TREASURES FROM THE HISTORY ROOM



William Hayden was a founding member of the Tecumseh Haydens, as well as an early businessman. He arrived in Tecumseh in 1857 and purchased the Globe Mill at a bankruptcy sale. However, he'd had real adventure before arriving in our peaceful community where he lived for the rest of his life.

He was born March 25, 1819 in Springfield, Otsego County, New York near Cooperstown. His parents were Hannah and Hezekiah Hayden, who moved to pioneer upstate New York from established farms and families in Hartford, Connecticut. Hezekiah had learned the trade of weaver and cloth dresser in his youth, even making a trip to Rotterdam as a young man, and operated a woolen factory from 1811 to 1823 in Springfield. Hezekiah was a man of great energy but his life was cut short at the age of forty-six during a typhoid epidemic. Hannah died a few weeks later, leaving their nine living children (out of twelve) orphans. William was the tenth child and the seventh son and was four years old when his parents died.

The children were distributed to various relatives, with William going to Windsor to be "bound out" to an uncle. He remained there for three years and then returned to New York and Genesee County to live with another uncle until he reached adulthood. He went into business for himself in 1840, purchasing the shoe shop and tannery of his uncle at Bennington and with a partner operated and enlarged the business until 1846. He engaged in the milling and lumber trade for a brief time and then worked as a carpenter in New York City repairing and refitting vessels for sea. This was around the time that Gold Rush Fever hit hard and thirty year old William joined a group of twelve making the overland journey to California. After traveling for 100 days and reaching the Platte River, cholera broke out among the group and four died, including Albert Hayden, brother of William. William contracted the disease but recovered and the group continued on. Near the South Pass of the

mountains, William and another member of the party came down with mountain fever, and with provisions being short, the rest of the group pushed on and left the sick ones to perish. The sick ones treated themselves with white oak bark, using a skillet borrowed from Daniel Boone, grandson of the old Kentucky trapper who was traveling in the area. Recovering well enough to overtake their group, now numbering eight, they arrived in Sacramento by September, having "been on the road" since February.

William engaged in mining, building and contracting for two years and then took passage for home via the Isthmus. Five days later the steamer was wrecked 700 miles below San Francisco. Fortunately all the passengers survived and sixteen days later they boarded another vessel.

Unfortunately, as William was moving from one vessel to another, his carpetbag sank beneath the waves and with it, his earnings of \$4,000 in gold. He had absolutely nothing left, not even a change of clothing and no money to pay his fare home. To his great relief, the wife of the Governor of California came to his rescue and funds were raised to cover the cost of his ticket. The Isthmus was crossed and William boarded a steamer bound for New York City, surviving a terrible storm and a fire, and reaching port on August 20, 1851.

William still wanted to go west and traveled to Jackson, Michigan where he purchased a mill from his brother Henry. William operated the Vandercook Mills for three years. He then purchased the Globe Mill in Tecumseh where he achieved great success for many decades. His home on Pottawattamie Street in Tecumseh, where he and his wife Sarah Hosmer Hayden raised their eight children, still stands today.

One of the special treasures of our History Room is the collection of diaries written by Perry Hayden, grandson of William. The twenty plus volumes cover the years from 1913 to 1954, beginning first as handwritten records and then transitioning to typewritten ones and back again. Years of Hayden family Holiday Letters are also in the collection.
