The library began one new book club this year and welcomed the return of another that had stopped meeting at the beginning of the pandemic.

The new club, facilitated by Adult Services Librarian Tim Symington, focuses on American History. Participants will gather next on Jan. 23 to discuss "Common Ground: A Turbulent Decade in the Lives of Three American Families" by J. Anthony Lukas.

In addition, this year marked the return of the Cookbook Book Club. also faciliated by Symington. Members pick a recipe from a book that the group selects and brings the cooked goods for all to enjoy. Members are asked to register and list their chosen recipe so there are no duplicates.

All ages are invited to sign up for our annual Winter Reading Challenge in January and February.


We have three programs -children (grades K-5), teens (grades 6-12) and adults -- each with rules specific to that age group.







Sunday, Jan. 29, 2-4 p.m.


