Composting with Mark King of Maine DEP - October 3



On Monday, October 3 at 6:00, KFL and the Town of Kennebunk will host Mark King of the Maine Department of Environmental Protection for a presentation on the benefits of community food scrap collection and composting. Mark has been working on compost solutions for the better part of three decades. Attendees will learn about all of the aspects surrounding local consolidated food scrap collection and management as an alternative to costly disposal in our landfills. Actions learned will help communities in their efforts to: reduce solid waste disposal costs while bolstering local farms and farming, protect regional water quality and, ultimately, mitigate climate

change and its harmful impacts.

The presenter will be joining us via Zoom. Participants may request a Zoom link to watch from home or gather at the library for a viewing party, complete with ice cream sundaes served with compostable bowls, spoons, and napkins. Gold and Global Politics - October 12



The Camden Conference and the Kennebunk Free Library present Mike Lynch at KFL on Wednesday, October 12, 2022 at 6:30 p.m. Lynch will be discussing "Gold and Global Politics: How the Financial Power of Gold Impacts Politics Past and Present."

Gold has been the lifeblood of global trade for centuries. It has sparked wars, helped shift regional powers, crushed empires, won battles changing the course of history, and laid the foundation of our global monetary system. Its legacy is the bedrock of current political positions. Take a journey exploring gold's impact on global trade and politics past to present.

Mike Lynch has taught several Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) Senior College courses at USM Portland. He retired for the first time in 2009 when he and his wife joined the Peace Corps and spent 2 ½ years working with the Roma Gypsy in Bulgaria. After that he became a Peace Corps director in Ghana. He lived in Ghana (formerly called the Gold Coast) for three years, and "winters" in South Africa, which has one of the world's richest gold deposits. In his travels, he has visited ghost towns and old mining operations. He became fascinated with the impact gold has had on civilization and developed a course focusing on the history of gold.

Lynch has an MBA from the University of New Hampshire and holds five patents. Prior to Peace Corps he worked for several high-tech firms where he was a product development director, and managed multi-million dollar businesses for these companies.



Nonfiction Book Group - October 17



Join us on Monday, October 17 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *The Cause: The American Revolution and Its Discontents* by Joseph Ellis.

"Ellis examines the American Revolution (known by American insurgents as "the Cause") through the events, motives, participants, and consequences that have often been mythologized, minimized, or forgotten. He relates the history from often conflicting viewpoints on both the British and American sides and warns readers to study the circumstances of the imperfect humans involved before judging them from a 21st-century perspective. Ellis argues that nationhood was not the generally accepted goal of the Cause, contrary to modern misconceptions. Instead, the Colonies' mistrust of a strong,

centralized imperial British government both fueled and jeopardized independence, resulting in a deliberately weak coalition of 13 independently managed states that couldn't effectively fund and execute the war or plan a fiscally or politically viable future. Ironically, Ellis argues, leaders of the Cause tried to maintain precarious national unity and win independence for white people by delaying freedom and equity for Black people, Indigenous peoples, and women. He concludes that the legacy of these strategies was antithetical to the Cause, the goals of which have yet to be fully realized. VERDICT Ellis's witty style and astute analysis make this essential reading for historians and enthusiasts at all levels who want to disentangle the complex historiography of the American Revolution." (Library Journal, vol 146, issue 9, p76)

Adult Book Discussion - October 25



Join us on Tuesday, October 25 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Plague of Doves* by Louise Erdrich.

"The latest Erdrich novel about the Ojibwes and the whites they live among in North Dakota spirals around a terrible multiple murder that reverberates down through generations of a community. In the 1960s, Evelina Harp's Ojibwe grandfather, Mooshum, tells mesmerizing stories of his past. Having found a murdered family and saved the surviving baby, Mooshum and three Ojibwe friends were blamed for the killings and lynched by a mob of local whites in 1911. For reasons not immediately apparent, Mooshum was

