

### SELECTED HISTORICAL NOTES FROM THE JACOB EDWARDS LIBRARY

### HAMILTON FREE LIBRARY

The Hamilton Woolen Company offer to the operatives in their employment, the use of the Books in their Library, as per Catalogue annexed, on the following conditions, viz:

The Library will be open for delivery of Books on Wednesday and Saturday evenings, from 7 to 8 o'clock.

One Book, or series, if not exceeding three in number of a duodecimo size, may be taken and detained two weeks; if an octavo size, one only can be detained three weeks: if a folio or quarto size, one only can be taken and may be kept four weeks, under a penalty of six cents per week for each Book longer detained.

No person shall be allowed to make a second renewal of any Book, if it is wanted by any other party known to the Librarian.

If a book be lost, or materially injured, while charged to any individual, he must furnish another copy of the same in good condition.

No Dictionary, Encyclopedia, Mechanical, Geographical, or other works of reference, to be removed from this Library; nor any other book without the knowledge and permission of the Librarian.

Persons taking books from said Library are required, before leaving the employment of said Company, to furnish them a certificate from the Librarian, stating that said books are all returned in good order.

In the 1860s a group of persons associated with the Hamilton Woolen Company made plans to start a library.

Having no funds, this group opened a subscription library to which subscribers paid a certain small fee which entitled them to borrow books.

There was no paid librarian, so that this job was auctioned off to the lowest bidder, who kept the books in his own house.

Townspeople were dissatisfied with the limitations imposed by this scheme, and this library closed. The Globe Mills started a library for their own employees also in the 1860s. This was located in two rooms in Wheeler's store near the mills. The books were given to the Hamilton Woolen Company by its president at that time, Gardner Brewer. John Rowley became the librarian.

In 1871, Holmes Ammidown, a wealthy New Yorker and a native of Southbridge, decided to do something beneficial for the town. He decided to finance a public library here. He built the Ammidown building and set aside three rooms on the second floor for library purposes.

Before being moved into the building, at the beginning of the following year the library for a short time was located in the Whitford building at the corner of Main and Hamilton streets. It opened in that site in February of 1871.

Ammidown financed the project liberally, and upon his death left his entire personal book collection and a great number of town histories to the library. The Ammidown sets were the best early histories of Southbridge.

The establishment, like other early town libraries, was open only in the evenings after normal working hours. It was opened only on Saturday and one week-day evening. Saturday night was a popular reading night there, with townspeople usually filling the library on the weekend evening to capacity.

In 1902 another Town native, Jacob Edwards of Boston, seeing the need for a larger and better library for the growing community, offered a sum of not less than \$50,000 to the town to build a new library building. He made this proposal at the annual town meeting that year. He donated land at the corner of Main and Foster streets for that purpose.

Actual construction of the building began in 1904. The library committee at the time headed by Francis L. Chapin, hired a first rate architect to design the structure. It was opened for circulation purposes in 1915, with the building and its contents costing about \$80,000. John Paige, son-in-law of Chapin, and also a later head of the committee, contributed much to the development of the project.

In later years, the three children of Edwards; Robert, Grace and Hannah Edwards, added a total of \$200,000 to the original bequest. The funds of the trust were given into the hands of the Old Colony Trust Co. and First National Bank in Boston.
