Mastering Technology Bit by Bit

• If you have trouble finding the option you are looking for, try rightclicking your mouse instead. You'll soon discover there's a whole slew of options just waiting for you under that "other" button on the mouse.



• If ever you are using your computer and the screen suddenly fills with security warnings, stop what you are doing, don't interact with any of these "so called" warnings, and close open windows



and programs until the warnings go away. These are almost never real. A real security warning will never act like an annoying pop-up, or take over your entire computer screen. Pop-ups, alert tones, flashing fonts, or threats as to what could happen if you don't take immediate action are clear signs that the message itself is a scam and not a real security warning. Real security warnings won't try to scare you into doing something.

Writer's Workshop - May 4



Caroline Joy Adams is an artist, writer, and photographer. She has taught writing at the college level, in addition to hundreds of writing workshops over the past 20 years, including in Maui, Hawaii; Newport, RI; Woods Hole, Boston, and Martha's Vineyard, MA; and Scottsdale, AZ. She is the author of seven books, including *The Power to Write: Seven Keys to Discover Your Writer Within*. Her newest title, *The Great Travels Writing Journal*, will be released this spring.

Nonfiction Book Group - May 9



Join us on Monday, May 9 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Crying in H Mart* by Michelle Zauner.

"A poignant memoir about a mother's love as told through Korean food. Losing a parent is one thing, but to also lose direct ties to one's culture in the process is its own tragedy. In this expansion of her popular 2018 New Yorker essay, Zauner, best known as the founder of indie rock group Japanese Breakfast, grapples with what it means to be severed from her Korean heritage following her mother's battle with cancer. In an attempt to honor and remember her umma, the author sought to replicate the flavors of her upbringing. Throughout, the author delivers mouthwatering

descriptions of dishes like pajeon, jatjuk, and gimbap, and her storytelling is fluid, honest, and intimate. Aptly, Zauner frames her story amid the aisles of H Mart, a place many Asian Americans will recognize, a setting that allows the author to situate her personal story as part of a broader conversation about diasporic culture, a powerful force that eludes ownership. The memoir will feel familiar to children of immigrants, whose complicated relationships to family are often paralleled by equally strenuous relationships with their food. It will also resonate with a larger audience due to the author's validation of the different ways that parents can show their love—if not verbally, then certainly through their ability to nourish. "I wanted to embody a physical warning that if she began to disappear, I would disappear too," writes Zauner as she discusses the deterioration of her mother's health, when both stopped eating. When a loved one dies, we search all of our senses for signs of their presence. Zauner's ability to let us in through taste makes her book stand out from others with similar themes. She makes us feel like we are in her mother's kitchen, singing her praises. A tender, well-rendered, heart-wrenching account of the way food ties us to those who have passed." Eden Martin had the perfect life in New York City: an amazing job as a professor, a successful fiancée, great apartment on the Upper West Side. But in one night her

whole world comes crashing down. So, she does what any sensible woman would do, she abandons her life and moves to a tiny village in England, leaving everyone and everything behind. Lost and confused, a new life emerges as she follows her dream to write a book. In the process, she meets a local healer, the last in a centuries-long line of magical herbalists. She also finds love, and challenges, in ways she could never have imagined. In this village of strange and mystical events, Eden finally learns that finding love, hope, or even your destiny can't provide happiness until you find yourself.

About the Author

Heather Morrison-Tapley is a nationally licensed acupuncturist and Chinese herbalist with a practice in Kennebunk, Maine, where she lives with her husband and children. She recently published her first novel. Set in both New York City and a village in England. Heather is a dual US/UK citizen and grew up spending school years at home in the New York area and summers in Great Britain with her family. She has a master's degree in Oriental Medicine and completed an internship in Acupuncture & herbal medicine at the Sino-Japanese Friendship Hospital in Beijing, China. She also has a master's degree from the University of Chicago in Social Science. Heather also spent time each summer in Maine where she fell in love with the state. After living in New York, San Francisco, Paris, and Santa Fe, she moved here and never plans to leave! Heather feels Maine has the kind of magic that she loves to write about - that special something you can't quite put your finger on, but that you can feel all around. Climate Policy Workshop - May 23



Adult Book Discussion - May 24



Join us on Tuesday, May 24 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Indigo Girl* by Natasha Boyd.

