Community Resilience: We will be discussing the ways community businesses and organizations are responding to and preparing for climate change. Presenters will include: Jessica Brunacini Ph.D. of the Wells Reserve at

Laudholm; Julia Dundorf, Executive Director, New England Grassroots Environmental Fund; Kate Wallace of The Resilience Hub; Students from the Gulf of Maine Studies class at Kennebunk High School and Kennebunkport Climate Initiative; Rachel Stearns of the Rachel Carson National Wildlife Refuge; and Allison Atkins of the Kennebunk Free Library.

### Tues, May 18 @ 6:00

Coastal - Marine: We will be discussing the ways coastal communities are supporting the mission of mitigating and adapting to climate change. ### Take Note - April 7



"Blending elements of reportage, memoir, and incantation, Flight of the Diamond Smugglers is a stunning investigation into the role of carrier pigeons in South African diamond smuggling. Nearly every town along South Africa's infamous diamond coast has been deemed 'overmined.' Before the area fully becomes a series of abandoned outposts, journalist Matthew Gavin Frank drives from Oranjemund, Namibia to the De Beers mining towns of Alexander Bay, Porth Nolloth, and Kleinzee. Weaving interviews with local diamond miners who raise pigeons in


secret with harrowing anecdotes from former heads of security, environmental managers, and vigilante pigeon hunters, Frank reveals how these feathered bandits became outlaws in every mining town." - Novelist

"Best known for the Cork O'Connor mystery series, Krueger (Trickster's Point) has produced an elegiac, evocative, standalone novel. The summer of 1961 finds thirteen-year-old Frank Drum living in small-town New Bremen, Minn. He and his younger brother, Jake, idolize their older sister, Ariel, a talented church organist who's also the "golden child" of their parents, WWII veteran and Methodist pastor Nathan and church music director Ruth. Nathan and Ruth befriend the accomplished musician Emil Brandt, a veteran left blinded by his service, who

tutors Ariel in her music education. Meanwhile, Jake, who has a stutter, forms a close bond with Lise, Emil's deaf older sister and caretaker, while Ariel dates Emil's wealthy nephew, Karl. The Drums' peaceful existence is shattered, however, when Ariel fails to return from a late-night party. In the aftermath of her disappearance, Karl comes under suspicion, Ruth undergoes a crisis of faith, and dark secrets about New Bremen come to light. The small-town milieu is rendered in picturesque detail, accurate down to periodappropriate TV programs, for what becomes a resonant tale of fury, guilt, and redemption." 


### **Teen Gaming**

Our spring projects are just around the corner. With capital funding support from the Town of Kennebunk we will be replacing our original front doors (facing Main Street) and our current front doors (facing Fletcher) in the next few months. Our Main Street doors will be removed for about a month to be fixed, refinished, and restored to their original color. Our Fletcher doors will be replaced with new doors of the same color and wood type. We are also getting our parking lot resealed and striped. We do expect minor disruptions in accessing the library during the latter two projects but we will keep you posted.

### Mend – A Refashioning Manual by Kate Secules

As someone that spent a lot of time putting visible patches on jeans in the 1980s and always doing quick repairs on the family's clothing, I was intrigued by the premise of this book. The author looks into every aspect of the ancient art of extending the life of clothing, as well as how items make it to market, in the past and currently. Fabric was very valuable even as late as the early 1900s. Currently, mending is a very "green" practice. There are chapters on technique, materials, the extensive variety of needles, other supplies and the current trends in visible patching. I particularly enjoyed taking a look into other people's sewing notion boxes.

Life in the Studio Inspiration and Lessons on Creativity by Frances Palmer

This book is a lush, gorgeous shot of creative juices in a great array of pursuits that most of us can relate to. It dives into not only pottery, but photography, cooking, gardening, flower arranging, entertaining, décor and organizing life. The author shares how she deals with deadlines, creative blocks and working from home. I found the whole book to be one delightful page after another.

Such a Fun Age by Kiley Reid

Emira Tucker, a 25-year-old Black woman is the babysitter for Alix Chamberlain's toddler. One evening, Emira and Briar, her 2-year-old charge, are in a grocery store. A customer contacts Security with the suspicion that the white toddler has been kidnapped by a Black woman. The confrontation is video recorded by another customer and the stage is set for drama and a mini study in race relations and misconceptions.

This was our book for the Adult Discussion in April. When I started reading it I hated it, thinking it was just a new stereotyping of young women of color. I looked at the reviews again and it got high praise. As I continued reading and the story line and characters developed, the book won me over. It presents a very interesting perspective that I found enlightening. I am really looking forward to our discussion!

The <u>Peterson Guide to Bird Identification - in 12 Steps</u> by Steve N. G. Howell & Brian Sullivan is written in a conversational style to teach new birders (or remind more experienced birders) of the important steps, or factors, in identifying birds, including the overlooked basics of location, habitat, and season. The steps build upon each other, and there is a summary chapter that demonstrates the steps in a real-world example. There are also lots of well-captioned, color photographs. As a sort of "advanced beginner" myself, the steps have provided a flexible structure to guide me in improving my birding success.
