Temporary Change in Hours at KFL



KFL will have a new HVAC system installed during December and January. "We are very excited to have an efficient and energyconscious system installed," stated Library Director Jill LeMay, "especially after a summer without air conditioning!" KFL Board of Trustees selected the bid from Mechanical Services in Portland to install the new system; the work will begin Mon., Dec. 9th.

In order to allow both enough time in a workday as well as access to the Library by patrons, Mechanical Services will tailor their work days, beginning at 4:30 AM until 1 PM. The Library will adopt the following schedule for the month of December:

- Mon., Tues., Wed., & Thurs., 1 PM to 8 PM
- Fridays from 1 PM to 6 PM
- Saturdays from 9:30 AM to 5 PM.

A schedule of hours for January will be announced soon.

"By staying open later in the evenings, we hope to continue to offer our services and collections to patrons," said LeMay.

Library programs that typically occur in the morning, such as our book groups, children's programs and knitting programs will be rescheduled to the afternoon or go on an early December break. Please consult our website <u>calendar</u>, <u>email</u>us, or call 985-2173 for all the details.

Let's get the most frequently asked question out of the way first: How do you pronounce Birthisel? She also thinks that you should read *Ender's Shadow* - ask her why. But sci-fi and fantasy aren't her only literary loves. Krissy lists *Anne of Green Gables* as one of her all-time favorites. An avid knitter, Krissy developed the Nifty Knitters club which meets every Tuesday. Whether you're just learning or an experienced knitter, you're welcome to drop in for advice or just for the company of other knitters.

Julie Hoyle

Have you met our newest Library Assistant yet? Julie comes to us from the D.A. Hurd Library in North Berwick. She also worked at the Waterford Library and the library at York County Community College. She holds a B.S. in Information and Library Services from the UMaine at Augusta.



Julie grew up in North Conway, NH. Despite living close to the mountains, she prefers skating to skiing. Julie moved to Maine about 20 years ago, and has raised her children, ages 15-27, here.

Julie really lights up when she talks about or demonstrates her love of crafting. She is self taught, making costumes and other sewing projects with her children while they were growing. Currently, she is teaching herself how to quilt. All of us in the Children's Room are benefiting from her skills, as she has introduced simple crafts after her storytimes, and has created a "Make It and Take It" station at one of the play tables. Children who attend her American Girls book group will be introduced to embroidery and other intricate crafts often employed by children in years past.

The newest member of the adult circulation staff, Molly joined us at the end of June. She is a graduate of Bates College and received her Masters in Library Science from Simmons University in Boston. She also graduated from the Salt Institute for Documentary Studies in Portland. A radio documentary that she



produced there - Besides Life Here - was purchased by several public radio affiliates.

Molly's focus is oral history. Before moving back to Maine, she spent two years at the Wisconsin Veteran's Museum in Madison, recording the histories of veterans from WWII through our most recent wars.

When she's not at KFL, Molly is busy running two businesses. Through her company Felt Life, she records personal oral histories for her clients. She is also a partner in Oral History and Folklife Research, Inc., a nonprofit dedicated to preserving Maine's history. She's a great resource if you're looking for history or biography books.

Introducing the Young Adult (at Heart) Book Group

In the 1700's when novels were a new invention embraced mostly by the young, parents were horrified. Their children were going to be corrupted. These novels would bring about a new sort of world, lacking any sense of morality. Unfortunately, criticism of young adult literature has not altered much in the last 300 years. YA still tops the most frequently banned books lists. What the critics are missing, though, is that today's young adult literature is really good.

The YA industry is currently producing some of our best literature. It's creative, it's often more concise than adult literature, and despite complaints that it presents only a

Dystopian Literature



November 22nd marked the much anticipated movie release of Catching Fire, the second book in the Hunger Games trilogy by Suzanne Collins. In 2008, the first Hunger Games book was published, and with its publication, and subsequent success, a demand for YA dystopian literature began.

What is dystopian literature? Dystopia is the opposite of utopia--a settlement or culture characterized by harmony, peace, and goodwill. It is

overseen by skillful governments and institutions enacting enlightened, rational policies. On the other hand, a dystopia is a dark future place where societies have been severely compromised. This dismantling of culture arises from a variety of sources, by ecological disaster and dwindling natural resources, or by government, nations, and institutions suppressing human freedoms. Those who lead are motivated by self-interest, greed, power and a thirst for human bloodshed. Human beings, pitted against each other, are discouraged from any acts of human cooperation or goodwill. Most authors of dystopian fiction explore at least one reason why things are that way, often as an analogy for similar issues in the real world.

The tone in a dystopian novel (sometimes referred to as apocalyptic literature) is often bleak and menacing, but the themes are thought-provoking. Perhaps teens are drawn to these themes as it allows them to confront in their own imaginations a future compromised and irrevocably changed by ecological disaster and how young people will go about rebuilding society.

With the publication of The Hunger Games, an appetite for YA dystopian literature was unleashed. If you are interested in reading dystopian novels, try <u>Divergent</u> by Veronica Roth, <u>The Testing</u> by Joelle Charbonneau, <u>Legend</u> by Marie Lu, or <u>Life as We Knew It</u> by Susan Beth Pfeffer.
