### **York County Audubon Donates Birding Backpacks**



We are excited to announce that York County Audubon has donated two <u>birding backpacks</u> to the library. KFL cardholders will be able to check out the backpacks for up to three weeks at a time. Each backpack contains everything you will need to go searching for birds in Maine. The kit's binoculars will help you see the birds up close. The birding guides will help you sort out which bird is which! Checklists for both children and adults will help you organize your bird findings and perhaps start your birding "life list". The suggestions about where to find birds and the maps of local land trusts will point you in the direction of the birds and their favorite habitats. The Kennebunk area is rich with bird life, and whether you're trying out a new hobby, teaching your children, or simply wanting to enjoy a weekend in nature, KFL & YCA hope that these birding backpacks will help you get to know the beautiful birds of Maine.

## **Digitized Historic Newspapers**



We are pleased to announce the availability of newly digitized historic newspapers from our Special Collections. With the assistance of our partner institutions, Osher Map Library and the Maine State Library, and with funding generously provided by the Maine Humanities Council Bicentennial Grant Committee, we have completed a long sought after and much needed digitization project to preserve the content in issues of three local historic newspapers which have been maintained in storage for nearly

three decades. The newspapers are: the *Kennebunk Enterprise* (1904-1920), the *Seaside Echo* (1901-1907) and the *Wave* (1887-1890).

While KFL holds microfilm of several other newspapers, these three publications have never been preserved on any other format. Not only has digitization allowed us to make these newspapers freely available to anyone via the internet, it has also saved the content within the issues from permanent loss due to rapidly deteriorating conditions of the newsprint itself. The *Enterprise* in particular was badly in need of preservation due to brittle paper flaking away with

such little disturbance as walking by the volumes. As a bonus to readers and researchers- the digitized issues are also keyword searchable!

We are very happy to share these publications with you. They are a treasure trove of information about our community and are an invaluable resource for preserving and remembering the area's history. You will find local news stories, advertisements for local businesses and services, social event columns, editorials, obituaries, regional and national news, and much more, all illustrating what life in the Kennebunks and York County was like more than a century ago. 

### **Nonfiction Book Group - November 8**



Join us on Monday, November 8 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *The Appalachian Trail: A Biography* by Philip D'Anieri. The discussion will be held in person at the library; outside if weather permits. Masks are required inside.

"In this engrossing debut, urban planning professor D'Anieri takes a breezy trek through the century-long history of the Appalachian Trail . To provide a glimpse of the life of this well-traversed place as it's developed over time, he compiles profiles of the individuals who shaped it. In the late 1920s, for example, Horace Kephart—who helped establish the Great Smoky Mountains National Park—was instrumental in devising the trail's southern end, after its founding by Benton MacKaye in 1921, who saw it as 'a recreational preserve to

serve the people.' D'Anieri also chronicles the trail's early hikers, among them Earl Shaffer—a 'young loner' who charted paths in 1948 for others to follow—and Emma Gatewood, a septuagenarian who cared less about the 'purity of nature' than the freedom the walk provided. Meanwhile, Bill Bryson's influential book A Walk in the Woods—about his time on the trail—is given a local interpretation with criticism from the Appalachian Trail Club for its 'apparent disinterest in the trail's larger ideals.' In genial prose, D'Anieri captures the trail's majesty and its power to inspire those who ramble on it. Hikers will be captivated by the rich history, as well as those in need of inspiration for their next escape." (Publishers Weekly, vol 268, issue 19)

present Bill Hall, president of the World Affairs Council of Maine at the Kennebunk Free Library on Tuesday, November 16 at 6:00. Hall will be discussing *Eastern Europe: Thirty Years After the Fall of the Soviet Union.* 

Hall will offer a look at this lesser-known but fascinating region of Europe today, 30 years after the Soviet Union collapsed in 1991. It was a momentous time. The Berlin Wall had been torn down; the Soviet Union was dissolving. Democratic capitalism, under American leadership, seemed the global future. Germany moved toward reunification, and the former Soviet republics and

satellites in Europe were turned loose to make their way in a completely new international environment. What did American policymakers expect, what actually happened, and where are we now?

Bill Hall is the president of the World Affairs Council of Maine. He was an intelligence officer in the U. S. Air Force and spent nearly 18 years overseas, in Asia and Europe. Hall graduated from Princeton University with a bachelor's degree in politics and from the University of Virginia with a master's degree in foreign affairs. He lives with his wife, Nancy, on Peaks Island.

The Camden Conference is an annual world affairs conference held in Camden, Maine. The topic for this year's Conference, February 25 – 27, is *Europe: Challenged at Home and Abroad*.




### Would you rather...

This Is Your Mind On Plants by Michael Pollan

"Of all the things humans rely on plants for, surely the most curious is our use of them to change consciousness to stimulate or calm, fiddle with or completely alter, the qualities of our mental experience." This short book looks in depth into the history, provides commentary, shares experiences of and pretty much, every angle of the opium poppy, caffeine and peyote.

I am sharing two book recommendations from my friend, Mary Ann.

The first is *The Atlas of Disappearing Places – Our Coasts and Oceans in the Climate Crisis* by Christina Conklin and Marina Psaros

With many pictures, graphs and projections, this book takes a look at the Earth's changing chemistry, strengthening storms, warming waters and rising seas. If you would like a clearer understanding about the issues facing us, spend some time with this book.

The second is Once Upon a Town by Bob Greene


From Christmas Day 1941 until the April 1, 1946 the people of North Platte, Nebraska turned their small railroad depot into a free Canteen for the trains of soldiers travelling to war. For a few minutes the soldiers enjoyed food, music and hospitality staffed and funded by volunteers. By the end of World War II, the town with a population of 12,000 people had provided more than 6 million GIs encouragement and creature comforts. This eye witness history is based on interviews with North Platte residents and the GIs that passed through.

After a few moments, however, I remembered that I could search for the article online, through the Global Newsstream database on <u>Digital Maine Library</u>. The Digital Maine Library has many

other helpful databases, including Gale LegalForms and, my favorite, Novelist Plus, which is great for finding title, author & series read-alike recommendations.
