## Memory Kits Added to Collection

Memory kits are coming to the Wilbraham Public Library to serve patrons dealing with memory loss. Memory kits are bags filled with themed items and activities for our patrons dealing with Alzheimers, dementia, and other cognitive impairments. These items incorporate visual, audio, and hands-on activities. They can be used to as a tool to promote conversation and reminiscence with caregivers, family, and friends. Kits are checked out for 6 weeks.

We currently have three themed kits with three more in development. Our first kit is "US Travel," which is themed around both travel and the United States. The items included in this kit are a CD of travel music, a book of American facts, a state matching game, and an expression matching game. The next kit is "In the Kitchen," which is themed around baking and cooking.


**Find More Birds: 111 Surprising Ways to Spot Birds Wherever You Are**, Wednesday, Apr. 24 at 7:00 p.m.

In 1805, Marcus Lyon was murdered on the Springfield-Boston Road in Wilbraham. In 1806, despite a lack of evidence, Irish Catholics Dominic Daley and James Halligan were unjustly accused and hung for the killing. It was not until St. Patrick's Day 1984 that Governor Michael Dukakis issued a proclamation exonerating them. Join Bill O'Riordan, W. Michael Ryan, Tony Ryan, & David Sullivan as they discuss the Daley & Halligan trial and the longstanding effects of anti-Irish discrimination.


**Introduction to Ancestry Library Edition**, Thursday, Apr. 18 from 5:30 - 7:30 p.m.

Assistant Library Director Mary Bell will show you how to search for census records, military records and more to add information to your family tree. Participants will then move into the library, accessing computers after hours, to search for their own family history. Everyone attending will get a packet reminding them of the tips learned at the session, including a list of even more free websites with which to continue their research. The items included in this kit are a cookbook, a vanilla scented sachet and a magnetic baking puzzle. It also includes a set of silicone baking items which can be handled and played with to simulate baking and connect with muscle memory. The last memory kit that is available is "The Senses," which incorporates items that connect with the different senses. These include a visual game called Ouisi, a fidget blanket, scented sachets, and a CD of easy listening music. Each kit also includes a selection of coloring pages for the theme and a supply of coloring utensils. Future themes for kits are animals, the 1950s, and the 1960s.






Paint Gem Ocean Edition
