
Tech Time - June 1, 7, 8, 14, 15, 21, 22, 28, 29

#### Historian Vana Carmona - June 6



Nine years ago, Vana Carmona discovered the gravestone of a man named Prince near several of her family's plots. Learning he had been enslaved by her ancestors, she embarked on a historical quest to find others. Soon she found out that enslavement in Maine was more common than she ever believed. Moreover, many of our founding fathers were complicit in the human trafficking from Africa as well. Vana subsequently founded The Prince Project. Today it has evolved into a database of almost 2000 people of color who lived in Maine prior to 1800. The result has been a unique understanding of Maine enslavement, as well as New England that is

misunderstood - if not ignored. Vana's goal is to help rewrite the historical narrative of our State and to ensure that the next generation knows the truth about our earlier Maine families. She will be at the Kennebunk Free Library on Tuesday, June 6 at 6:00 to discuss her research.

Vana has done presentations on her work at various local historical societies, libraries and schools throughout the State. In addition, Vana is a docent/guide for several historic sites in the Portland area, including Maine Historical Society and Spirits Alive (Eastern Cemetery). Eastern Cemetery is the oldest public burial ground in Portland, Maine and has two sections of African American graves. She is a graduate of Sarah Lawrence College, and completed her Masters of Liberal Arts (focusing on Medieval History) at California State University/Sacramento.


### **Using Facebook Securely - June 7**


### **Unleashing Creativity Workshop - June 10**

### **Nonfiction Book Group - June 12**



Join us on Monday, June 12 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Half American* by Matthew Delmont.

"Black Americans played crucial roles in nearly every theater of World War II, but they have been largely ignored in historical accounts. Delmont sets the record straight. Delmont, a professor of history at Dartmouth who has written numerous books on civil rights and Black history, notes that he was surprised when his initial research revealed the number of Black men and women who served during the war: more than 1 million. Due to prejudice among White military leaders, most Black soldiers were assigned roles in construction, transport, supply, and maintenance. Even under appalling conditions, they served courageously, and the final victories in Europe and the

Pacific would not have been possible without them. Once they were allowed to serve on the battlefield, they were indispensable. 'The trailblazing Tuskegee Airmen, 92nd Infantry Division, Montford Point Marines, and the 761st 'Black Panther' Tank Battalion served bravely in combat,' writes Delmont, 'and Black troops shed blood in the iconic battles at Normandy and Iwo Jima, and the Battle of the Bulge.' As the author shows in this illuminating history, military training camps were brutally segregated, and civilian Black Americans faced obstacles when applying for jobs in war factories. One reason was the belief that military service would help fight discrimination within the U.S., a concept encapsulated in the "Double V" campaign promoted by Black leaders: victory over fascism abroad and victory over racism at home. Even after the war, little changed for the Black community. Black veterans often found themselves ineligible for the benefits available to their White counterparts, and even Black men in uniform faced harassment. Delmont suggests that the wartime contributions of Black Americans planted the seeds for later progress, although it would be a long, difficult path—and one not yet finished. The narrative is disturbing and painful, but it provides important pages that have been missing from American history. A vital story well rendered, recounting a legacy that

In this deeply personal travel guide, Jones takes readers on extraordinary walks through known and not-so-known places in Ireland, England, Jordan, Wales, and Scotland. With vivid and compelling details, she has these venerable lands tell their own stories by her willingness to be open to their messages. As you travel with her, you too may be curious about your own ancestral connections to sacred landscapes. Whether you are a seeker of unusual destinations or on a spiritual guest, walk with Margaret on

hallowed ground, kneel with her before hold wells, and travel ancient Roman roads. Discover the stories of saints, goddesses, and witches. Enter portals and experience what the ancient Celts called "the thin places."

Margaret Jones, MEd, has a background in social work and education with a certificate in therapeutic storytelling. She is an award-winning storyteller, workshop leader, tarot reader, and travel guide. In her spare time, Margaret performs, writes, and continues her search for sacred places.



Join us on Tuesday, June 27 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Poacher's Son* by Paul Doiron.

"Maine Game Warden fights to clear his no-account father of murder charges in this deeply felt actioner.

Even before his parents divorced, Mike Bowditch wasn't close to his father, and after the breakup, when Jack Bowditch descended into a swamp of womanizing and drinking, Mike had less and less to do with him. Since the last time he saw his father two years ago, he's become a Game Warden—a slap in the face to both his poacher

father and his girlfriend, Sarah Harris, who left Mike when she realized he was never going to go to law school. Now Jack's back in Mike's life with a vengeance. Someone has shot Jonathan Shipman, the spokesman for the deeply unpopular corporate purchaser of a 100-year-old campground that's obviously planning to shove the current residents aside in the name of development, and Bill Brodeur, the deputy who was guarding him. Det. Wayne Soctomah is convinced that Jack was the shooter. So is almost everyone else in Somerset County except for Mike and his mother, Marie Turner. Scorning Marie and her second husband, attorney Neil Turner, who go into hiding to avoid Jack, Mike vows to do whatever he can to vindicate the father who's been phoning him for help. His decision leads to a series of disastrously self-destructive actions that Doiron makes perfectly credible, all interspersed with a series of flashbacks to Mike's childhood that are both tender and chilling." - Kirkus Reviews


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## **Stuffed Animal Adoption - June 28**

#### June Artist: Elizabeth T. Schoch

The Japanese concept of wabi-sabi -- which celebrates that which is imperfect, transient, aged, or incomplete -- is the theme of the June exhibit at The Speers Gallery, located on the lower level of the Kennebunk Free Library, 112 Main St., Kennebunk, Maine. "Wabi-sabi: Finding Beauty in the Imperfect," is an exhibition of photography by Maine resident Elizabeth T. Schoch.



"The idea of wabi-sabi resonates with me," Schoch explained. "Wabi-sabi encourages us to see beauty in the imperfect. It reshapes our expectations of what beauty is. I view my subjects as *perfectly imperfect*."

"Wabi-sabi: Finding Beauty in the Imperfect" runs from June 1 through June 30. The public is invited to an opening reception on Saturday, June 3, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Schoch, a self-taught photographer and artist, is a retired writer who resides in Biddeford. She is the author of *The Everything Digital Photography Book (first edition)*.

Schoch's photos and gelatin prints have been on display at various venues in Southern Maine, including Engine in Biddeford, Brick Store Museum Holiday Shop in Kennebunk, Fa-Fa Gallery in Portland, and Dyer Library in Saco, among others. She is a regular participant of the monthly Reader's Choice group at Kennebunk Free Library.

I can't improve on the Goodreads review (including a 5 star rating): "For decades, our cultural discourse around trans and gender-diverse people has been viewed through a medical lens, through diagnoses and symptoms set down in books by cisgender doctors, or through a political lens, through dangerous caricatures invented by politicians clinging to power. But those who claim non-binary gender identity deserve their own discourse, born out of the work of the transsexual movement, absorbed into the idea of transgender, and now, finally, emerging as its own category."

Poetry Unbound: 50 Poems to Open Your World by Padraig Ó Tuama,
