Library Tidbits: Customizing Your Account

We know that you are as happy as we are that interlibrary loans are back and are eager to pick up all of your holds! This a perfect time to talk about how notifications work. If you have an email listed in the Minerva system, all notifications - including hold pickups and overdue notices - are going to come that way. We don't send those emails directly. The computer system batch generates them and sends them out daily. Because of

this, your email might interpret these emails as spam. If you've ever had a hold that you didn't get notified about, that may be why.

One option to ensure that you don't miss a hold is to [opt into text notifications](#). It takes less than a minute. Just go to the library catalog, log into your account, click on "modify personal information," add your cell phone number, and check the box beside opt in. Unlike email notices, text notices are instantaneous. The minute your hold goes on the shelf, you'll get a text about it.

While you are in your account, check out another feature that you might enjoy: reading history. If you opt in, your account will keep a list of all of the items that you borrow going forward. For privacy reasons, that information is not stored in our circulation system. If you opt in, librarians still will not have access to your reading history - it will be accessible through your online account only.

Great news: Our beautifully restored windows will be coming back this month! Work will begin on November 11 and last one to two weeks. There will be closures in the Walker and Reading Rooms during this time and limited access to the Young Adult fiction collection and the periodicals.

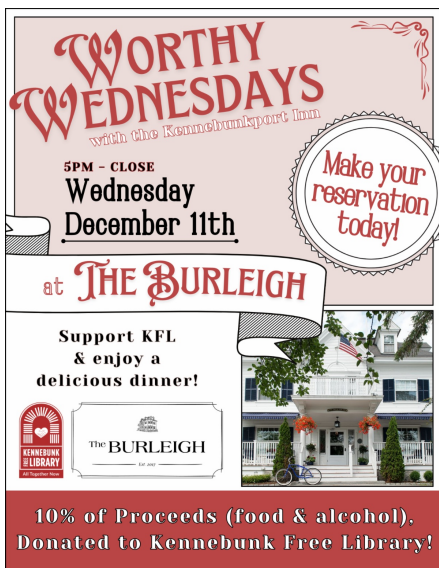


Wine Tasting Fundraiser - November 12

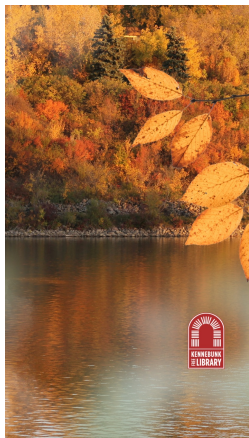

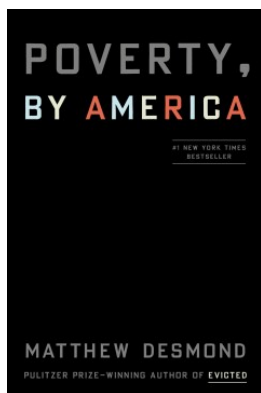

Interactive Learning: Engage in lively discussions and a dynamic Q&A session, where Briana will share her insights and answer your burning questions about songwriting and the music industry.

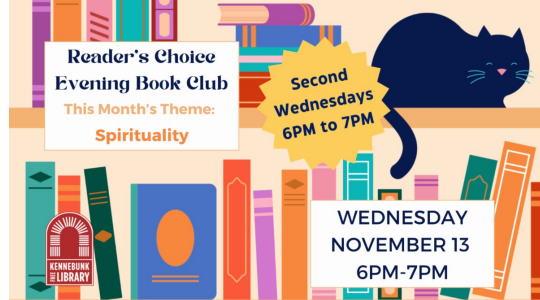

Life in 600 Words is a collection of 99 essays, nearly all of which have appeared previously in the pages of the now-defunct Biddeford *Journal-Tribune* and/or the still-extant Windham Eagle, and/or the *Portland Press Herald*. The subjects include (but are not limited to) the COVID pandemic, shopping for mattresses, wrong-way drivers, the world's largest breadbox, and towels with first names. The issues explored in these written discourses vary widely, but all have one thing in common: each consists of 600 words.

Andy Young is a former landscaper, radio announcer, algebra tutor, playground director, ditch digger, and basketball coach. He currently teaches English at Kennebunk High School, which he plans on continuing to do until he gets good at it.

Die Well Death Education - November 25

Join us at Kennebunk Free Library on Monday, November 25



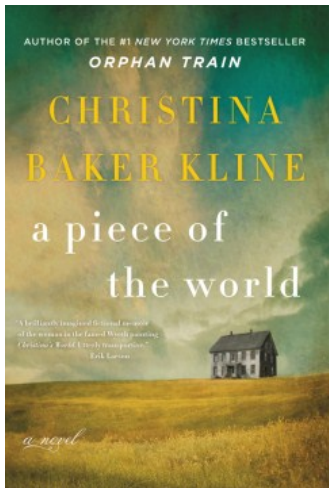
from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. for the seventh session in the Die Well Death Education Series with host Leona Oceania. You are welcome to attend one or all of the sessions - no registration is required.

For this session, we will discuss VSED: Voluntary Stopping of Eating and Drinking, which is a legal option for any mentally capable, determined, well-informed person as a means to advance the time of their death. VSED requires significant caregiving and support, which we will discuss further.

