# Sutton Free Public Library Strategic Plan FY 22 - FY 26



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The Board of Library Trustees of the Sutton Free Public Library is charged with the duty of overseeing library facilities and services for the residents of Sutton. It is in this spirit that the Board embarked upon a long range planning process in 2021.

Long range planning is also a requirement of the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners (MBLC). Submitting a long range plan is a requirement that ensures our eligibility for certification and for direct grants from the MBLC under the federally funded Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA), as well as any other state funded library grants.

This Long Range Plan is the result of the process begun several months ago. This document will serve as a custom blueprint for determining library services in Sutton for the next five years. It will guide the Trustees and the staff as they make library service and program decisions in our current facility, as well as determine service priorities at a potential new site. The long range plan will guide the Trustees and Director as they allocate resources, in the form of taxpayer dollars, for the most effective library services possible. ## Methodology

The Strategic Plan process began with the solicitation of committee members in the spring of 2021. The first meeting was scheduled for August 11. A SOAR analysis was conducted to identify the strengths, opportunities, aspirations, and results of the library. The Library Director took the results of the SOAR analysis and began to form goals and objectives. These goals and objectives were discussed, debated, deliberated, and re-arranged at the August 26 meeting of the Strategic Plan Committee.

During August and September, a community survey was conducted. Surveys were available via the library's website, as well as in paper form at the Library and the Senior Center. Survey results indicated that patrons are most appreciative of library staff and library programming. One commenter stated "The employees are so great. They are all so nice and helpful, and will help you find anything. Even if they don't have a book they will find it and borrow it for you. I also love the events for kids, including story time and music class. And the community events like magic shows are great."

The penultimate draft of the Strategic Plan was presented to the committee for final discussion at their September 15 meeting. Small changes were recommended and the final draft was deemed complete by the committee on September 20. The Strategic Plan was accepted and voted upon by the Board of Trustees at their meeting on September 29, 2021.

## **Town of Sutton**

The town of Sutton is a rural community located in Central Massachusetts (Worcester County) and is part of the southeast subregion consisting of Blackstone, Douglas, Grafton, Hopedale, Mendon, Millbury, Millville, Northbridge, Sutton, Upton, and Uxbridge. This classic Americana town within the Blackstone Valley is conveniently placed along thruways such as Route146 (the Worcester-Providence Turnpike) making the Rhode Island Border only a 15 minute drive. Similarly, I-90 (Mass Pike) and I-395 are just a few minutes away, making travel to the Connecticut border and other Massachusetts regions quick and easily accessible. Although Sutton is just eight miles south of the city of Worcester, it boasts lush fields and historic structures. These historic spaces can be found scattered throughout the Town's five villages: Sutton Center, Manchaug, Wilkinsonville, West Sutton, and South Sutton. A primary example being Sutton's Municipal Complex (located in Sutton Center) which houses the library, town administrative offices and fire stations. Tidily, compacted into one building, the complex is adjacent to a grassy town common, the Congregational Church, historic blacksmith shop and several farms. The Town's website (www.suttonma.org) describes Sutton as the "...home to Purgatory Chasm State Park, Lakes Singletary and Manchaug as well as town owned recreational areas including Marion's Camp with a lake beach and Shaw Farm that offers walking trails." Sutton has an open town meeting type government. The town is governed by a five member Select Board and a Town Manager, who carries out day to day operations.

## Vision Statement from Town Master Plan

"The Town of Sutton appreciates its open space, cultural and natural assets, its village centers, its sense of community and distinct rural feel. Sutton's open space, vistas, agricultural land, forest, lakes, ponds, historic structures, places, and their ultimate protection are one of the most important aspects to the community. The Town, through this master planning effort, will foster economic growth encouraging local services, job creation and increased tax base that is in balance with the Town's rural character. The strength of the town lies in its past and future planning efforts, and its ability to challenge itself to make organized, thoughtful decisions regarding its future. Ultimately, the Town of Sutton will thrive on its unique balance of growth and rural character that has attracted generations of families. This sustainability will be a model that visitors remember."

## **Demographics**

The Sutton Public Library provides relevant resources and entertainment to the residents of Sutton. According to the 2019 Town census that amounts to over 9,500 people. Projections by the Central Massachusetts Regional Planning Council (CMRPC) anticipate that by 2040, the population will be approximately 10,213. Currently, 23.7% of Sutton's population are children or individuals under the age of 18, 19.7% are between the ages 19-39 years and 56.6% consists of individuals aged 40 years and over. The U.S. Census Bureau states that the median household income from 2015-2019 in Sutton was \$104,911(in 2019 dollars). The United States Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (USDA/NASS) 2017 census has 45 farm operations on record in Sutton, 42 are fully owned, 2 are tenants and one is partially owned. Of the working population, 63.2% are employed by private companies, 9.2% are self employed, 5.9 % are private not-for-profit employees, and 21.7 % work for local, state, or federal governments. The Sutton School District has a 96.2 % graduation rate and of those aged 25 and over, 51.6% attained a degree beyond High School level. 8% of Sutton's population are veterans and, as of 2019, 5% of Sutton's population is foreign born. Of those who are foreign born, 75.9% are naturalized citizens. English is the primary language spoken at home at 93.4% with Indo-European Languages following at 3.6 %, Spanish at 1.5%, Asian/Pacific Islander Languages at 1.3% and other languages at 0.2%.

## The Sutton Free Public Library

The Sutton Free Public Library was originally created in 1874 when the Sutton Farmers Club started a fund to purchase reading books to be shared over the winter. At the Annual Town Meeting on March 20, 1876, the town accepted the library from the original owners, who had contributed one dollar each to establish it. In 1882 four additional branches, one in each village, were added. The last of those branches closed in 2005, leaving only the Center Library, which was moved to Sutton Town Hall in 1957, where it remained until it was relocated to the nearby General Rufus Putnam Building. In 1982 it moved into the basement of the newly constructed Town Municipal Center because the Putnam Building could no longer support the weight of books. The library space was renovated in 1993 by Larkin and Tenney Architects to enlarge its allotted space. The product of that renovation is the Library space currently in use.

Housed on the basement level of the Sutton Municipal Complex in the Sutton Center, sharing the building with Sutton's various administration offices, as well as the Fire and Emergency Services Departments. The Library's space, measuring 3,100 gross square feet and 2,000 net square feet, is in use for library activities Monday through Saturday, though access to the Emergency Services office space from the ambulance and fire garage requires parts of the library to be utilized at any time.

The Sutton Free Public Library facilitates lifelong learning by connecting people to informational, cultural, recreational and technical resources. The FY2022 (2021 data) Annual Report Information Survey (ARIS) conducted by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners (MBLC) stated that there were 3,121 borrowers, all of whom are Sutton residents, with an additional 461 non-resident users. The library is a member of the CW MARS consortium and its cataloging and circulation systems are fully automated using the Evergreen system, which allows users access to the library's 30,728 tangible holdings and 171,909 electronic holdings divided across Adult, Young Adult, and Children's sections. During FY2021, tangible library items circulated 40,612 times and electronic items 12,279 times. The Sutton Free Public Library is governed by a three-member Board of Trustees, each elected for a three-year term. The Library is administered by a Director who holds a Master's Degree in Library Science (MLS).