spared at the last moment, but his friends died. Evelina's first boyfriend is Corwin Peace, whose ancestor was one of those lynched. Her favorite teacher, a nun, descends from one of the mob leaders. And Evelina's middle-class parents of mixed heritage straddle the two cultures. Aunt Neve Harp sent her banker husband, who is Corwin's father, to prison after he arranged Neve's kidnapping by Corwin's then teenage uncle Billy in a phony ransom subplot (a little reminiscent of the movie Fargo). Spiritual Billy evolves into the tyrannical leader of a religious cult until his wife Marn Wolde, the daughter of farmers whose land he's taken over, kills him to save her children. While in college Evelina ends up briefly in a mental hospital where she gets to know Marn's lunatic uncle Warren. Corwin, under the positive influence of Judge Coutts and his new wife, Evelina's Aunt Geraldine, becomes a musician playing the same violin that once belonged to his ancestors. Judge Coutts's previous lover Cordelia, an older woman and a doctor who won't treat Indians, was once saved by Mooshum and his friends. Guilt and redemption pepper these self-sufficient, intertwining stories, and readers who can keep track of the characters will find their efforts rewarded. The magic lies in the details of Erdrich's everreplenishing mythology, whether of a lost stamp collection or a boy's salvation. A lush, multilayered book." Kirkus Reviews

Spooky Science - October 17



Scarborough Marsh: from yesterday to tomorrow at a Maine iconby Alan Buncher

A local author explores the history and environmental significance of this great local natural treasure. From the finding of mammoth bones to the indigenous people that made use of this resource, to how newly settled farmers "improved" what nature provided. Today it is used for oyster farming and recreation: birding, kayaking, fishing, and hiking. The author used Kickstarter to finance the publication of this coffee table book. The beautiful photography helps to get you better acquainted with this neighbor, especially if you have only known it as you drove by on Route 1.

Hamnet by Maggie O'Farrell

A Shakespeare like character is followed from boyhood to falling in love, to having children as he continues to deal with his family of origin. As a young married man, he leaves his wife and family behind to bring the family glove business to London. Instead, he achieves success as a playwright and becomes rich. We follow a flea from its boarding a ship to ending up infecting the playwright's daughter with the dreaded plague. The author takes us there to that place of grief with a light touch but crisp with honesty. Historical fiction at its finest: cultural context, character development, daily life, and believable relationships. The writing is engaging and beautiful, I loved this book.

Luzzu a film by Alex Camilleri

A real-life Maltese fisherman, Jesmark Scicluna won a Sundance Jury Prize for his portrayal of a Maltese fisherman. Jesmark is struggling to support his wife and new baby using the same traditional, multicolored, leaky luzzu boat that his father and grandfather used before him. A Maine fisherman would find a lot in common with his situation. I value this movie because of the beautiful photography, human perseverance, and a "real" presentation of current cultural issues in Malta.

Bloody Jack Series – L.A. Meyer (audiobook review)

This spring I found myself in a listening rut. None of my audiobook choices were hitting the spot for my commute to work and I found myself not paying attention to the narrators and not following the story. What I was lacking was some action. Having joined many friends and coworkers in adoration of HBO's Our Flag Means Death pirate series, I wanted more high seas antics, quests, and swashbuckling! At a friend's urging, I checked out Bloody Jack by L.A. Meyer on CloudLibrary. This would be the first of the complete series of twelve novels in the Bloody Jack series I devoured over the next six

months.

Following the story of Jacky Faber, a girl living in poverty on the streets of London in 1803 who poses as a ship's boy to take on a life in the British Navy, this series ticked every box I had. The novels follow Jacky as she gets herself into countless impossible, preposterous, and utterly delightful conundrums- think fighting off pirates, becoming one herself, joining the Napoleonic Wars as a messenger, voyages to the Australian penal colonies, diving for sunken treasure, running a traveling theater as she sails the length of the Mississippi in the then-frontier of America, and on and on. This series never had a dull moment and was endlessly entertaining. Narrator Katherine Kellgren provides a bottomless well of voices and accents for myriad characters throughout the entire series, all distinct and always animated and expressive. The series is aimed at a young adult audience (or up) and follows Jacky's adventures from ages 12 to 19, with each book increasing in theme and tone as she ages. If you need a classic adventure series to jumpstart your imagination, head to CloudLibrary to find the entire series in both eBook and audiobook formats, or to the Minerva catalog to find them in print.

Dinner Pies - Ken Haedrich

Several years ago my mother came to visit me when I was living in England determined to travel to Highclere Castle, better known as Downton Abbey.
