Title: Steeped in Secrets (Crystals & CuriosiTEAS series – Book 1)





Title: Daughter of No Worlds



to realize that there is a delicate balance of power at play, and that she is now a part of it. Is the risk of being enslaved to yet another force worth the leverage it will give her to help free the slaves she left behind?

Full of action, magic, war, complex characters with dynamic backstories, and incredible world-building, this has been one of my favorite books that I've read this year. 
Fiction

Title: Below the Edge of Darkness: A Memoir of Exploring Light and Life in the Deep Sea



Edith Widder is a marine biologist from Massachusetts known for her work on bioluminescence, this is her memoir. I had so much fun reading this book!

Widder's start in the field of marine biology and oceanography was a rocky one, with a medical scare in her first year of college that led to three resuscitations and a near-death experience that left her temporarily blind. Her road to recovery sparked an interest in the nature of sight,

and the role bioluminescence plays in the pitch black of the ocean. Her career in this field took her on many exciting adventures, from discovering never before seen species, creating new technologies for the U.S. Navy, experiencing the dangers of a leak in an ROV, Soviet scientists attempting to reverse engineer her team's latest bathyphotometer, and even chatting with Fidel Castro about his opinion on the best way to cook a lobster. Widder is a fantastic scientist, and it shows in her writing just how much she cares for our oceans. Her footnotes littered throughout each chapter kept me laughing, and kept this nonfiction book from getting too dense. It's an approachable read even for those who are not science-inclined.


Title: The Hidden Rainbow

Title: Caution! Road Signs Ahead

I say this tongue-in-cheek, but this book could/should be required reading for anyone operating a vehicle on the roads today.

The very first pages of the book state its purpose well: "...do you notice signs on the side of the road? Do you wonder what they all mean? They are a code to let drivers know how to stay safe, what is nearby, or where to pay extra attention. You can learn the code too!" The book explores MANY of the signs we see as we travel and explains what each sign means. Each sign is portrayed in true-to-life colors with simple language accompanying it and the location you might see such a sign. Stop, yield, buckle up, RR, speed limit, bus stop, playground, hospital, information, fuel, rest stop, toll, detour, campground, slippery when wet, and more.

I really enjoyed the manner in which the book organized the areas in which you might see the sign, that the pages featured "cut outs" of the signs, the bright colors and consistent short messaging. A perfect book to take on a road trip to entertain small folk (and large) whiling away the hours traveling. It would make for a good "I spy" game or scavenger hunt.
