Arts Council of Tamworth: Meet the Artist, Mouli Pal, Monday, April 1 from 6:00-7:00 PM at the library. Mouli will discuss what she will be doing during her 5-day artist-in-residency at the K.A. Brett School (April 1-5) and her April 4 public performance. On display will be her costume, head-dress, jewelry and ghungroos (ankle bells). Attendees will also be able to sample Indian snacks and dessert.

"Saturday Morning Cartoons: Bugs Bunny, Bullwinkle, and Big Business in the 1960s," rescheduled from April 3 to Wednesday, April 10 at 7:00 PM in person at the library. Kids growing up in the second half of the 20th century shared a common Saturday morning ritual: watching Yogi Bear, Bugs Bunny, and Rocky & Bullwinkle while eating a bowl of cereal. In this program, Margo Burns will share clips from

classic cartoons that will be sure to spark nostalgia, and reveal the behind-the-TV-screen decisions that made Saturday morning and cartoons become synonymous. This program is made possible through a grant from New Hampshire Humanities.

Rick Allmendinger, Professor Emeritus of Earth and Atmospheric Sciences at Cornell University, will discuss how energy and climate change are inexorably linked, telling a story of exponential growth, energy transitions, hard choices, and a future that will look very different, and hopefully better, than the one today. Come be inspired to welcome hummingbirds into your yard when they arrive.

Grant News: Cook Memorial Library has been selected as one of 310 libraries to participate in round two of *Libraries Transforming Communities: Accessible Small and Rural Communities*, an American Library Association (ALA) initiative that provides community engagement and accessibility resources to small and rural libraries to help them better serve people with disabilities. The competitive award comes with a \$10,000 grant, and as part of the grant, Cook Memorial Library staff will take an online course in how to lead conversations, a skill vital to library work today. Staff will then host two community conversations with residents with disabilities and their families, then use grant funds to make improvements based on the feedback received.
