#### **New Museum Passes!**

The Friends of the Kennebunk Free Library have purchased three new museum passes for our patrons to check out. The Farnsworth Art Museum pass provides free admission to the museum, the Farnsworth Homestead and the Olson House. We have two sets with two passes. We have two Historic New England passes, each providing free admission to Historic New England properties for two adults plus children. The **Southworth Planetarium** pass provides free admission for up to six people. We also still have our regular passes - 2 passes that allow free entry for a carload of people to the Maine State Parks; the Portland Museum of Art pass which gives free admission to two adults plus children; and the Brick Store Museum pass, which includes free admission for two adults and four children; the Seashore Trolley Museum pass grants free entry to the patron and immediate family (up to 5 people). When the Children's Museum and Theatre reopens, we will also have that pass available. For more information about museum passes, visit our website.


children's book or young adult novel. Our unofficial motto is "there is no wrong way to do book club", and everyone is welcome!

# **Nonfiction Book Group - June 14**




Join us on Monday, June 14 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Memorial Drive* by Natasha Trethewey. Check our website calendar or rotating display for the Zoom link. Weather permitting, the discussion may be held outside and in-person. Check the website on the day of the program for details.

"Exploring personal trauma, memory, and closure, Poet Laureate and Pulitzer Prize-winner Trethewey returns to the site of her mother's murder. The daughter of an African American mother and white Canadian father, Trethewey grew up in civil rights-era Mississippi and Georgia. After her parents' divorce, her mother married an unstable Vietnam veteran who, over time, became psychologically and physically abusive. After ten years,

her mother left with Tretheway and her younger brother in tow but continued to live in fear of her ex-husband. Working with victims' rights groups, the state's attorney general, and local police, her mother achieved renewed independence and strength. But that did not stop Tretheway's former stepfather from murdering her mother in June 1985. Through spare prose and vivid imagery, the author presents a narrative of a trauma survivor's need to remember a past that, for 30 years, lapsed into the mind's shadows. VERDICT A moving, heartbreaking memoir about a traumatic event and the path to healing." (Library Journal, vol 145, issue 4, p104)

#### Author Talk/Book Discussion with Author Matt Cost - June 16





"Langdon is a laid back, slacker detective, happy with his work, friends, and way of life in the town of Brunswick, Maine. To compliment his income in small town Maine's scarce private detective market, Langdon also owns and operates a mystery

bookstore named after his trusted companion, Coffee Dog.

Does Langdon stand a chance against corrupt cops, crooked politicians, greedy millionaires, radical environmentalists, and a deadly assassin named Shakespeare? With the help of Bart, the bear of a cop; Jimmy 4 by Four, the hippie lawyer; the immigrants Jewell and Richam; and his true desire and employee, Chabal—Langdon sets out to do just that. And then he is framed for not one, but two murders, and events become very complicated.

Follow Langdon and his band of friends as they attempt to untangle the web of intrigue and return Brunswick to 'the way life should be'."

"Wood (Any Bitter Thing, 2005) tells a simultaneously sad and joyous story of a unique 11-year-old boy and the legacy he leaves behind. Known only as 'the boy,' he has no friends, and spends his time obsessively compiling mental lists and memorizing countless Guinness world records. As part of his work to earn a Boy Scout badge, the boy does yard work for 104-year-old Ona Vitkus, a Lithuanian immigrant living nearby. They forge a close bond over the

course of seven Saturdays, then the boy dies. His mostly absent musician father, Quinn, volunteers to finish the last three of the boy's weekends. Quinn becomes aware of his son's and Ona's plan to get her into a Guinness records book — hopefully, as the oldest licensed driver — and this leads first to a road trip to find Ona's only living son, now 90, and eventually to a visit to her homeland at age 109." 


#### **Teen Gaming**


# Middle School Book Group - June 23

Join us for Middle School Book Group!



Maine Bicentennial Community Cookbook 200 Recipes Celebrating Maine's Culinary Past, Present & Future, Compiled and Edited by M. Hathaway & K. Schatz

Not only are there great recipes for classic Maine dishes, there are people's stories of gathering ingredients and preparing the food with grandparents, other relatives and neighbors. I was surprised by a recipe from one of my culinary teachers sent in by her granddaughter! Which whoopie pie recipe is most like Mom used to make? Will the chicken croquettes be as good as the Glenmore Restaurant served? I sure hope the Iraqi Kofta with eggplant and rice is a good as it sounds. Now to try them....

## Magic Lessons by Alice Hoffman

This is the prequel to Practical Magic. It is a story of independent women, that can heal people, know the purposes of medicinal plants in the 1600's in England and New England, so of course they must be witches. Maria Owens starts her life as a foundling

being watched over by a crow, Cadin, her familiar, who remains with her his whole life. Maria is taken in and raised by Helen Owens who teaches her to "only love those that love you back" and green magic in Essex County, England. When Maria must flee to the island of Cara □ao, she meets two men that will alter her life forever. She follows one of the men to Essex County, Massachusetts where he is a magistrate in Salem. Nothing good can come of this! I loved all the details about herbal medicine and healing, the different places and characters. Black magic does come into play but at a very high price to the practitioner.

The Extraordinary Life of Sam Hell by Robert Dugoni

Sam Hill is born with ocular albinism and his pupils are red leading to taunts of "Devil Boy" and "Sam Hell". This novel follows Sam and his loving family through his early struggles and into adulthood. It is a story of successes and failures and finally making sense of things in middle age. I enjoyed every minute of it, especially the ending.
