of the content, some exercises, and no quizzes or homework. It will also provide some print, online, and other sources for those who wish to develop a broader understanding of what is covered.

Session 1 on Monday, August 21 at 6:00 will cover: An Introduction to Concepts, which is a fairly detailed look at the underlying social theories of gender, sex, and sexuality, and how these manifest themselves in US society.

Session 2 on Monday, September 11 at 6:00 will cover: An Inquiry into the LGBTQ+ Community/Experience within US society, foundational terms and definitions/descriptions, identities, impacts of discrimination, current issues

Session 3 on Monday, September 25 at 6:00 will cover: How to Be an Effective Ally, allyship approaches, interactions, and awareness, issues facing allies today, closing questions/discussion

Christine Caulfield is currently a volunteer at Mainetransnet, a statewide non-profit supporting transgender people in many capacities, as well as its Co-Chair of the 35+/Elder Caucus, facilitating programming, support, and events for transgender people over the age of 35. She is a former public high school teacher of twenty-two years, teaching history, civics and government, several electives, AP courses and a team-taught course that explored the origins of power and privilege in US history. She is a parent of two adult daughters, and a very proud grandparent of three. She has a great deal of experience teaching workshops on various topics, as well as participating in discussion and training panels as a representative of the transgender community. In the summer of 2022, her testimony was key in the passing of the name change bill by the Maine State Legislature, which ended the requirement for the public notice of name changes in whatever contexts, protecting people who change their names from harassment, discrimination, and violence. Just recently, she joined the Greater Portland Health's Board of Directors, which serves over 50,000 patients in the Portland area, almost all within the homeless, immigrant and BIPOC, and LGBTQ+ populations.

### Adult Book Discussion - August 22



Join us on Tuesday, August 22 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Midnight Library* by Matt Haig.

"If you could live your life over again, would you make the same choices? Nora Seed is depressed: Her best friend has ghosted her from the other side of the world; she is estranged from her brother; she just got fired; and her cat died. Suicide seems to be the answer, but instead of dying, she awakens in a library of infinite books, all about the lives she could have lived. There she meets her school librarian, who guides her first to her 'Book of Regrets,' where she sees every choice she made, while the rest of the books take her on journeys to visit her potential lives. What if, instead of

quitting the band, she became a rock star? Or instead of leaving school, she became a world-renowned glaciologist? Nora gets to live these alternative lives, the goal being to find the life that will make her happy. But happiness, even in this fantasy, still proves elusive; perhaps that wasn't the goal after all. VERDICT Haig (How To Stop Time) takes readers on a journey of quantum physics that will have them feeling that they actually understand the theory." --Stacy Alesi (Library Journal, vol 145, issue 10, p69)

# August Artist: Suzanne Demeo

Suzanne Demeo grew up in New England and has lived in Massachusetts, Connecticut, and New Hampshire. She received a BFA from the Maryland Institute College of Art and an MS in printing technologies from RIT. After working in the electronic screen-printing industry, she and her husband and 2 small daughters moved to Williamsburg, Virginia. Suzanne was an Adjunct Professor in the William and Mary Art Department for over 20 years and ran USTA junior tennis tournaments at the college tennis facility. After 30 years in Virginia, she and her husband moved to Kennebunk in 2021.



The paintings and drawings on exhibit at the Spears Gallery are a personal record of her travels to visit family over the last several years. Suzanne's parents retired to Nevada's Carson Valley, and she visited often. She took lots of photographs of the Northern Nevada and California landscape along the Sierra Nevada Mountain range. These photographs provided inspiration for a series of drawings and paintings.

Several years ago Suzanne attended a family reunion in the Lake Sunapee region of New

Hampshire. The reunion was held at Pleasant Lake in New London, NH. This part of New England features moss covered rocks, old stone walls and abundant woodland streams. This trip led to another series of creative expressions.

Maine had been a family vacation destination when Suzanne lived in New England. In Maine, it was the rocky coastline that had the greatest appeal. Moving to Kennebunk has provided easy access to Gooch's Beach where she begins her drawings on location, using fine point permanent markers. The work is completed in her studio using photographs as a loose reference.

Ever since Suzanne was a child, she has loved public libraries and is happy to share her visual journey with the public in August.

# **Staff Picks & Messages**

#### Ian, Library Assistant

Faith, Hope, and Carnage by Nick Cave and Sean O'Hagan

Musician Nick Cave hadn't given any major interviews since the death of his 15 year old son in 2015 when he had a series of conversations with the journalist Sean O'Hagan during the pandemic. These were collected into an autobiography of sorts, but one that focuses much more on Cave's philosophies and insights rather than a rundown of facts from his life. Cave writes beautifully about grief, loss, faith, and religion. Even if you're not familiar with Cave's music, it's a rewarding and moving read.

#### Kat, Library Assistant Emeritus

All the Beauty in the World: the Metropolitan Museum of Art and Me – Patrick Bringley

This work memoir was very enjoyable: an inside view of the MMA, exploration of the various galleries and the author's personal journey from Wall Street Investment banking to silent sentry. The death of his younger brother and working through the grief leads to a less frantic career and lifestyle that he manages to maintain through marriage and

parenthood. Audio version is read by the author. A relaxing read is a good summer choice. (Available from KFL as a book, audiobook and on Libby.)

#### Knowing What We Know by Simon Winchester

I stumbled upon this amazing compendium of human knowledge and wisdom because of the immediate need for an audio book. Warming up to the author/reader's academic English voice took some getting used to but I am so glad I persisted! How we learn is explained so well by Simon's early recollection of being stung by a wasp. Ancient knowledge of indigenous peoples is exemplified by the total survival of native people in Thailand during the 2004 Christmas tsunami. We are taken from the first writings of the Phoenicians and the discovery of paper to the Gutenberg printing press, to early word processing and computers of today, completing with a look at AI and where it may take us. So many more topics are discussed in an easily understood manner. Was I overwhelmed?? Heck no! Once I finished, I started all over again for the 14-hour ride. (Available from KFL as a book and on Libby.)

#### The Personal Librarian by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray

Back to my favorite genre of historical fiction, I found this gem. Hired by JP Morgan in 1905 to curate a collection of ancient manuscripts, books and art for his new library, Belle de Costa Green, a Black American women must hide her true race to "pass" as white. She was born in Washington, DC in 1879 and raised in New York City, her early education took place with her father from early childhood with books and spending Saturdays at the MMA. She developed a great curiosity and love of art and literature. A rift tore her parents apart. Mom demanded the family present as white, while dad worked for civil rights. The father left. Ms. Green was trained in cataloguing and reference by working at Princeton University Library starting in 1902.
