



How does a bill become a law?





Introducing Legislation in NH

- State Senators and Representatives have an idea for legislation
 - Fixing a problem for constituents, creating a new program, updating regulations, etc
 - Constituents, local officials, special interest or advocacy groups, or it was their idea
 - \circ ~ The legislator who introduces the bill is called the "sponsor"
- There is a filing period---about 1 week---in early-September for State Representatives to file legislation with the Office of Legislative Services
 - \circ $\;$ During election years, there is also a period after the General Election $\;$
- The filing period for State Senators is begins in October and end in November
 State Senators can also decide when their drafted legislation will become public
- When legislation is first filed, it is called a Legislative Service Request (LSR)
- The LSR receives a number and the language becomes public



From a Legislative Service Request to a Bill

- The leader of each legislative chamber---House Speaker and Senate President---reviews the topic matter of each Legislative Service Request (LSR) and assigns the bill to a Standing Committee
 - "Standing Committee[s]" is the official term for committees that exist to review bills
 - Ex. Education, Finance, Ways & Means, Resources & Development, etc
- Once an LSR is assigned to a committee, it receives a bill number
 Ex. HB123 or SB567
- Bills that are assigned to a committee become the committee's possession
 - \circ ~ The bill's sponsors and and cosponsors lose control over the the bill and its contents

The Committee Process

- A Public Hearing is scheduled and the date and time is posted on the respective chambers meeting schedule
 - House of Representatives Meeting Schedule and Senate Meeting Schedule
- A debate and vote, called an Executive Session, is scheduled after the Public Hearing
 - \circ $\;$ These meetings are also posted on each chambers respective meeting schedule $\;$
 - An Executive Session can be **scheduled for the same day** as a public hearing
 - Amendments to the bill can be considered and voted upon during these meetings
- The Committee Chair decides when to schedule a Public Hearing and an Executive Session for every bill
- The Majority and Minority of the Committee write reports for and against the Committee's recommendation to the entire legislative chamber
- Bills cannot die in committee in NH! All go to the chamber floor!



Public Hearings


- The public is asked to sign up to speak prior to the Public Hearing
 - The Senate has a sheet where people sign up to speak and indicate their support or opposition
 - The House has little cards that are submitted to the Chair where people sign up to speak and indicate their support or opposition
- The Chair will call on people who signed up to speak, called "testifying"
- Individuals provide input on the substance of the bill and direct their comments to the entire committee
- After providing testimony, individuals can choose to answer any questions from the committee's members
 - These questions usually help state legislators learn about the bill and its intent
- If you sign in for or against a bill, it is kept in the public record with the bill

A Second Committee?

- Often times, yes!
- Bills will go through a **substantive committee** and the **Finance Committee**
 - This is true for both the House and Senate
- A substantive committee addresses the policies in a bill
 - This substantive committee reviews the bill first
 - \circ $\;$ Ex. Education, Finance, Ways & Means, Resources & Development, etc $\;$
- The Finance Committee reviews the bill's costs
 - They **do not** review the substance of the bill---in theory...
- The Finance Committee also makes a recommendation for the legislative chamber to act upon
 - \circ $\;$ Like the substantive committees, there is a Majority and Minority report

It took this long for the final Floor Vote?


- Again, yes!
- It can take 2-3 months for a bill to entirely pass through the chamber where it was introduced
- Legislators scrutinize bills in a substantive committee, the Finance Committee, and vote two times on their respective chamber's floor
- Many stakeholders---state department heads, professional organizations, lobbyists, people with lived experience, activists, etc---provide input throughout the process
- It is very difficult to pass bill through either the Senate or House



Crossover!

- The House and Senate has a deadline for when bills must leave their chamber
- This deadline ensures state legislators complete their work in a timely manner during the legislative session
- Once a bill passes the chamber where it was introduced, it "crosses over" to the other chamber
- Everything that was done previously is now done in the opposite chamber

The bill has made it this far?



Committees of Conference

- A Committee of Conference is convened when the House and Senate pass different versions of the same bill and both chambers vote to establish a Committee of Conference
- The Committee of Conference's purpose to reconcile the differences between the House and Senate bills and propose a compromise to both chambers
- Committees of Conferences have 3 Senators and 4 Representatives
 - 2 Senators from the majority party and 1 from the minority party
 - \circ $\,$ 2-3 Representatives from the majority party and 1-2 from the minority party
 - \circ $\;$ The Senate President and House Speaker assign members to the committee
- For a report to be recommended, the committee must be unanimous
 - Otherwise, if the deadline passes, the bill dies



Survived that?

Onto the FINAL House and Senate Floor Votes...

The Final Steps...


- You've survived the Committee of Conference and final floor votes, or you got lucky and passed both chambers without needing a Committee of Conference
- The Senate President and House Speaker sign the bill
- The bill is reviewed by a committee that addresses any grammatical errors
 They do not make any substantive changes!
- The Secretary of State enrolls the bill and sends it to the Governor's office
- The Governor must take action in 10 days or the bill automatically becomes law
- This entire process can sometimes take a month

Did the Governor just veto your bill?

You need a... VETO OVERRIDE!




VETO DAY!

- (Usually) happens in the first couple weeks of September each year
- All the vetoed bills are voted on **again** by the House and Senate
- 2/3s of the Senate and 2/3s of the House must vote in support of the bill to override the Governor's veto
- If the Governor's veto is overridden, the bill becomes law
- Veto overrides are very rare and take a lot of bipartisan cooperation






Why is knowing the process important?

- How can you track what you don't understand or know?
- Different parts of the process require waiting and others require involvement
 - When is the best time to contact you local state legislators?
 - When is it best to contact members of a committee reviewing a bill?
 - When is it opportune to engage/educate your community to advocate for or against a bill?
 - How will you know that you were successful or need to keep advocating?
- And, you can share this knowledge with the Board of Trustees, Library Director, staff, patrons, and other interested stakeholders!











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
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
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
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



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
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

















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



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
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Raising awareness about bills / public policy

- Have a brief legislative update at every Board of Trustees meeting
- Invite state legislators to a Board of Trustees meeting to discuss legislation
 - Plan with them well in advance!
 - Be flexible because their schedules are very busy
- Engage Library Friends, patrons, and other partners
 - Plan an event to educate the public on policies or issues
 - Invite a speaker from the NH Municipal Association or another organization to present
 - \circ $\;$ Invite state legislators so they are engaged and educated
- Encourage supporters or Library Trustees to start a letter writing campaign
 - Find strong supporters who will submit letters into the paper over an extended time period
 - \circ $\,$ Make sure it is a new person each week or day the newspaper comes out
- Consider utilizing social media, too!
