Auschwitz Exhibition

As a member of OCLN, Sharon Public Library has been offered a limited number of complimentary tickets for youth and young adults to Auschwitz. Not long ago. Not far away. in Boston, open through September 15, 2024.

With funding from Combined Jewish Philanthropies and the One8 Foundation, the objective of providing these tickets is to promote Holocaust education and combat antisemitism by removing the financial barrier to visit this exhibition.

Through this daunting selection of objects from the Auschwitz-Birkenau State Museum as well as more than 20 institutions and museums all over the world, the Auschwitz exhibition portrays the complex reality of the notorious camp while sharing first-hand stories from those who survived, and those who perished.

Please note that while this exhibition is generally recommended for ages 12+, parents/guardians should decide if this content is appropriate for their child. **These tickets are funded specifically for youth, teens, and college-age people.**Adults and anyone outside of those parameters may not take advantage of this opportunity but may purchase tickets at **TheAuschwitzExhibition.com**.

Explore the many State-funded databases from Gale and EBSCO that cover a multitude of subjects and interests, as well as OCLN's **Newsbank** which includes America's News Collection, Heritage Hub (obituaries & death notices) and Black Life in America. We've also provided links to popular websites such as the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Medline and National Institutes of Health, and Boston Public Library.

Tech Talk



Exciting New Libby Update!

We are excited to share that OverDrive has released a large update for their Libby app, greatly improving the user interface and navigation tools for users.

Here's a short summary of what changed

- Tags are now part of the navigation bar in Libby.
- The **Timeline** and **Notices** (i.e., in-app notifications) have moved to the **Shelf**.
- The menu is simpler and richer. All the major parts of the menu now appear on the top level, so it's easier to find what you need.
- Title descriptions appear in search results and in lists for seamless browsing.
- You can now set up a recovery passkey in Libby (on supported devices) to back up your data. It's simple, secure, and password-less. Learn more about creating a recovery passkey.
- Setup codes have reversed direction for added security. You read the code on the new device and input the 8-digit code on the original device.
- Plus, there are many other visual and wording improvements throughout the app.



Out of the Archives



In preparation for the new Library, we have embarked on a project to organize our local history archival collection. Some very interesting items are being unearthed and will be featured as part of this monthly newsletter by our Archivist, Arielle Nathanson.

This month's feature is:

Fact or Fiction: Mummies in the Collection

There are a few newspapers in The Local History Room from the 1800s and, surprisingly enough, they're in good shape. Upon further inspection, it's obvious that they were made from high quality cotton and linen fibers, the likes of which aren't used today. That material was taken directly from old clothes or rags and processed to make paper meant to last. The only issue was that cotton and linen were finite resources.

Beginning as early as the 1820s, America started to run out of cotton and linen. With the literacy rate rapidly increasing and demand for newspapers picking up, there weren't enough materials to keep up production. The brightest minds

scrambled to find a suitable replacement, but came up empty. Eventually, straw and grass were mixed into the pulp to stretch the existing supply. But America was panicking...

Adult Workshop Managing Anxiety and Stress

September 12th at 6:45 PM SPL Community Room

Led by Marci daCamara, LMHC, this workshop for adults will focus on how anxiety/stress impact us and how it can affect us physically, mentally, and behaviorally. We will go over some basic coping skills that can be used to help adults manage their stress and anxiety. This will include mindfulness/grounding techniques such as deep breathing, 54321, progressive muscle relaxation, thinking in categories, etc. We will end by touching upon the importance of self-care as a preventative measure for keeping anxiety in check.

Marci daCamara, LMHC is the Executive Director and Founder of Be Inspired Counseling, LLC (a mental health therapy group practice) and Be Inspired Together, Inc. (a nonprofit whose mission is to ensure equality in mental health care regardless of financial means), located in Sharon. Marci received her Undergraduate degree from Brandeis University and her Masters in Counseling, with a Specialization in Addictions, from Antioch New Hampshire. She has worked in a variety of settings including outpatient, home-based, and residential settings. Marci's successes include the development of the state-wide curriculum for the Adolescent Substance Abuse Day Treatment Program and working with high-risk youth in the Department of Youth Services.

Great Boston Fires with Author and Historian David Kruh
