*The Sunoculars will be unavailable to lend during the April 2024 solar eclipse for use at the library during this event.




ADULT PROGRAMS

How does this book club work? You choose your own book to read, based on the monthly theme, and then join us for a casual and fun conversation. Everyone is welcome!




Spanish Language Discussion Group -January 8, 22, 29

Trivia Night - January 16



Fiction Book Discussion - January 23

Join us on Tuesday, January 23 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *A Tree Grows in Brooklyn* by Betty Smith.

"From the moment she entered the world, Francie Nolan needed to be made of stern stuff, for growing up in the Williamsburg slums of Brooklyn, New York demanded fortitude, precocity, and strength of spirit. Often scorned by neighbors for her family's erratic and eccentric behavior—such as her father Johnny's taste for alcohol

and Aunt Sissy's habit of marrying serially without the formality of divorce—no one, least of all Francie, could say that the Nolans' life lacked drama. By turns overwhelming, heartbreaking, and uplifting, the Nolans' daily experiences are raw with honestly and tenderly threaded with family connectedness. Betty Smith has, in the pages of *A Tree Grows in Brooklyn*, captured the joys of humble Williamsburg life—from "junk day" on Saturdays, when the children traded their weekly take for

pennies, to the special excitement of holidays, bringing cause for celebration and revelry. Smith has created a work of literary art that brilliantly captures a unique time and place as well as deeply resonant moments of universal experience. Archaeological Drawing with Elizabeth Kelley - January 23

Join us at KFL on Tuesday, January 23, 2024 at 6:00 for an evening with Elizabeth Kelley, Senior Artist for the Cape Porpoise Archaeological Alliance. Archaeological drawing is

an important component of maintaining accurate records of artifacts and features that cannot always be documented by photography alone. In her presentation, Elizabeth will discuss her work with CPAA to include the techniques used to record and interpret the many aspects of archaeological research. Her drawings range from field sketches to rendered drawings of artifacts and interpretations of Precontact landscapes. Elizabeth will also discuss her life-long passion for the Cape Porpoise Archipelago and how it relates to her work.

Elizabeth Kelley is a painter whose passion lies in nature, culture and observational abstraction. Her recent works include drawings and paintings that interpret the geologic formations, trees and landforms of the Cape Porpoise archipelago and surrounding area. In 2019, Elizabeth was invited by the Cape Porpoise Archaeological Alliance (CPAA) to visually document the excavation and conservation of a 700-year-old dugout canoe. She now serves as CPAA's Senior Artist. With drawings published in the Journal of Island and Coastal Archaeology, the Maine Archaeological Society Bulletin and educational websites, she has played an important role in documenting the cultural landscape, features and artifacts of peoples who have occupied Cape Porpoise for 8,000 years. As a fine artist, Elizabeth has shown her work on the east and west coasts, taught painting and drawing and participated as a juried member of the Los Angeles Art Association and the Ogunquit Art Association. Her works are part of the permanent collection at the Brick Store Museum in Kennebunk and numerous private collections throughout the United States. Elizabeth holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts from the Massachusetts College of Art, a Master's of Fine Arts from the University of New Hampshire, a Masters in Social Work from the University of New England and is an expressive arts facilitator.

Spirits of Fashion was developed by Ren as a vehicle for conducting these various lectures and workshops on all eras of Fashion History. Ren and Mike moved to VT in May 2019 and moved into their forever home in Chester, VT in October 2022.

Junior Science - January 8



January Artist: Kathie Mahoney

The Speers Gallery at the Kennebunk Free Library presents the exhibit "Coming Full Circle" by Kathie Mahoney. The exhibit runs January 3-31, and the public is invited to an opening reception on Saturday, January 13 from 2:00 - 4:00 p.m.

Kathie Mahoney was the elementary school teacher who wanted to be the art

teacher but couldn't fully pursue her creative passion until her fifth decade. Taking a watercolor class set her on a new path and led to years of studying and mentoring with various artists across the country, and she continues to learn and take classes now that she is retired. She has exhibited locally as well as in Pennsylvania.

According to Kathie, "Coming Full Circle" is a compilation of watercolor and mixed media paintings celebrating the artist's journey toward finally fulfilling an inner childhood desire and quelling the nagging statement "I want to be an artist." The collection of works reflects her love of the natural environment and its creatures, rendered in vivid colors to convey joy and an appreciation of nature's simple beauty.

Kathie has returned to Maine after years of living elsewhere and feels that "Coming Full Circle" is also symbolic of her journey back home.

Station Eleven by Emily St. John Mandel

It took me a long time to finally read this book after having it suggested to me so many times, though not wanting to read about a flu pandemic while living through a coronavirus pandemic shouldn't be counted against me. The book's description doesn't do it justice because while it is about a pandemic and a post-apocalyptic world it has so much more to say about things like the necessity of art, the need to do more than just survive, and who people can become after the world changes and everything is taken from them.

The Rabbit Hutch by Tess Gunty

Tess Gunty's book covers a lot of ground -the anonymity of social media, the collapse of industrial cities- but what I was most drawn to in *The Rabbit Hutch* was the way she illustrates the impact people have on one another in our everyday interactions.

Rough Sleepers by Tracy Kidder

This nonfiction account of Healthcare for the Homeless Program in Boston, MA is a real eye and heart opener. Following the decades long career of Harvard educated Dr. Jim O'Connell. It all started with a one-year commitment and continued well past retirement age. You are taken down the road of treating unhoused people, no matter how they got that way with empathy and humanity, while dealing with bureaucracy. Dr. Jim's indoctrination began with a nurse that became his mentor, Barbara McInnes, when she taught him how to begin relationships by washing the feet of people that came to the clinic. (Available from KFL as a book and Libby as audio.)

Crazy Rich Asians by Kevin Kwan

This had NOT been on my "to read" list until I heard it had a Mah Jongg scene. The game, being my newest passion, got me started but then it took on a life of its own. The book follows the various members of Singapore's top 1%, the multibillionaires. The protagonist, Rachel Wu an economy professor in New York City, is invited to a family wedding by her boyfriend, also a NY professor. He is the favorite son of one of those super rich Singapore families but has never even hinted about this fact to Rachel. Surprise! I was also surprised because the book doesn't have a Mah Jongg scene, but the movie does! (Available from KFL as a book and through Minerva as as audio.)

Crazy Rich Asians - Jon M. Chu, director

Treat yourself to a great romantic comedy with the story line of the book but with a powerful Mah Jongg scene between rivals. Loved the modern "grapevine" gossip line, shots of the culture of Singapore, dramatic family dynamics and a great love story. (Available from KFL.)
