Medway Public Library Director's Report May 1, 2023

In March, patrons used curbside checkout and home delivery 59 times.

Our people counter reported that approximately 4,468 people used the library during March.

Meeting rooms were used 111 times in April. Approximately half of the usage was for library programs, and half by Town committees and other local groups.

Children's/YA Librarian Report:

Regular programs:

We have achieved one of our "be more user-friendly" goals: programming consistency. Starting the week of April 10, families with small children could drop in any weekday at 11 for a program. Because we always have one. While Toddler Jam (Monday, Tuesday) is geared for...toddlers, Move, Groove, and Learn! (Friday) is meant for preschoolers ages 3 and up. We also split up our It's Story Time! groups into It's Toddler Story Time! (Wednesday) and It's Preschool Story Time! (Thursday). The weekly theme for both groups is the same, as is the pool of books, although each day may feature different selections from that pool. Wednesday's session involves stories and a coloring sheet (with the occasional fun activity--like Earth Day seed planting--thrown in). Thursday's session usually involves a nonfiction introduction to the theme followed by stories, songs, felt board activities, and a craft encouraging creativity and targeted fine motor skills.

This is a serendipitous development resulting from splitting the storytime duties over the winter while I was gone, and the groups settled out beautifully based on the different styles of the staff presenters. Miss Jill (Wednesdays) thrills the littles with exuberant storytelling, and Miss Jennifer captivates the preschoolers with sensory trays, interactivity, and extension activities. I am thrilled both Miss Jill and Miss Jennifer want to continue with their respective sessions and am grateful to team with Miss Jennifer to offer a program that is elevated far above what I would be able to offer by myself.

We also team up on Fridays for Move, Groove, and Learn!, the slightly louder and more prop-laden music program that hopes to pick up the graduates of Miss Amy's Toddler Jam. Our first three sessions went well, with small (select!) groups. The program is seasonally based, so the song and story rotation changes quarterly. Miss Jennifer and I are already looking forward to the summer session and changing some of the songs, but we've been very happy with the paddle props that Diane Busa made for us using the Silhouette cutter.

Toddler Jam has been steady, and Miss Amy is excited to take the program back into the park (Cassidy Field) beginning May 1. (That is, she is excited about the concept. She reports an 80% chance of rain on Monday, but if that happens, we will simply test our inclement weather announcement plan and welcome the program back into the library for the day.)

The middle schoolers on Wednesday afternoon have turned out to be big Bingo fans. Go figure. We've had a few lively student-called sessions, and will haul that out again before the end of the year. In May we will try Switch gaming tournaments with this group, as Diane, Jennifer, and I finally piloted one and were able to hook up the gaming system to the projector, pair all the controllers to the correct console, and have a successful split-screen Mario Kart race against each other ALL WITHOUT CALLING OUR KIDS TO TROUBLESHOOT.

The first instance of Unicorn Club was serene and lovely. Miss Jennifer and I will be moving this club to a Monday in May, because scheduling it on a Saturday was sub-optimal. PAWS to Read resumed with Sprite and Harlow and was well-received. Read the Rainbow was held outside, but neither the theme nor the weather were sufficient incentive for participation. Amanda and I are taking the next few months off from this program, and will hold a revamped version in July and August to fit in with Translate Gender's slate of summer programming.

Special Programs:

Diane put together a planting activity for Earth Day, so all participants in Earth Day week storytimes planted either peas or beans in containers they decorated and labeled. She also prepared 24 grab-and-go planting kits for the downstairs lobby. They went quickly!

Jennifer's sensory bins and investigation tables continue to serve as great visit extenders, as children come to the department to find books or play, and end up cycling through the various stations (sometimes more than once). Some kids make a beeline for the stations, now. They look for them, have grown to expect them, and seem to find them an integral part of an enriched library experience.

Our poetry month passive programming saw a nice bit of participation, and a number of patrons (kids and adults both!) walked away with coupons for a free book from the Friends' book sale in exchange for a haiku or a poem. May will focus on art and nature.

Amanda helped (enormously) in weeding the children's and YA collections this past month. We're almost done with this round. At her suggestion, we added a pull-out Magic School Bus collection to the themed mini-collections in the children's area. Previously, those titles were shelved separately by call number--they lived very far apart and would require catalog searching to be found. Their primary users do not yet conduct catalog searches, and seem to appreciate having these materials collated.

In May we'll be doing lots of planning for summer reading, and our collection development goal is to increase ease of use/findability of early chapter books. We will start separating them into their own section in the J room, because they are currently shelved among the middle-grade material.
