Ben's Tiny Tech Tips

Mastering Technology Bit by Bit

Here's a Pro-Tip: Have multiple web browsers downloaded onto your computer so that you have more internet options beyond the software your computer came with. Firefox and Google Chrome are the most common browsers used as an alternative to the pre-installed options. They all function the same so there isn't much of a learning curve. With other options to choose from, you might find that problems you sometimes have online are just compatibility issues between various websites and your browser software.



Staying Safe Online

Timeliness is an easy, yet important thing to assess when reading articles online. All good articles will have a time stamp on them. These generally appear before the main body of text along with the author's name. It is important to know when an article was written so that you can mentally frame the information in the right time period. Oftentimes, old articles get recirculated and misattributed to modern events which can blur the author's meaning and serve to further a narrative that has little to do with the actual context intended at the time.



books, including *The Power to Write: Seven Keys to Discover Your Writer Within*. Her newest title, *The Great Travels Writing Journal*, will be released this spring.


Reader's Choice Book Club - July 11

Nonfiction Book Group - July 11



Join us on Monday, July 11 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Rationality* by Steven Pinker.

"Much-published psychologist Pinker looks at the not-so-common roots of common-sensical thinking.Rationality, writes the author, 'emerges from a community of reasoners who spot each other's fallacies.' In other words, it has a social dimension, and it invites good company in order to wrestle with big problems such as climate change. Unfortunately, 'among our fiercest problems today is convincing people to accept the solutions when we do find them.' That's because so many people are so—well, irrational, or at least encumbered by bad habits of thinking and presuppositions.

Discussing beliefs in ghosts and haunted houses, the author wryly points out that 5% more people believe in the latter than in the former, which means 'that some people believe in houses haunted by ghosts without believing in ghosts.' Rationality is not the same thing as logic, Pinker argues, though there are points in common. Along the way, he examines the differences between propensity and probability, the maddening habit of falling victim to confirmation bias (believing what we want to believe and never mind contrary evidence), the workings of the conjunction rule (by which we conflate suppositions about people and events based on little or no factuality), and our tendency to mistake coincidence for pattern. Pinker serves up plenty of mental exercises that are intended to help us overcome the tricks our minds play on us-e.g., Prisoner's Dilemma game-theoretic scenarios that help expose the reasons so many people are content to be 'free riders' in using public goods; or stupid conspiracy theories advanced by people who believe they're being suppressed, which, as Pinker notes, is 'not the strategy you see from dissidents in undeniably repressive regimes like North Korea or Saudi Arabia.' The author can be heady and geeky, but seldom to the point that his discussions shade off into inaccessibility. A reader-friendly primer in better thinking through the cultivation of that rarest of rarities: a sound argument." (Kirkus Reviews, July 15, 2021)



Author Morgan Rielly - July 12



On Tuesday, July 12 at 6:30 p.m., the Kennebunk Free Library will host Morgan Rielly, one of the authors of Dear Maine: The Trials and Triumphs of Maine's 21st Century Immigrants. Morgan Rielly is the state representative for House District 34, which includes part of his hometown of Westbrook. He is a member of the Legislature's Veterans and Legal Affairs Committee. Morgan is the author of *Neighborhood Heroes: Life Lessons from Maine's Greatest Generation*, which profiles Maine World War II veterans. Morgan is a graduate of Bowdoin College, where he double-majored in Religion and Government. At Bowdoin, he received a fellowship to work alongside Syrian and Iraqi refugees at a non-governmental organization in Amman, Jordan.

Dear Maine, written by Morgan Rielly, an author and state representative, and Reza Jalali, a former refugee and executive director of the Greater Portland Immigrant Welcome Center, recounts the trials and triumphs of twenty immigrants who have arrived in Maine over the past few decades. *Dear Maine* includes black and white photographic portraits by Lilit Danielyan.



Adult Book Discussion - July 26



Join us on Tuesday, July 26 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Seven Husbands of Evelyn Hugo* by Taylor Jenkins Reid.

An aging starlet with seven marriages behind her generously offers the rights to her memoir to an inexperienced writer—at a heartbreaking cost.

Monique Grant is stunned when Hollywood legend Evelyn Hugo grants an exclusive interview to her over more seasoned journalists, but when she's also chosen to publish Evelyn's final confessions after her death, she learns that the 79-year-old actress has enough

life experience for them both. Growing up poor in Hell's Kitchen, young Evelyn Herrera trades her virginity for a ride to Hollywood, changes her name, and climbs the rungs of the entertainment-industry ladder one husband at a time until she hits Oscar gold. To write her off as being calculating and fickle would leave out the difficulty of being a woman, especially a woman of color, trying to get by in the late 1950s without a man's blessing. Evelyn plays up her bombshell figure and hides her Cuban roots by dying her hair blonde-the first of many lies she'll have to tell over the course of her life to prove to the world that she deserves her place in the spotlight. She's unapologetically ambitious but not without remorse. Which of her seven husbands was her true love? Why did she choose Monique to tell her story? Evelyn recounts her failures and triumphs in chronological order, one husband at a time, with a few breaks for Monique to report back to her editor. The celebrity tell-all style is a departure from Reid's (One True Loves, 2016, etc.) previous books, but Evelyn Hugo is a character who can demand top billing. When asked if it bothers her that 'all anyone talks about when they talk about you are the seven husbands of Evelyn Hugo,' she says no: 'Because they are just husbands. I am Evelyn Hugo.'

