Estate Planning Basics - October 3

Join us on Tuesday, October 3 at 6:00 for a crash course on estate planning. This program will be a great starting point for anyone who wants the protection of an estate plan but doesn't know where to start. Attorney Erin Sherman from Treehouse Legal in Kennebunk will cover the basics of an estate plan, including describing what is typically included in a plan, how to provide for minor and adult children, and the differences between a Will and a Trust. You will

leave the session having a better understanding of what documents will be right for you and your family, with resources on how to take the next step. There will be time reserved for general estate planning questions at the end.

Erin Sherman lives with her family in Arundel, Maine and has been practicing law for seven years. She holds a Bachelor of Science in Sustainable Design and a Juris Doctor in Law, both from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Erin recently opened her own law practice, Treehouse Legal, in Kennebunk where she focuses on Estate Planning, Business Planning and Real Estate. Erin's goal with Treehouse Legal is to create a community resource and eliminate barriers many people face in reaching out for legal assistance. She focuses on outreach, education, and an easygoing, down-to-earth approach in order to empower families to get their affairs in place, so that they can get back to the things they love doing with peace of mind.

Finding Our Voices - October 18

The Kennebunk Free Library is working with the York Public Library, Wells Public Library, Rice Public Library in Kittery, through an initiative with the statewide nonprofit Finding Our Voices to break the silence during Domestic Abuse Awareness Month in October.

The events are part of the Finding Our Voices "Let's Talk About It" fall tour in York County, Mount Desert Island, Millinocket, Damariscotta, and Camden ending the stigma and shame that are key factors in keeping women and children trapped in domestic

abuse, according to Patrisha McLean, president/founder of Finding Our Voices.

On Wednesday, October 18 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., domestic abuse survivors will be at Kennebunk Free Library to share their stories and then lead a community conversation centered around emotional abuse and the impact on children. This will be preceded by powerful short films on the topic. An additional event will be held Tuesday, October 17 at the York Public Library from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. During this month, all four participating York County Libraries will exhibit Finding Our Voices posters, featuring the photo portraits of 45 Maine domestic abuse survivors aged 18 to 83. Accompanying posters will present details of the abuse they transcended that tie in personal experiences with the universal tactics that abusers use to get and maintain control of the intimate partners they claim to love.

Finding Our Voices is survivors of domestic abuse breaking the silence of domestic abuse through bold public awareness as well as financial assistance and programs including dignified, pro bono dental care for Maine's women and children survivors. Gathering and amplifying voices, the grassroots nonprofit galvanizes action toward more safety, rights, services, and justice for Maine women and children.


The group was founded in 2021 by the photojournalist Patrisha McLean after worldwide headlines on the domestic violence arrest of her then-husband Don "American Pie" McLean broke her own silence of 29 years.

Adult Book Discussion - October 24

Join us on Tuesday, October 24 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *In the Time of the Butterflies* by Julia Alvarez.

Brimming with warmth and vitality, this new novel by the author of How the Garcia Girls Lost Their Accents (1991) is a paean to the power of female courage. The butterflies are four smart and lovely Dominican sisters growing up during Trujillo's despotic regime. While her parents try desperately to cling to their imagined island of security in a swelling sea of fear and intimidation, Minerva Mirabal -- the sharpest and boldest of the daughters, born with a fierce will to fight injustice -- jumps headfirst into the revolutionary tide. Her sisters come upon their courage more gradually, through a passionate, protective love of family or through the sheer impossibility of closing their eyes to the horrors around them. Together, their bravery and determination meld into a seemingly insurmountable force, making Trujillo, for all his power, appear a puny adversary. Alvarez writes beautifully, whether creating the ten-year-old Maria Teresa's charming diary entries or describing Minerva's trip home after her first unsettling confrontation with Trujillo: "As the road darkened, the beams of our headlights filled with hundreds of blinded moths. Where they hit the windshield, they left blurry marks, until it seemed like I was looking at the world through a curtain of tears." If the Mirabal sisters are ironwinged butterflies, their men -- father and husbands -- often resemble those blinded moths, feeble and fallible. Still, the women view them with kind, forgiving eyes, and though there's no question of which sex is being celebrated here, a sweet and accepting spirit toward frailty, if not human cruelty, prevails. This is not Garcia Márquez or Allende territory (no green hair or floating bodies); Alvarez's voice is her own, grounded in realism yet alive with the magic of everyday human beings who summon extraordinary courage and determination to fight for their beliefs. As mesmerizing as the Mirabal sisters themselves. (Kirkus Reviews, August 15, 1994)

