Spotlight on Novelist



Books, books! Log in to **Novelist** (through our website) and answer their prompt: I'm in the mood for... Browse categories like Moody & Atmospheric, Bittersweet, Heartwarming, Menacing & intensifying, and Whimsical and Offbeat.

Browse by genre and theme. Specify how you like it! For example: Mystery: Urban or rural? Cozy or adrenaline-filled? Detective or amateur sleuth? Find specific fiction themes such as "Bouncing Back," "Band of Survivors," "Love in Wartime, "Vengeance is Mine," "Academies of Magic," "Trapped!" "New in Town," and "Time and Again."

Everybody Loves Book Club


In October, the 43rd Street Book Club discussed the mystery-thriller When No One Is Watching by Alyssa Cole. This slow-burn mystery follows Brooklyn native Sydney. As gentrification causes her neighbors to disappear, she starts to suspect something more sinister is going on.


For November, Native American Heritage Month, the book club pick was Caleb's Crossing by Geraldine Brooks, which is set in a Puritan settlement of the 1660s, and is based on true events. A preacher's daughter befriends a Wampanoag boy who becomes the first Native American to graduate from Harvard.

The 43rd Street Book Club meets on Monday nights. Upcoming in January: What Unites Us: Reflections on Patriotism by Dan Rather. Everybody Loves Reading Audits

How diversely do you read?

Do you look at your reading trends?

Do you keep track of what books you read? If you don't, you should! At the end of the year, look at those titles. Audit your reading life to learn more about yourself as a reader.

Break it down into genres, and formats: What genres did you read most? How many print/ebook/audio/graphic novels?


How many: Male authors? Female authors?

Person of color authors? Global settings?

On the right is my 2021 year-in-reading **genre pie chart**.

I finished 68 books. 80% is fiction.
Non-fiction takes up 20%.
Breaking down by **format**, I read:
53 print books
7 audiobooks
8 ebooks



You'll see patterns and those patterns can be helpful. What did you learn about yourself? Were you fulfilled with your reading? Or was it lackluster? Do you gravitate towards certain characters? Were there any trends or books you loved that surprised you?

My surprise: In 2021, two of my books were re-reads, which I enjoyed even more than the first time I read them. I hardly ever re-read. No surprise: My favorites were historical fiction with quirky characters. I know to look for these to find a good read. There are book tracking sites that you can use, such as Litsy, Goodreads or Storygraph. These sites have fun features. Or you can keep track on a spreadsheet. However you do it, I hope it helps to enhance your reading pleasure. Happy reading!
