Now Accepting Artist Applications

The Kennebunk Free Library is currently accepting applications for artists to exhibit during the 2025 calendar year. Since its inception in 2001, Hank's Room Gallery - rechristened the Speers Gallery in 2010 has offered exhibit opportunities to both amateur and professional artists. The gallery has hosted a variety of mediums including photography, textile arts and mixed media assemblages in addition to renditions in oil, pastel, enamel oil, encaustic, pen and ink, and watercolor.

The application process is open to either individual or group shows. Applications must be received by Friday, October 18, 2024.

In November 2024 an art committee consisting of members from the Library and art communities will convene to review the completed applications and set a monthly exhibit schedule for 2025. Upon completion of the review, applicants will be contacted regarding the Committee's decisions. Application

forms are available at the Library or on the Library's website.

Offering monthly artist exhibits contributes to the Kennebunk Free Library's mission to inspire and enable our communities to discover, learn, and connect. The Library is very proud to have showcased the many talented artists who have previously exhibited and is looking forward to continuing this tradition with the 2025 exhibit schedule.




Poet Richard Westley - September 7

Spanish Conversation Group -September 9, 16, 23, 30



Die Well Death Education - September 23


Join us at Kennebunk Free Library on Monday, September 23, 2024 from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. for the fifth session in the Die Well Death Education Series with host Leona Oceania. You are welcome to attend one or all of the sessions - no registration is required.

Session Five is a film - Letting Go: A Hospice Journey.

For terminally ill patients and their families, hospice can provide an opportunity to find comfort, companionship, and peace in the weeks, days, hours, and moments before death. Taking an intimate look at three patients – an eight-year-old

boy with an incurable brain disease, a 46-year-old woman with lung cancer, and a 62-year-old man with an inoperable brain tumor – this program shows how hospice care helps them cope with fear and pain in the final stages of their lives and prepares loved ones for their imminent loss. In addition to extensive footage of the hospice patients and their families, the program sheds light on the decision-making process of the doctors, nurses, chaplains, social workers, and volunteers involved in hospice. Fiction Book Discussion - September 24


Join us on Tuesday, September 24 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *Out of Darkness* by Ashley Hope Perez.

"A Mexican-American girl and a black boy begin an ill-fated love in the months leading up to a catastrophic 1937 school explosion in East Texas. The powerful story opens with the legendary school explosion in New London and then rewinds to September 1936. Naomi has begrudgingly left behind her abuelitos in San Antonio for a new life with her younger half siblings, twins, and their long-absent white father, Henry. Now a born-again Christian, Henry struggles to atone for his sins. The siblings struggle to fit into the segregated oil town, where store signs boast "No Negroes, Mexicans, or dogs." The precocious twins read better than half the senior class, and dark-

skinned Naomi is guilty of not only being Mexican, but also of being "prettier than any girl in school." Their one friend is Wash, a brilliant African-American senior from the black part of town. Perez deftly weaves multiple perspectives, "including Henry and "the Gang," the collective voice of the racist students, "into her unflinchingly intense narrative, but the story ultimately belongs to Naomi and Wash. Their beautifully detailed love story blossoms in the relative seclusion of the woods, where even stepfathers can't keep them apart. But as heartbreaking events unfold, the star-crossed lovers desperately hope that any light can penetrate the black smoke cloud of darkness spreading around them. A powerful, layered tale of forbidden love in times of unrelenting racism." -Kirkus Reviews, June 1, 2015

Author Susan Doherty -September 25

On Wednesday, September 25 at 6:00 p.m.,



the Kennebunk Free Library will host author Susan Doherty as she discusses her new book *Monday Rent Boy.* Copies of the book will be available for purchase and signing at the event.

Susan Doherty's award-winning debut novel, A Secret Music (2015), was followed four years later by award-winning The Ghost Garden, the biography of a woman living with schizophrenia. She has worked on staff for Maclean's, and freelanced for the International Herald Tribune, La Tribune de Genève, and the Independent in London; for eighteen years she ran her own

advertising production company. She has served on the boards of the Royal Conservatory of Music, the Quebec Writers' Federation and Nazareth House, a home for those afflicted by addiction and homelessness. Since 2009, she has volunteered at the Douglas Institute, a psychiatric hospital, working with people living with severe mental illness. She is married to the educator Hal Hannaford.

Beadcraft - September 4



September Artist: Kid Creations

The Speers Gallery at the Kennebunk Free Library presents the exhibit "Kid Creations", featuring art made by children during the library's Messy Art program. The exhibit will be shown during the months of September and October.

The Messy Art program invited kids to get dirty while creating art! Over 30 pieces were created by children ages 3-11 over the course of an afternoon in July, including stomp art done with bubble wrapped feet dipped in paint, watercolor with spray bottles, and painting with everyday items such as sponges, spoons and spatulas.

The children experimented with process art, with the goal being the experience itself instead of the result. Kennebunk

A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR



I thought I'd use this opportunity to *very* briefly describe the role of each of our staff positions. I can't stress enough that these are quite simplified and generalized versions of much longer job descriptions. And, on top of that, everyone contributes well beyond their job descriptions.

Administrative Assistant: Processes income and expenses, prepares mailings, and provides general office support.

Assistant Director/Head of Adult Services: Adult programming and collection development, supervises adult staff, payroll, bookkeeping, and

HR.

Cataloger: Makes library materials findable. Organizes library and local history.

Circulation Services Manager: In charge of all materials going in and out of the library and between other libraries. Managers volunteers and creates the schedule.

Development Director: Manages fundraising efforts and cultivates relationships.

Executive Director: Oversees all library activities and staff. Works alongside the Board of Trustees to manage the facility, finances, policies, and public relations.

Head of Youth Services/Children's Librarian: Youth programming and collection development, supervises youth staff.

Library Assistant: Adult and Youth Services desk staff. They are constantly working hard on tasks when they are not serving the public.

Library Page: Shelves library materials and an on-the-floor person that helps with questions.

Maintenance Manager: Performs all janitorial tasks and general building and grounds upkeep. Coordinates with contractors on larger projects.

Technology Educator: Teaches technology to patrons and manages KFL's internal technology. Teen programming.

Hello Beautiful by Ann Napolitano

William was just a few days old when tragedy struck his family sending his parents into deep grief that they never recovered from. As children do, he figured out a way to survive in this sad environment and finally found solace in basketball. In High School he met a wonderful young woman, Julia who had three sisters. The four of them were extraordinarily close and imagined themselves in the roles of Little Women by Louisa May Alcott. The sister's father, Charlie was a loving, kind and connected parent but a great disappointment to his wife who carried the burdens of home and finances, often by herself. When Charlie suddenly dies the family is swept into turmoil and the stage is set for a heartbreaking and very believable story of a family struggling to deal with hard life events. Beautifully written, allowing the reader to care deeply for the characters as they grow through the decades. (Available from KFL as a book, Minerva in large print and audio cds)

A Beginner's Guide to American Mah Jongg by Elaine Sandburg

While camping in Naples, Maine last September, I was taught to play "Mahj" by a wonderful group at Naples Library. I was given a copy of this book to study and with their kind help, I was able to learn enough to play in three meetings. I was addicted. With the support of KFL, we formed our group of learners in January of this year and most of them successfully play and have fun. It is a great way to meet new friends and keep our brains working. If you are interested, consider checking out this book. The beginning of the book gives you history and background. The next part gives you exercises with the tiles to learn the suits and patterns.