Reid's heroine reveals her darkest secrets as if she were wiping off makeup at the end of the night—a celebration of human frailty that speaks to the Marilyn Monroe and Elizabeth Taylor in us all." - *Kirkus Reviews*

Who is Castlebay?

Since 1986 Castlebay has been weaving together Maine's nautical and British Isles legacies transporting their

audience through time and across the Atlantic. Julia Lane and Fred Gosbee have loved and researched traditional music for most of their lives and blend history, legend and experience into their personable performances. Finely crafted ballads with evocative imagery and beautiful melodies depict Maine characters, history, and life close to the elemental beauty of the sea and shore. Rich and exuberant renditions of traditional and original songs are supported with Celtic harp, 12-string guitar, fiddle & woodwinds.

Castlebay has toured the Eastern US and Canada, United Kingdom, Ireland, and Kosovo performing at festivals, museums, schools and folk clubs. They have released over three dozen recordings. Notable festival experience includes five International Festivals of the Sea in the UK, the Mystic Sea Music Festival, the New Bedford Working Waterfront Festival, the Golden Link Festival, and the Somerset Folk Harp Festival. Since 2003 they have annually toured the east coast in the late winter from their home in coastal Maine to Florida, performing in libraries, concert series, folk clubs, retirement communities, and house concerts.






Ocean Survival Adventure - July 5


Jaw-some Shark Party - July 13

Join us on Wednesday, July 20 at 3:30 p.m. for this



Outdoor Storytimes - July 5, 11, 18, 25



Speers Gallery

July Artist: Patricia Sevigny-Higgins

The Kennebunk Free Library announces its next Speers Gallery exhibit, "Up Close and Beyond" by Patricia Sevigny-Higgins, opening July 1. The public is invited to attend an artist reception on Friday, July 15 from 1:00 - 4:00 p.m.

The exhibit is an accumulation of four different series of paintings done when the lockdown for Covid began, up until the present. Patricia says "I would need to be out of doors often and would spend many hours on trails, at beaches and on the backroads on Sundays exploring. In the winter and late fall months I would spend copious hours in my studio with set up still lives and photos from my adventures. The backroads had me searching for those "Lost" Barns", the ones that were tucked away, or aging. I felt a need to capture them before they were gone. I was also mourning the loss of the land adjacent,



in that I felt that these families had to sell land next to them to keep what they had. The second series was the "Marsh walks". My husband and I spent many hours walking the trails around the Kittery ocean and marshlands. These I was compelled to do more abstractly and in Mixed Media. The third series and the series I am still working in, was the "Sticks and Stones". This series is an endless fascination with all of the treasures I find on the beaches and wooded areas. This series allows me full concentration on objects, sharpens my drawing skills. I use a still-life set up for most of these. The last series and quite short-lived due to the weather is the "Pine and Snow" trees. Again, many hours on trails with my camera"

Patricia resides in Kittery Point, Maine, and is currently spending most of her time on studies for abstractions, done in Mixed Media; as well as mini seascapes in oil.

Vanderbilt: The Rise and Fall of An American Dynasty by Anderson Cooper and Katherine Howe

I listened to the audio version available on Overdrive, read by the author. The story of the Vanderbilt family starts in New Amsterdam in 1660 with a broke farmer from Holland, Jan Aertsen van der Bilt or "from the Bilt." The goal of acquiring wealth started during these earliest days and culminated with Cornelius Vanderbilt born in 1794. Known as the Commodore, he started his career at the age of 11 running a ferry service for vegetables and passengers between Staten Island and Manhattan, a sometimes-challenging distance of five miles. The stage is set: how a hardworking, business savvy young man became American Royalty. I really enjoyed the chapters about the sinking of the Lusitania, Truman Capote and the author's time with his mother, Gloria at the end of her life.


Mass written and directed by Fran Kranz

Call Us What We Carry poems by Amanda Gorman

This poet has an amazing gift for communicating stark realities but always with an undertone of hope. I find myself repeating phrases out loud to hear them again. Topics range from the whaling ship Essex in 1820, George Floyd and Black Lives Matter to Practice Makes People. Ms. Gorman explores the Spanish Flu epidemic as well as what our world has gone through, blow by blow, in 2020 and 2021. It is incredible that such a young person has such a distinguished voice.