"Set on South Carolina's plantations beginning in 1739, this excellent historical novel by Boyd (Eversea) is based on the true story of Eliza Lucas Pinckney (1722–1793). Sixteen-year-old Eliza Lucas is charged with running her father's three heavilymortgaged plantations while he pursues a military career in the Caribbean. He has trained Eliza well in business, agriculture, and plantation management, and she is bright, considerate, and ambitious. Eliza sees the production of indigo dye as the family's financial salvation, but indigo is risky to grow, and dye-making is a valuable but well-kept secret so she must approach her new assignment with caution. Kindhearted Eliza is independent and forward-thinking. She defies the Negro Act of 1740 and teaches her slaves to read, seeks their advice, and banishes the lash. As a marriageable young woman she rejects all suitors and expects to be a spinster, but as the plantation booms and her public stature grows, so does her affection for a married gentleman friend. Add threats of war with Spain and the strict social and cultural codes for Southern women, and Boyd has crafted a captivating novel of Southern colonial history." *Publisher's Weekly*

Speers Gallery

May Artist: Leo A. Martel

The Kennebunk Free Library announces its May exhibition, "Elvers at the Mousam River", featuring the pastels of Kennebunk resident Leo A. Martel. The exhibit will be shown Monday, May 2 to Tuesday, May 31.

Leo Martel has no formal artist training, but was intrigued by elver (baby eel) fishing he saw along the Mousam River and took many photographs of the fisherman at work. He later turned the photos into lively pastels capturing this unique industry.

Leo explains the exhibit: "What started as merely a series of pastels depicting various stages of the elver harvesting season has grown into a real-life experience. Each pastel has a plaque

next to it relating to a different fact or anecdote about the harvesting. The industry started back in 1970-71 where one pound of eels was valued around \$150-200, hardly worth it for all the work involved, for such a short season. The value of one pound of elver in 2019 was as high as \$2,500."

Martel will host a reception on Wednesday, May 4 from 3:00 - 7:30 p.m. It will feature a copper model of a Fyke net used by elver fisherman, and a short video of the local elver harvest that will be shown on a loop.

Kennebunk Free Library looks forward to displaying this special exhibit.

The public is invited to view the exhibit in the library's Speers Gallery from May 2 - 31, 2022 at 112 Main St., Kennebunk, Maine during regular library hours when the gallery is not in use for library programs. Harlem Shuffle - Colson Whitehead

Ray Carney is the owner of a used furniture store in New York City in the 1960's. Ray is a family man, expecting his second child with wife Elizabeth. His in-laws think he is not good enough for their daughter. His family history is more than a bit shady and he struggles to remain honest. Money is tight and temptation draws him into trouble. I enjoyed the recreation of Harlem in the 60's. An aside: Ray's habit of sleeping in two shifts with a work session in the middle of the night is interesting.

Notes on a Lost Flute – A Field Guide to the Wabanaki – Kerry Hardy

Maine as lived by our Indigenous People is described, explained and cherished in this book. The wisdom and lifestyle of people living naturally and respectfully on their land is beautiful and valuable. Adapting to flourish in their natural environment and seasonal changes is amazing. My favorite chapters were "Food from the sea and shore" and "A culture built around nature".

Supernova - written and directed by Harry Macqueen

A film starring Colin Firth and Stanley Tucci in a British romantic drama film. A longtime couple deals with a dementia diagnosis by heading out in their old and trusty RV visiting friends and seeing new things. A thoughtful depiction of a difficult life situation.
