

Genealogy Programs Return: Introduction to Ancestry and More

Introduction to Ancestry Library Edition, Thursday, October 12 at 5:30 - 7:30 p.m.

Assistant Library Director Mary Bell will give a brief presentation in the Brooks Room showing how to search for census records, military records, and more in Ancestry Library Edition. Participants will then move into the library, accessing computers after hours, to search for their own family history. Everyone for searching historic records. Some familiarity with attending will get a packet reminding them of the tips Ancestry.com is best for the following three programs, learned at the session, and including a list of even more free websites with which to continue their research. Ancestry Library Edition is made

available by Proquest and is available for all to use inlibrary through our computers or Wi-Fi connection. Appropriate for beginners to experienced genealogists. Sign up is required as space is limited.

Ancestry isn't the only product we have available lectures that can be attended separately or as a series.

The WFOL is holding a pollinator plant sale on Saturday, Oct. 7 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. with a rain date of Sunday, Oct. 8 at the Library.

There will be a variety of pollinatorfriendly biennials,
perennials, shrubs and
vines available for sale.
Early October is an
excellent time to plant;
the ground is warm
enough to support root
growth and there is
plenty of time for plants to get
established before winter sets in.

According to the USDA, "Threefourths of the world's flowering plants and about 35 percent of the world's food crops depend on animal pollinators to reproduce. That's one out of every three bites of food you eat. More than 3,500 species of native bees help increase crop yields. Some scientists estimate that one out of

every three bites of food we eat exists because of animal pollinators like bees, butterflies and moths, birds and bats, and beetles and other insects."

Newspapers.com Northeast is the place to go. Finally, HeritageQuest is a product similar to Ancestry that can be used from home.

FamilySearch

Learn how to use the free website sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to find a wealth of resources related to your family history. FamilySearch can be accessed from home with a free personal account. The Wilbraham Public Library is an affiliate library, which means that even more content can be accessed in-library. This lecture will cover searching, browsing images, and using the Research Wiki.
