The fourth Saturday of the season, Valley met Dover, opening Lakeland Conference play. On a muddy field the Valley team excelled by scoring five touchdowns; final score, 31-0. The following week Valley traveled to Boonton to play a strong Bomber team. The combination of a slow start and a hepped-up Boonton team put the only blemish of the season on the Valley record. With four minutes play remaining, Tony Borino scored the tying touchdown that prevented the loss. The final score, Valley 13—Boonton 13.

Perhaps the greatest triumph of the season came the following Saturday. An overflow crowd of 4500 people packed the Butler arena to witness the battle for the leadership of the Conference. The PV players were at their peak, scoring three touchdowns against one of the strongest teams in North Jersey, and holding the highest scoring team in the state scoreless.

The beginning of the end of Butler's Conference supremacy came with less than two minutes gone in the first quarter. Cerruti threw a twenty-yard pass to Borino; then Tony sprinted thirty-five yards for the first Valley touchdown. After the half-time intermission, the Valley team came back

even stronger, scoring a touchdown in each of the last two quarters. The hard running of fullback Bob Curto helped set up the Valley TD's. Final score, 20-0. This victory gave Valley a shot at the Conference title.

We came closer to the title when the Newton team was defeated a week later by the score of 25-0. In this game Tony Borino scored three six-pointers. The Conference Championship became ours when our arch rival, Wayne, came to Walton Field on November 11. During the game, it became evident that the Hornets were not to be denied the Championship; and in the end a struggling Wayne team went down to defeat 19-7.


The last game of the 1961 season was a tremendous victory for the Green and White, who beat a Manchester team 43-0, setting a new single game scoring record.

Thus came an end to the most vic-



The 1961 cross country season was the most successful season ever had by a PVHS team of any kind. The season opened on September 26 at the Garret Mountain course against Don Bosco Tech. Junior Tom Mizzone led the Hornet Harriers across the finish line. He was followed by Senior Ken Samra. This combination of Mizzone and Samra set a pattern for eleven of the team's twelve dual meets.

The first five runners to cross the line in the Tech meet were from Valley. This meet started the long list of shutouts. Wayne and Belleville were added to this list. Next, a triangular contest with Clifton and Bloomfield was held, which was another victory for Valley. The first and only dual meet of the year in which the Green and White did not shut out the opposition was against Boonton. The Bombers managed to take fourth place while Valley took nine of the first ten places. The team then settled down to take Butler, Eastern Christian, Passaic, and Dover in 15-40 fashion.

The Lakeland Conference meet was held at Garret Mountain on October 24. Our boys took seven of the top ten places with Tom Mizzone

setting a league record by running the course in twelve minutes and four seconds. Ken Samra finished second and Ed Schopperth was third. Others to place in the top ten were Tim Baird and Tom Lee, Senior Sal Olivito and Sophomore Jim Hagman.

Eastside, Mountain, Montclair, and West Essex were added to the list of Valley's shutouts. The biggest shutout of the year came when the team blanked all of Passaic County in a meet held at Garret Mountain. The Valley Harriers also won the first Paterson State Invitational meet.

Coach Tom Patierno's boys, Conference and County Champs, were not satisfied to settle for these victories. They wanted the big one—The New Jersey State Interscholastic AA Group III crown. So, on Saturday, November 18, the Green and White traveled to Warinanco Park, Elizabeth, to face the best Group III schools in the state. With great determination they won that title—the first state title ever won by a PV team.


