Soap Making at Home - November 4



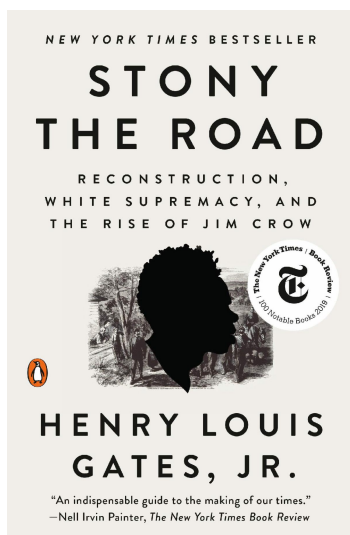

Nonfiction Book Group - October 16

Join us on Monday, October 16 at 6:30 to discuss *Stony the Road* by Henry Louis Gates, Jr. Check our website calendar or rotating display for the Zoom link.

"Historian Gates (Alphonse Fletcher Univ. Professor, dir. the Hutchins Ctr. for African and African American Research, Harvard Univ.; *Life Upon These Shores*) has long been fascinated with the idea of the 'New Negro,' and how African Americans fought back against white supremacy during the Redemption and Jim Crow periods. In this work (its title a lyric from the song 'Lift Every Voice and Sing'), the author asserts that this era is fundamental to understanding the current period of racist backlash following Barack Obama's presidency. Borrowing heavily from historians such as Eric Foner and David W. Blight, Gates covers the basics of Reconstruction, the pseudoscience of racism in the field of anthropology, lynching and racial violence across America, and widespread commercial use of stereotypes such as Sambo and Aunt Jemima, and how African Americans continually strived to disprove this onslaught of bigotry through education, literature, art, music, and political organizing. A large number of photographs and illustrations back up his argument of just how unrelenting white supremacy was in this period." (Library Journal, vol 144, issue 4, p107)

Photographer Peter Ralston - November 18

The Camden Conference and the Kennebunk Free Library present Peter Ralston on Wednesday, November 18 at 6:30 via Zoom. Ralston will be sharing photographs and stories from the West Coast of Greenland and the Northwest Passage, featuring the landscape and wildlife of the Arctic and the people who live there. Peter Ralston grew up in Chadd's Ford, Pennsylvania, worked for a decade as a freelance photojournalist and then began photographing the coast of Maine in 1978, drawn especially to the working communities that define the coast's enduring character.

His work has been seen in many books and magazines, featured on network television and has been exhibited in galleries, collections and museums throughout the United States and abroad. In 2003 he was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree at Colby College for his photography as well as his role as co-founder of the Island Institute in 1983.

He opened Ralston Gallery in Rockport, Maine, in 2011, selling his photographs as well as the work of his lifelong friends, Andrew and Jamie Wyeth. He is currently working on a book about coastal Maine. More information is available on his site, www.ralstongallery.com.

Middle School Book Group - November 18

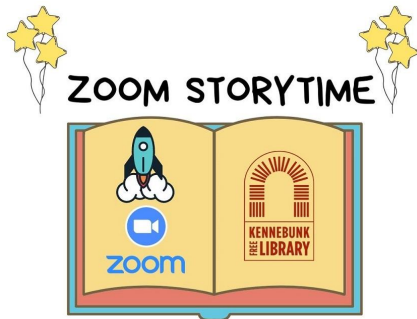
Our favorite Middle School Book Group is returning!

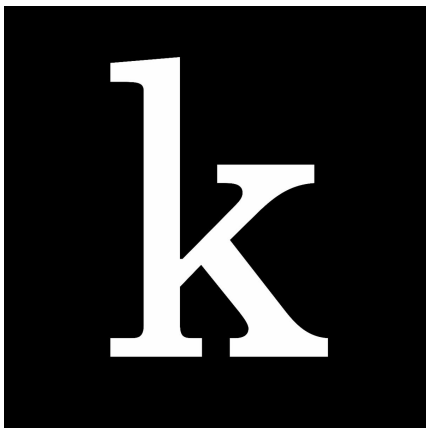
MSBA Virtual Challenge

Kanopy Video Streaming Service - Beginning November 1

As we all get ready to hunker down inside during the cold winter months, we are unveiling a new service to help you pass the time. Beginning on November 1, we will be offering Kanopy video streaming service to all KFL cardholders. Kanopy offers a wide variety of movies, documentaries, foreign films, classics, children's content and more.

How does it work? Each month, you will have seven "credits" to use to download movies. Please note that if you watch more than five seconds of any movie, Kanopy will count that as one of your seven selections. To make the most of the service, only hit play when you have found a movie you are sure you want to watch. Once you select a movie, you will have 72 hours to finish watching it or to watch it again. The children's content – Kanopy Kids – is a little different. Once you watch your first Kanopy Kids video, you have access to the entire children's selection for the rest of the month without having to use your credits.

Kanopy works with most devices, including Roku, Chromecast, and AppleTV. If you have questions about the service or need help getting started, visit our website at www.kennebunklibrary.org or ask a librarian.

Nothing to See Here by Kevin Wilson, audio version performed by Marin Ireland, From the great cover art to the "unlikely but I wanted to believe in them characters", I totally enjoyed this book from start to finish. This is a humorous exploration of relationships, from odd-couple friendships to what makes a parent and what does not. The author and the performer do a great job of making the characters real. I highly recommend it.

The Mule - DVD A patron and my hair stylist recommended this movie on the same day, so I gave it a try. It is a drama starring Clint Eastwood (he is also producer and director), Bradley Cooper and Laurence Fishburne. Loosely based on a true-life story, Clint Eastwood as Earl, is a renowned but struggling horticulturist in his 80's specializing in day lilies. His neglected family and finances crash in on him. A chance encounter results in a job offer as a driver. It pays very well allowing him to clean up the messes he has created. Somehow, he missed the fact that his employer is a Mexican drug cartel. If you are a thrill seeking, explosion and bloody scene kind of viewer, don't bother. If you can be shown a bit of suspense and danger and fill in the blanks while you get to explore the characters, you will probably enjoy it, as I did.

The Best Comfort Food on the Planet by Kerry Altiero, Chef/Owner of Café Miranda in Rockland, Maine with Katherine Gaudet. This title jumped out as I was transitioning from corn on the cob and BLT's to thinking about fall cooking: soups and stews. Though I haven't actually cooked any of the recipes yet, I have lots of places marked: Auntie Fluffie's Pasta (comes with a great story) and White Bean soup. It is going to happen! But in the meantime, this Sunday I put together an amazing soup of my own thanks to the ideas, lists of fresh ingredients and great pictures, in short, the inspiration I found here.

Dinosaur Boy by Cory Putman Oakes

Occasionally, the best way to approach real, thorny issues is with a little bit of absurdity. Such is the mission of *Dinosaur Boy*, a book about a fifth-grader who discovers he has inherited "the dinosaur gene" from his grandfather. Now he has to go back to school having sprouted a spiked tail and stegosaurus plates down his back over summer vacation. At times a touching book about bullying and the hardships of not fitting in, at times a truly whacky adventure that goes somewhat off the rails about halfway through in ways that made me laugh aloud, this was a thoroughly enjoyable book with a lot of heart. Both it and its sequel are available through interlibrary loan, or as ebooks on Overdrive.