Short Film: *Dying Wish: A Dying Doctor's Decision to Stop Eating and Drinking and Die with Grace*

Retired surgeon Michael Miller is dying of end-stage cancer and is determined to avoid the hospital at all costs. He's researched the dying process and believes that stopping eating and drinking will ease his suffering and result in a peaceful, more natural death. During his fast, Michael suffers neither thirst nor hunger. Buoyed by the legacy of this film, he enjoys a last meal, surrounds himself with art and music, and takes leave of his family. Medical ethicists speak about patients' rights, and hospice staff share their own, similar experiences of others who have made this choice. (29 minutes)

Fiction Book Discussion - December 10 (no November meeting)

Join us on **Tuesday, December 10** at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *A Piece of the World* by Christina Baker Kline. The Fiction Book Discussion does not meet in November, and meets on the 2nd Tuesday of December instead.

"The world of the woman immortalized in Andrew Wyeth's haunting painting *Christina's World* is imagined in Kline's (Orphan Train) intriguing novel. The artist meets Christina Olson in 1939 when he summers near her home in Cushing, Maine, introduced by Betsy James, the young woman who knew the Olsons and would become Wyeth's wife. The story is told from Christina's point of view, from the moment she reflects on the painting; it then goes back and forth

through her history, from her childhood through the time that Wyeth painted at her family farm, using its environs and Christina and her brother as subjects. First encountering Christina as a middle-aged woman, Wyeth saw something in her that others did not. Their shared bond of physical infirmity (she had undiagnosed polio; he had a damaged right foot and bad hip) enables her to open up about her family and her difficult life, primarily as a shut-in, caring for her family, cooking, cleaning, sewing, and doing laundry—all without electricity and despite her debilitating disease. Hope of escape, when her teacher offers her the chance to take her place, was summarily quashed by her father. Her first and only romance with a summer visitor from Boston has an ignoble end when he marries someone in his social class. Through it all, the author's insightful, evocative prose brings Christina's singular perspective and indomitable spirit to life." — Publishers Weekly

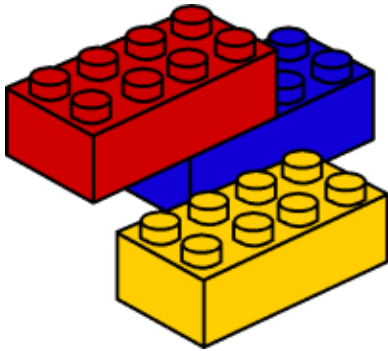

November Artist: Sally Berry Glenn

The Speers Gallery at the Kennebunk Free Library presents the exhibit "Painting Coastal Maine" by Sally Berry Glenn. The show will consist of over 30 original oil and watercolor paintings of local land and oceanscapes. The exhibit runs November 1-30 with an opening reception on Saturday, November 2 from 1-3 pm.

Sally is a native of Maine and has an Art History BA degree from Colby College. She has painted as a Plein Air artist in California and Maine since 1980!

Plein Air painting requires that an artist paint outside, on site, capturing a moment in time. After thorough research and doing a field study, on-site, Sally puts her painting on canvas in her studio.

Sally has studied with master artists, Peter Adams, president of the California Art Association, Kevin McPhearson, Camille Prizwodek, Ray Roberts and attended three Master week conferences in Monterey and Dana Point, CA. She has shown her work in many juried art shows including in the Portland Art Gallery for three years. Sally was a member of the American Impressionists Society, The California Art Club, and the Lincoln Hills Art Association for 13 years. She is currently a member of The River Tree Art Association in Kennebunk, Maine.

The Seed Keeper by Diane Wilson

This fictional story of Native American experiences of the past and their effect on generations since is important. In the last few years, apologies have been made to the Native People by governments and religious institutions. This book builds appreciation for Indigenous ways of being, knowing, and understanding the world. Getting to know the protagonist, a Dakhóta woman, Rosalie Iron Wing we quickly come to see how generational trauma stunts her life and forces her to make decisions that remove her from what she knows is true. Her marriage to a settler, who now owns what was her ancestral lands shows the contrast between her people's ways of caring for the land and water with the settler's way of embracing what the US government prescribes for land use. Scenes of violence and great heartache make for a very compelling story. (Available book from KFL and Cloud Library, audio from commercial sites)

Sex, Teens, and Everything in Between: The New and Necessary Conversations Today's Teenagers Need to Have about Consent, Sexual Harassment, Healthy Relationships, Love, and More by Shafia Zaloom

I wish I had this book when I was raising teens. I wish everyone raising them now would read this book. Many people wish that all kids would abstain from sex. The reality is that many don't. This book gives clear help for parents to talk with their kids about how wonderful sex can be and how fraught with complex issues, pain, trauma and anxiety that can accompany active sexuality in the real world. What consent means and the hard facts that spell out what cannot be consensual sex is clearly stated. Strategies to avoid exploitation of self and others are presented. Prepared parents can help their kids make decisions that are in their best interest. This book is not always comfortable to read but is so necessary. (Available book from Minerva.)
