

Out of the Archives



In preparation for the new Library, we have embarked on a project to organize our local history archival collection. Some very interesting items are being unearthed and will be featured as part of this monthly newsletter by our Archivist, Arielle Nathanson.

This month's feature is:

The Lucubrations of Isaac Bickerstaff vs. John Partridge

Located in the Local History Room is a rather uninteresting looking book. It is bound in shoddy brown leather with no adornments. The word "Tattler" can barely be made out on the decaying spine. The pages are yellowed and slightly water damaged. Overall, the book appears to be nothing special.

However, that couldn't be further from the truth. This book is in fact Volume 1 of *The Lucubrations of Isaac Bickerstaff.* Lucubration (probably the most impressive SAT word) means an elaborate or verbose study on a topic. Admittedly, that still

doesn't sound too exciting. At least, not until flipping through the pages and seeing that these "lucubrations" are essentially gossip disguised as poetry and news articles.

The history of this slightly spicy book begins with a sarcastic comment made about the Church of England by John Partridge, a famous astrologer of the time. He referred to the church as "infallible," commenting on the imperfections of the church, when his own predictions were frequently wrong. This sarcastic comment upset Jonathan Swift, a prolific writer who penned the famous *Gulliver's Travels*.

To prove his point about the ridiculousness of astrology and how it was incorrect just as much, if not more than, the church, he took the pseudonym Issac Bickerstaff and published a letter stating that Partridge would die an "infallible death" on March 29th of that year (1708). This death prediction was especially pointed at Partridge, because he made yearly predictions about the deaths of notable people. When March 29th rolled around, Bickerstaff published another letter confirming Partridge's death with a satirical eulogy, and a carved headstone following soon after.

March 9th at 7:00 PM via Zoom



Q&A with Stan Zimmerman on "The Girls: From Golden to Gilmore"

March 13th at 7:00 PM via Zoom

The Girls: From Golden to Gilmore is the story of Stan Zimmerman, a gawky Jewish boy who dreamed of becoming a wildly successful actor, rich enough to build his own mansion in the Hollywood Hills. While the actor part didn't quite pan out, Stan found success as a writer, producer, director, and playwright, working on such shows as *The Golden Girls, Roseanne, and Gilmore Girls*.

Throughout his life, most of Stan's friendships have been with females. He credits those friendships and the women in his family with his ability to connect with creative women who have played a part in his career success. Accompanied by journal entries, *The Girls* details Stan's relationships with some of entertainment's most notable women, including Roseanne Barr, Lily Tomlin, Sandra Bernhard, Lauren Graham and Alexis Bledel, and, of course, all four Golden Girls.

Film presentation: Borderland - The Life & Times of Blanche Ames Ames

March 14th at 6:15 PM SPL Community Room

The Library is thrilled to welcome back Sharon native, Kevin Friend, to present his documentary film *Borderland: The Life & Times of Blanche Ames Ames*during Women's History Month.

Blanche Ames (1878-1969) was a prominent local leader of the Massachusetts women's suffrage movement. A daughter and granddaughter of Civil War generals and state governors, Blanche was one of the few women of her time to attend college (Smith College, BA in art); she used her art and writing in political cartoons to promote women's suffrage. She was president of the Easton Women's Suffrage League and co-founder of the Birth Control League of

Massachusetts. The film is named after her estate, Borderland, which borders Sharon and Easton and is now open to the public as Borderland State Park.

NOTE: The film has been updated and edited to include new footage.

Q&A with Kevin will follow the film presentation.

One Book, One Town Book Discussion with Sharon Public Library


March 20th at 1:30 PM SPL Community Room