Junior Science - October 16



Not-So-Spooky KenneBOOnk Halloween - October 25



SPEERS GALLERY



October Artist: Linda K. Thompson

The Speers Gallery at the Kennebunk Free Library presents an eclectic retrospective, "Celebrating the Creative Process" by Kennebunk resident Linda K. Thompson that will run October 3-30. The public is invited to an opening reception on Wednesday, October 4 from 5:30-7:00 pm.

The exhibit's overarching theme is

exploration of various mediums and techniques, ranging from watercolor, acrylics and collage in the Speers Gallery, and weaving, needlework, and Japanese woodblock printing in a library foyer display case. Linda believes that 'making art' is not only about technique, but also finding a balance between that, and a passion or relationship with the subject of your creation.

In "Celebrating the Creative Process" the artist portrays a wide range of subjects, which 'reflect her curiosity in the world around her'. Using a range of mediums, her

art is grouped thematically, including flowers, landscapes, the ocean, the Southwest, trees, bears and collage. In the foyer the artist hopes that some of her pieces will encourage others to try different materials or crafts. A fun 'quiz' will be provided by the artist for adults and children.

Linda's journey into the arts includes a M. Ed in Creative Arts & Learning from Lesley University, as well as courses and workshops in Massachusetts at the Danforth and DeCordova Museums, Concord Art Association and Rowe Conference Center. In Maine she continued her journey at the Heartwood College of Art, River Tree Arts, local adult ed classes and U of Maine Senior College, where she also taught a beginning watercolor class. Particularly formative were week-long art retreats in New Mexico: *Painting from the Source*, and *Wild Heart Art*, as well as *Watercolor Mandalas* at the former Marie Joseph Spiritual Center in Biddeford Pool. The artist says that "what helps ignite my creativity is curiosity, intuition, exploration, experimentation, challenge...and playfulness"!

Kennebunk Free Library is excited to display this unique exhibit.

Lady Tan's Circle of Women by Lisa See

Lisa See is a wonderful author of Chinese historical fiction from the prospective of women. In this book, her most recent, she focusses on a true story of a 15th century Chinese female physician. While it is a great story of the life of an amazing woman, it gives us so many details about the use of herbs and natural methods. The practice of foot binding of daughters is "explained" and does a good job of helping the reader understand how such a practice became part of the culture. Read this book and you will find yourself reaching for others written by the author. (Available from KFL as a book, large print, audio and on Libby.)

The Midnight Library – Matt Haig

Again, I want to recommend the book that was read and discussed by the KFL Adult Book Discussion group and was liked by all. Several of us found the idea of being presented with "a book of my regrets" to be a useful tool in our life today. Though we have all read other time travel books this one has the focus of finding what would make you content with your life, always a good reminder. (Available from KFL as a book and through Minerva as an audio on cd.)

Are You There God, It's Me, Margaret directed by Kelly Fremon Craig, based on the book by Judy Blume

Whether you were a young person in the 60's or just want a realistic view of what we lived through, this movie can take you there. Remember the "becoming a woman" or man film at school? So embarrassing. How about the different rates of physical development among your classmates? I found the memories fun. There are some more serious issues that come up: Margaret's dad is Jewish; her mom is Christian, and mom's parents disown her because of the marriage. When Margaret finds this out, she has been having private conversations with God but decides she hates religion. Circumstances lead to her exploring various faiths. I enjoyed the actors I am not familiar with, but Kathy Bates as her Jewish Grandmother was great. (Available from KFL.)
