





FACILITIES UPDATE

The Pearl River Public Library continues to evaluate the state of our building as we move forward with the Facility Master Planning process. In the last newsletter, we explained that the Facility Master Planning process appraises the condition of the library's facilities – specifically mechanical components that are starting to fail – and identify our current and future needs. This process will also assess the interior design of the library itself and offer suggestions on how to improve the layout and patron-facing facilities to improve the library experience for all who visit.

Finally, the Facility Master Plan document will help us anticipate how much these renovations will cost in the long run and devise an efficient maintenance timeline that allows us to address issues proactively, instead of waiting for a critical failure to occur before action is taken.

These updates will help the library continue to evolve as a space where people can come to not just read or study, but also experience unique programs and events that enrich their lives. With capital improvements to the facility, we can ensure a smooth transition as we usher the library into a new era as a cultural and community center.

Thank you to all who attended the Town Hall Meeting. We appreciate the feedback we received and look forward to sharing our progress with you in our next newsletter.

As always, we're still looking for feedback from the community on what you love about the library and what you would like to see improved.

EUGENIA Q&A

Libraries around the globe are in a transition period, moving from purveyors of reading materials and media to community and cultural centers where residents can take in local artwork before learning how to code.

As the Pearl River Public Library stands at the dawn of this new era, Director Eugenia Schatoff plans to guide the library with exciting new programs, services, and upgrades. In the nine months since she's been the Library Director, Schatoff has introduced several initiatives including an evaluation of the building itself. To move forward in establishing the library's role as a center

for the community to meet and learn and enrich their lives, Schatoff says the facilities need to be renovated, citing several mechanical components needing repairs or replacement.

"Very little money has been spent on capital improvements," Schatoff explained, "and the building is suffering from lack of attention."

Among the short-term solutions will be renting a mobile air conditioning unit to cool the library during the upcoming summer months, as the current cooling system is damaged beyond repair.

"My goal," she said, "is to have a well-thought-out, financially supported plan for the facility. Having a project-based plan staged over several years will give us a library that lasts at least another 30 years."

The last facilities renovation occurred in 1991, she explained.

"That was pre-Internet, so a lot of the technology has changed since then."

Ultimately, Schatoff would love to see a successful budget vote in the near future to help carry out the much-needed renovations. In addition, she is applying her grant writing experience to attempt to secure more funds for capital improvements.

Schatoff is eager to revitalize not only the library building, but also its offerings to the public. One of her goals is to continue providing the same programs and services the residents love, while putting her own spin on them. The newsletter has undergone a facelift and more programming has been created to attract millennials, such as Less-Stress Thursdays for 20 and 30-somethings. On the horizon, she has plans to create more innovative and meaningful programs and events to serve the Pearl River community.

"I love Pearl River," she said, "and it's clear how supportive the community is. This is a well-loved library, and it really shows."





Police Chief Fred Kennedy organized the Decoration Day parade for the town, with the first of these being held in 1924. The parades were popular with veterans and town resident alike. After the construction wa complete for the Rockland State Psychiatric Hospital, the chief realized there were World War I veterans housed there who coul not attend the parade. Kennedy organized a parade at the hospit for their benefit in 1942, which the hospitalized veterans greatly appreciated. This act of kindness and respect was especially noted as, at that time, mental institutions were depressing places call "snake pits."

The Pearl River Fishing Clu was organized in the late 1890's among fishing enthusiasts in town. They held their first Clam and Crab Bake in the picnic grove behind the Frankli Avenue School baseball diamor along the Cherry Brook. The club's members fished in the loc streams for brook trout, and in t spring, they would go on fishing excursions to the Hudson River for the shad run. It's unknown when the club disbanded, as is much else about the club.
