











# Sonia's Favorites of 2022









#### Another year has come and gone, that means a booktalk of my personal favorites of 2022.

Helltown is a fascinating True Crime book. In the 1960s, a serial killer lived in the same east coast town as Kurt Vonnegut and Norman Mailer, whose dramas play out alongside the killer's story and sometimes overlap. I loved the fabulous depiction of Cape Cod in the '60s and how this case was brought to justice.

Notes on Your Sudden Disappearance is a bittersweet Coming-of-Age set mostly in the 1990s, a story about sisters and heartbreak.

Violeta is a dramatic Historical Fiction about a South American woman who lives and thrives through wars, the depression, scandalous love affairs and more.

The House with the Golden Door, a sequel to one of my favorites of 2021, set in ancient Greece, is about a smart and resourceful courtesan who has to deny her heart's desires in order to succeed independently.

# **Everybody Loves Reading Audits**

It's January so I am doing my yearly reading audit. I like to see my **reading trends** from year to year. In 2022 I read **67** books. 42 were new, 25 were backlist titles. I count books as new if they were published within the year prior to when I read them.

The big surprise: I read equally between male and female authors! In past years I've read more female authors than male. In 2022 I read 33 by a female, 33 by a male, and 1 co-written by a man and woman couple (a self-help/marriage book). Another surprise: I didn't read any YA (teen) or middle grade fiction, which is unusual for me, but last year I read less YA than years prior, so it looks like I'm moving away from YA.

I always read more fiction than non-fiction, so no surprise that 45 books were fiction, 22 were non-fiction. Here's the breakdown:


