Brian Selznick's inventive story recreates the effects of a silent film with pencil illustrations that draw the eye to minute details and changes of perspective. Nearly 300 pages of drawings alternate with pages of text to tell the story of young Hugo, an orphan living surreptitiously in the walls of a 1931 Parisian train station, and maintaining all of the clocks with perfect precision. His survival depends upon being invisible, yet he is caught stealing parts for a mechanical man, a leftover project

from his deceased father...



Kindles and Nooks Now at KFL

KFL is pleased to announce that we are now circulating Kindles and Nooks! Thanks to a grant from the Friends of the Library, two of each e-Reader has been purchased and pre-loaded with popular titles, both fiction and non-fiction.

Open to new technologies and changes in print format, we offer these e-Readers both as a convenience to our patrons and as a way to "test drive" the devices. Although patrons will not be able to download books onto our e-Readers, we will routinely update new titles onto them. Should you decide to buy your own e-Reader, you will find free e-books available from many sources (check our website under the "collections" tab to find a selection).

Training for using the Nook and Kindles will be available through classes and by appointment beginning November 1, 2011.

The fine print

Patrons will be asked to agree to the following:

- By checking out an e-Reader (Nook or Kindle) the borrower is assuming responsibility for any damage, loss, or theft of the device while it is checked out to you.
- The borrower must be a minimum of 18 years old with a library card in good standing (i.e. library account is not blocked due to unpaid fees or lost materials).
- Use of the e-Reader is restricted to the content installed. Do not register the device with a personal credit card to purchase items or downloading any additional content.
- Check out is limited to one e-Reader per household at any given time.
- Once an e-Reader is checked out, the device becomes the responsibility of the user.
- The borrower is responsible for the replacement cost of the e-Reader, its protective cover, USB cord, charger plug, and carrying case (\$200.00) as well as packaging and processing fee (\$50.00) for a total of \$250.00.
- The e-Reader must be returned inside the library directly to a staff member. The device may not be left on the circulation desk or returned in the outdoor or building drop boxes.
- A minimum fee of \$25.00 will be charged for unnecessary risk to the device if the e-Reader is returned to a drop box.
- Late return fee is \$1.00 per day.

We look forward to this new reading experience, and appreciate your feedback.
